

Car Accident Takes 2 Lives

Luther Arnel Ford, 47, was killed instantly, and William F. Miller, 54, died Wednesday of injuries sustained Tuesday night when the car Ford was driving struck the concrete abutment of a bridge on U. S. 287 between the Cactus plant and the housing area. Highway patrolmen investigating the accident said the car in which the two men were riding struck the bridge almost head on.

The force of the impact threw the motor from the car and sheared off three concrete posts on the bridge. A portion of the bridge railing was fused to the right side of the car as a result of the impact.

Funeral services for L. A. Ford will be conducted at 10:00 a. m. Friday in the First Baptist Church of Stratford by Rev. M. E. Upchurch, pastor. Burial will be made at 4:00 p. m. in the cemetery at Lakeview, Texas.

Mr. Ford had been a resident of Stratford for six years and had been employed as a cook at Lola's Cafe. He and his wife and children moved to Stratford from Dumas.

Local Postal Receipts Climb To New High

A new all-time high in the nation's mail volume was reached during the fiscal year 1960 ended June 30, which continued the steady upward trend of the past seven years at a rate which even exceeds the population growth, according to advance information from the annual report of the Post Office Department which has been made available to Postmaster Sallie V. McAdams.

Although subject to last minute revisions, the year's total has been estimated as 63.6 billion pieces of mail which includes about one billion pieces of parcel post. It was stated that this would mean an increase of nearly 25 per cent over the corresponding figures for 1953 when the annual volume was 50.9 billion pieces.

During this same period, it was pointed out, the revenue of the Department also has shown an impressive gain with an increase from \$2,091,714,000 in fiscal year 1953 to \$3,276,800,000 for the fiscal year 1960.

Here in Stratford, receipts of the post office climbed from \$10,613.92 in 1953 to \$13,393.47 last year.

Agency Broadens Its Loan Program

Farmers who have regular off-farm employment, if otherwise eligible, may obtain farm operating and development loans from the Farmers Home Administration, under the recently revised regulations of the agency.

Lev O. Connor, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor for Dallam and Hartley counties, said the new regulation went into effect October 1. Previously, except in rural development counties, a farmer had to spend most of his time farming in order to qualify for a loan.

Experience gained in rural development counties has shown that many farmers who are regularly employed off the farm can profitably use the Farmers Home Administration's credit facilities to increase the farm portions of their total incomes. The regulation, which had limited credit assistance to farmers who spend most of their time farming, prevented some from obtaining the maximum income from their farms and from taking advantage of opportunities for industrial and other off-farm employment.

Other eligibility requirements remain unchanged. Applicants must have sufficient farm experience to carry on sound farm operations, must need credit, and be unable to obtain financial assistance from other sources. As in the past, credit will be extended only to operators of farms that are family-type size or smaller. No loan will be made unless a plan for the coming year's farming operations shows that income from the farm and other sources will be large enough to enable the farm family to have a reasonable standard of living, paying debts, and have an adequate reserve for emergencies.

Loan funds may be used to pay farm operating costs, purchase equipment and livestock, pay farm development costs and refinance certain debts. The interest rate is five percent. Repayment schedules depend upon the purposes for which funds are advanced and upon the estimated incomes from the farms. Usually, loans made for real estate purposes will be from funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency.

Technical farm and money management assistance is supplied to each borrower to the extent necessary.

The Farmers Home Administration office serving Dallam and Hartley counties is located in the Dallam County Library Building. The agency also supplies credit for farm housing and water conservation.

(Q) "I have four young children who eat everything. They are healthy but I often wonder what I would do if one ever suffered with a belly ache. Are there any rules you can suggest for such cases?"

Mrs. A. O. N.

(A) It is best to keep children with stomach aches at rest without solid foods. Check their temperature and don't give a laxative. You can usually wait a few hours to see if anything further will develop. If the pain passes and there is no fever, the child probably has nothing serious. But if the pain persists and especially if it seems worse in the lower right side of the abdomen, have the child checked by your doctor. Frequently there is also nausea, vomiting and loss of appetite.

Most important, remember not to give laxatives in any form or manner to a patient with abdominal pain. Laxatives may do more harm in such cases, especially if the pain is due to appendicitis.

(Q) "Is there any medication one can take to lose weight without dieting too?"

(A) There is no known medicine that can be taken safely to cause the loss of weight without limiting food and caloric intake.

(Q) "Is there any distinction between a malignant tumor and a cancer? Is a malignancy the same thing?"

L. S.

(A) These terms are synonymous.

(Q) "I heard it said that if you have a stomach ulcer you won't have gallbladder disease. Is this true?"

(A) No, since it is possible to have both illnesses together.
