Volunteers will learn how to advocate for quality of care and life through for long term care residents.


All volunteers will receive liability insurance coverage; also, mileage reimbursement is available for anyone traveling from out of town for trainings.



I don't know why of all the pilgrims in Jerusalem, Simon of Cyrene would later be chosen to carry the cross of Christ.



Even though I may be a donkey myself at times, I can't claim any insight into their heads.
