Brucellosis Meeting Set For Monday

A meeting for all cattlemen included in the designated Type II Brucellosis area of Sherman, Dallam and Hartley counties will be held at the Junior High School in Dalhart Monday, September 19, at 7:30 p. m. The west half of Sherman County is included in the designated area.

The purpose of the meeting is to explain procedure for conducting tests of cattle for brucellosis in this area. Plans now call for testing of cattle to start the last week in September. Cattle included in the Type II area will be tested under the program.

The meeting will give participating cattlemen an opportunity to acquaint themselves with details of how testing will be done and what will be expected of cowmen in preparation for testing their herds.
