edge of the volcano's crater, high up among the misty clouds. Corn, cocoa and coffee grow
high up on the mountainsides high up on the mountainsides
thriving on the rich volcanic ash which forms much of the soll. There are small towns where the only way to take their
wares to wares to market it to carry it.
The Indians are trained from The Indians are trained from
childhood until they are able chilahood until they are
to bear loads of over 200 lbs. on their backs, up and down the
stee trails. steep trails. The men are a
sturdy five sturdy five feet three or four
inches in height while the woinches in height while the wo-
men are four feet seven or eight inches tall. They are a small people, stoic to all pain, courageous and honest with no in clination to begging. Even

full of fowls and ducks on her full of fowls and ducks on her
back on which was also slung a baby. In her arms she car-
baby ried a fine young pig and on her head was a tray of tortillas. As she jogged along, the baby
cried, the porker squealed, and cried, the porker squealed, and
the poultry made noise enouggh the pouitry made noise en
to drown her own groans. Guatemala is an Indian land, for only about $10 \%$ of the inhabitant are white. Women
make pottery, weave bright make pottery, weave bright
blankets and embroider their blankets and embroider their
cotton blouses in colorful patternis. Each tribe and village has its own distinctive design so that an Indian girl's dress always indicates where she wa born. For dress occasions, th
men wear cotton suits and in addition, a small apron of plaid material. On their heads they wear bright kerchiefs or smal folded blanket squares. Alto gether, the countryside
Guatemala is as picturesque and beautiful as one could wish. The area of the country is 42,042 square miles a population is $3,201,000$. Guatemalans are governed by a pres
ident and national ident and national assembly
Voting is compulsory for literate males over 18 but is optio
