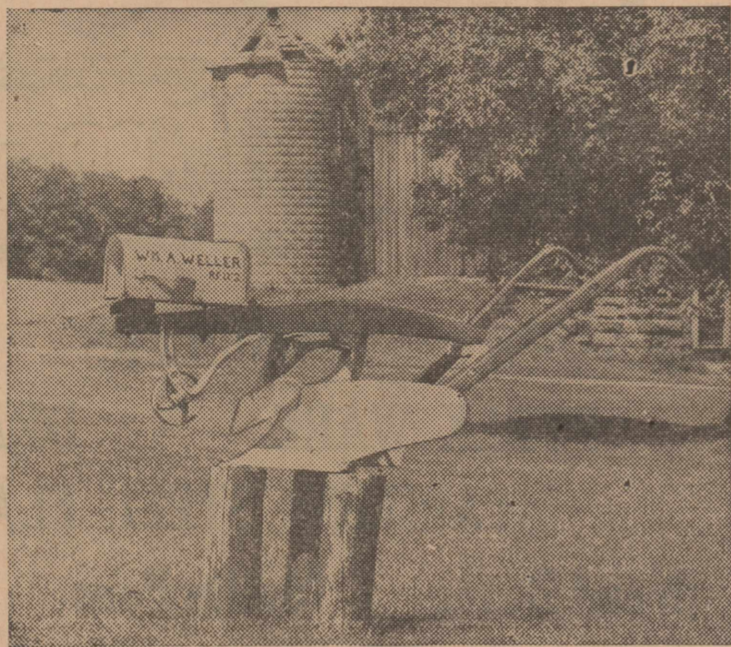
Mr. McMinn said dealing with the people of Sherman County had been one of the greatest pleasures of his life.

## Polling Places Established For Farmers July 21 Wheat Quota Vote

Polling places for the July 21 referendum on marketing quotas for the 1961 crop of wheat were announced this week by R. C. Buckles, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The wheat quota ballots may be cast on Thursday, July 21, from 8:00 a. m. to 6:00 p. m., at the following polling places: Community A, Stratford, at the courthouse; Community B, Texhoma, at the Texhoma Texas school house; Community C, Spurlock Chapel.

Growers eligible to vote in the referendum will be those who will have more than 15 acres of wheat as grain in 1961 (except growers taking part in the feed wheat program.)

Mr. Buckles points out that at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum must approve the quotas if they are to become effective. Under quotas, marketing penalties will apply on "excess" wheat resulting from noncompliance with the farm's wheat acreage allotment, and price supports will be available to cooperators on the crop at not less than 75 per cent of parity, the exact rate to be announced before the vote.

On the other hand, if more than one-third of the voters oppose the quotas, there will be no restrictions on wheat marketing, but allotments will remain in effect as a condition for price support at 50 per cent of parity, as directed by law.

Wheat growers voting in a referendum each year have approved marketing quotas for the past seven wheat crops.

## Federal Loans Grow Rapidly

One hundred and twenty-four years ago, reports the Tax Foundation, the Federal government discovered it had a \$28 million surplus. It solved the problem by distributing the money to the 24 states of that time, ostensibly on a loan basis. From that little economic acorn, great oaks have grown. In the fiscal year of 1960, Federal grants of all kinds to the states came to \$7.4 billion. The figure for fiscal year 1961 is estimated at just a little less, \$7.1 billion.

## Double Cropping System - Wheat Mung Beans - Can Increase Profit

STILLWATER — A double cropping system of wheat and mung beans on some of central Oklahoma's sandy soils may provide a good combination for increased returns from the land, reports an Oklahoma State University agricultural economist.

Field trial results show the two crops can be grown on certain sandy soils each year without lowering wheat yields materially, says Prof. J. F. Tomlinson.

After variable expenses were paid in the study, the returns to capital, labor and management were around \$9 per acre for wheat as a single crop as compared to \$21 per acre for wheat and mung beans as a double crop.

The same machinery and equipment required for wheat production also can be used for growing the mung bean crop, Tomlinson says.

Summer tillage following the wheat harvest prepares the land for the mung beans. The same combine can be used for harvesting both crops.

Mung beans also provide a good summer cover crop, helping protect the sandy soils from damage by wind erosion.

Biggest problem in growing mung beans is the inelastic demand for the crop, Tomlinson feels. Thus, on the basis of present market outlets, little prospect is seen for any sizeable increase in over-all production.

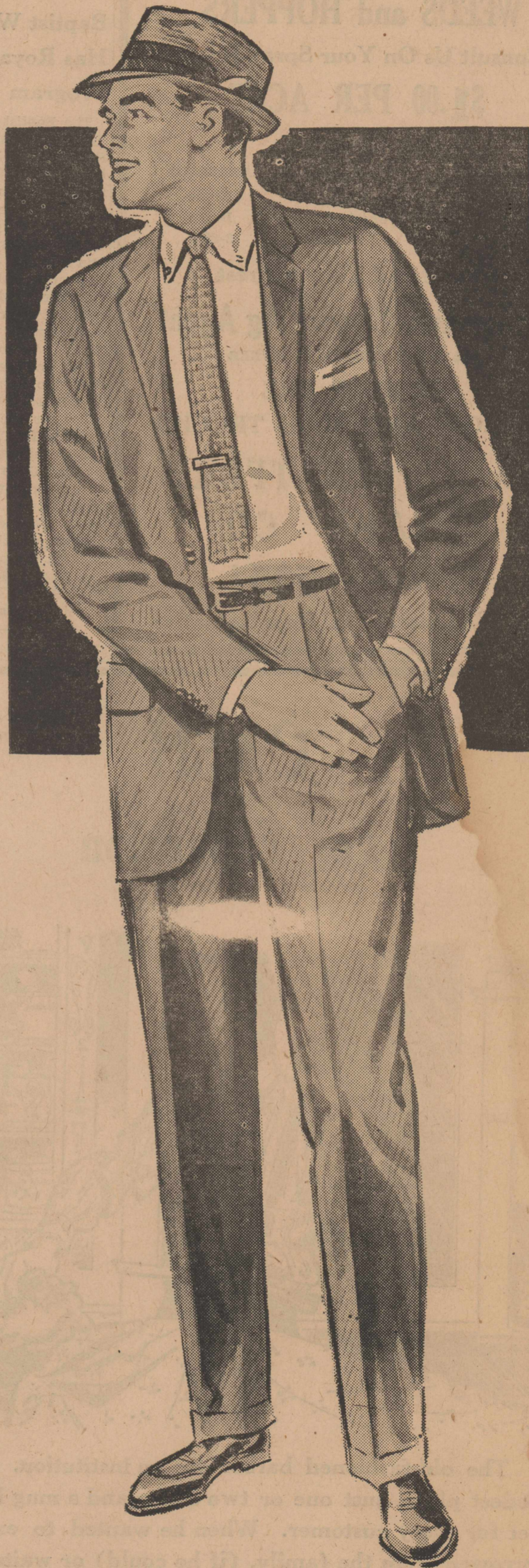


Dress Pattern No. 1494—Collar news —A BIG square collar in bold contrast is fashion news on this stunning summer date frock.

Creamy Egg Sandwich (Serves 4-5)

- 6 eggs

Spoon over hot toast and top each with a slice of tomato.

**MEDITORIAL:** Anxiety and tensions are an essential part of our life. Our emotions respond to every happening in a different way. When emergencies occur, tenseness can be helpful. As the adrenalin pours out into our system, the heart beats faster, muscles tighten up and we are ready for the occasion.

The ability to become tense is a means of protecting oneself from the hazards around us. Since there are many threats to our well-being, we will have to endure many tensions. Tensing only when there is adequate reason and to control our emotions before they jump out of hand is not easy to do. In fact there are few of us who can control our emotions to this extent.

Most persons go through many emotional upsets in their lives and have the capacity to bounce back after each one. Several factors influence our ability to recover: past influences (usually childhood experiences), an extreme situation (several tragic deaths in the family, etc.) and extreme fatigue.

Since occasional bouts of anxiety and tension are normal they need not be cause for additional concern. When these bouts become frequent and prolonged and the ability to recover is slowed, it is time to become watchful.

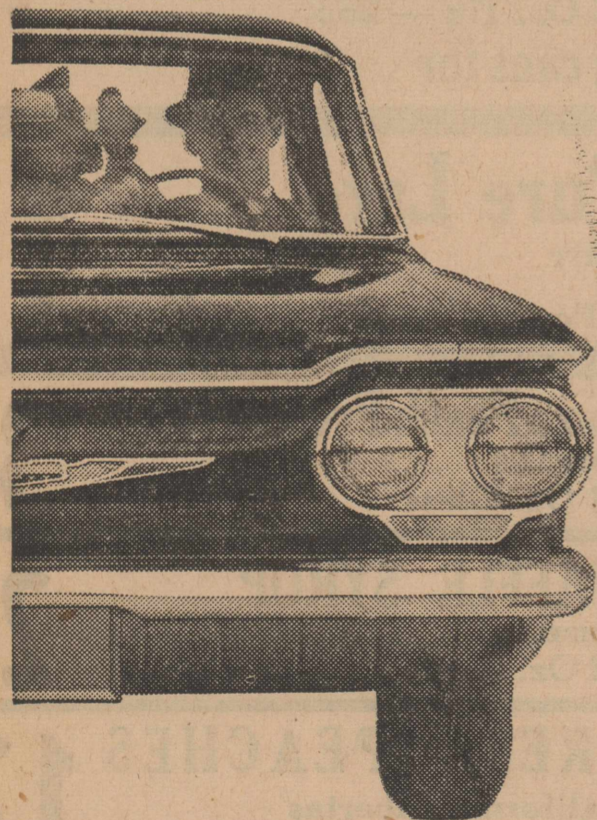

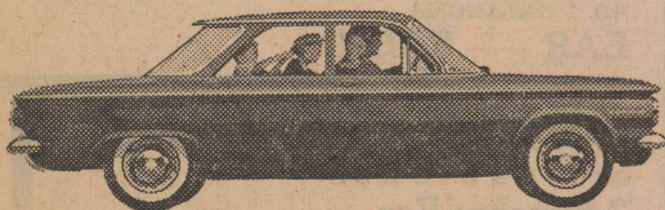

### Parents Urged To Order Birth Certificates

In September, 262,420 children are expected to enter the public school in Texas for the first time, according to estimates of the Texas Education Agency.

Estimates are based on births six years ago, immigration esti-

mates and projected birth-to-death ratios.

Nearly all public school districts in Texas require proof-of-age in the form of a birth certificate or a suitable certified copy stating that they are six years old on or before September 1.

During July and August, because of the increased demand for birth certificate copies, the Division of Vital Statistics of the Texas State Department of Health is one of the busiest places in Texas.

At the peak periods more than a thousand copies must be processed daily.

After the request is received with the correct information fee properly accounted, a card is prepared which serves as a record of the transaction and an aid in locating the original record.

A special searching crew, extra personnel are needed during peak periods, locates the original birth certificate from information furnished on the record card.

Unless there is a complication such as incorrect or incomplete information, searching takes a short while by using an index

### Agriculture Show Will Feature Use Of Chemicals

The Agriculture Show at the 1960 State Fair of Texas will have as its theme "better foods through the wise use of agricultural chemistry." The central exhibit will be the local point of the Agriculture Building and will show the different ways agricultural chemicals are used on modern farms and ranches.

It will show how chemicals are used as fertilizers to make plants more healthy and increase their yield, as fungicides to treat seeds and soil; as herbicides to kill weeds and other unwanted plants, as insecticides to safeguard stored crops, and in animal health and nutrition to assure healthy livestock.
