

Hunters Find Skeleton In Cave

Floyd Brannan and Bill Trainham may have found the remains of a missing revenue agent who disappeared about 28 years ago on Sweetwater Mesa in New Mexico. They discovered the skeleton while hunting deer. Brannan picked up a large flat rock and tossed it over a sharp bluff in the hope of frightening deer out of the brush. When he looked into the crevice of a rock cave he had uncovered, he was perhaps more startled than the deer, for below him was the head of a skeleton of a man thought to have been about six feet tall.

Trainham went around a mound of rocks and had soon entered the rock cave into which Brannan was looking. There was the skeleton of a man. Every bone lay in place except the small finger and toe bones were missing as were all of the teeth.

There was no evidence that the man was wearing any clothing at the time he was placed in the cave. The only foreign object in the cave other than the bones was an old leather strap which appeared to have been part of a horse's bridle.

New Mexico officers were notified and investigated the scene. They sent off the skull for a laboratory examination, and expressed the belief that the bones might be the remains of a revenue agent who disappeared in that region about 28 years ago. Illegal stills were being operated in that part of the country at the time. The first revenue agent who attempted to find the still was killed. The second disappeared entirely, although his car and clothing were found.

Although officers went over the solid rock cave carefully they were unable to find any metal substances which might have been worn in the man's clothing.

Pack rats were credited with having carried away the small bones and the teeth of the man.

Following the accident the Colorado Springs man complained of pains about his chest and back.

Local officers identified the black angus killed in the crash as the property of Paul Adudell. A. C. Pittman of the C & E Paint & Body Shop said the car was a total loss.

County Has 259 Farms

Sherman County has 259 farms, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census.

There are 721,284 acres in the 259 farms. The average size farm is composed of 2,784.9 acres. The average value of a farm with its improvements is \$207,353.00.

Of the county's farm operators, 56 own their farms, 112 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 90 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators in the county was 47.9 years. There are 25 farm operators 65 or more years of age.

Of the 259 farms in the county, 236 were commercial farms.

State Capital Highlights

Added to the list of lively topics for the next Legislature is the carving out of a new Congressional district.

Final figures in the national census show Texas is entitled to a 23rd congressman. State's population rose 24.2 per cent, to 9,579,677, making it the sixth most populous state in the nation.

Even though population increase accounts for Texas' getting another representative to Congress, population will not be the sole consideration when lawmakers decide where to put the new district.

Population of Texas districts ranges widely, from about 227,000 to 614,000. It is highly unlikely that the legislature will undertake to rearrange the districts statewide so as to even out the differences. This would inconvenience too many incumbent congressmen, taking from their districts counties where they are popular and adding counties where they are unknown.

Nor is it expected that Dallas County, the state's most populous district, with 614,000, will get the extra congressman. Dallas now sends Texas' only Republican to Washington, and a Democratic legislature likely will not want to create an opportunity for another GOPer to be elected.

Texas' biggest congressional district — and the nation's biggest — area-wise, is the 16th, stretching all the way from Ozona to El Paso. But if El Paso, the only metropolitan area, were taken out, what was left would be short on population for a district.

After the 1950 census, the Legislature ducked for awhile the question of what to do with the extra congressman by having him serve "at large" (the whole state). Later Harris County (Houston) was given the extra congressman.

Oil Flow Upped
Texas Railroad Commission has set the December oil allowable at 2,819,379 barrels a day on a nine-day producing pattern.

For the past seven months the state has been limited to eight producing days.

Independent producers, most of whom have been strong for holding production to eight days in previous months, recommended nine for December.

Earlier, TIPRO (Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners) had asked the Commission to consider whether the sharp cut-back in Texas production during the past two years actually had improved the supply situation or enabled other producing areas to grab some of Texas' share of the market.

The pictures were inspired by the recent foliage tour sponsored by the Canadian Chamber of Commerce. Most of them were painted on the spot in the Lake Marvin and Canadian River breaks, during the tour a month ago.

Twelve pictures were selected by a jury of professionals for special awards. Paintings of Mrs. Martha Harrison and Mrs. Ruby Neal were two of the twelve chosen.

Fifth Alcohol Study Lesson Sunday Night

The fifth session of the study on alcohol will be held in the Stratford Methodist Church Sunday night at 7:00 p. m. Approximately half the hour will be spent dealing with the subject of alcohol and the churches. Views and beliefs of various churches will be presented, including those of the Assembly of God Church, the Lutheran Church of Texhoma, and the Roman Catholic Church. The opinions will be presented fairly, with no adverse criticism, in the interest of education, and each church's stand will be clearly stated. In regard to this phase of the study, the author of the next text has this to say:

"There is a tendency to regard any definite statement about the use of alcohol as an expression of bigotry. An insistence that one's church is right may imply that the other's church is wrong. An examination of the differences in belief may indicate in many instances that these differences arise from differing methods used in determining the right. Christians do not use the same methods in arriving at their ethical systems.

Differences in belief concerning alcohol are related to other differences. Beliefs about alcohol are not the most important of any church. It is conceded by all churches that control of alcohol should never be emphasized to the point that it is considered as the complete fulfillment of Christian duty.

The last thirty minutes of the hour will be used to view a film "How Long the Night" and discuss this film. It is the story of an alcoholic husband and a wife who searches for the cause and a remedy for his condition. The story is told through flash backs which presents the childhood and earlier years of the husband.

Taking part on this program will be O. L. McMinn, Rev. Raymond T. Dyess, C. W. Moon, Mrs. Bill Riffe, and Mrs. Al Hacker. Any person or persons interested are urged to attend, regardless of church affiliation, it was announced this week.

From Margaret V. Kritchgau, Scottsdale, Pa.: I remember in my youth when somebody died in our town that some church member hitched up his horse and drove through the town and countryside informing relatives and friends of the deceased. Telephones were unknown so death notices were pasted in the post-office window.

The "Ladies Aid Society" or some other church organization bathed, combed and dressed the corpse, then the undertaker took over.

After placing the corpse in the coffin the undertaker then hung a crepe on the door—cream white for the young, black for the aged.

Embalming was not practiced so it was necessary to preserve the face of the corpse. This was done by keeping it covered with a formaldehyde treated cloth which remained on only when friends were viewing the body.

On funeral day the house and porches were crowded with relatives and friends. Strangers came too, anxious to ride to the cemetery in the horse drawn cabs. A minister conducted the service and the church choir sang.

Sympathy was expressed not by sending flowers, but by sending food. A sheaf of wheat was placed upon the plain black coffin of the aged. White coffins were used for young folks. The hearses matched the coffins.

At the cemetery the corpse was lowered into the grave and clouds of earth were dropped upon the coffin as the minister solemnly intoned, "Dust to Dust," "Ashes to Ashes." Wailing relatives and friends furnished a wierd dirge. Later, friends chatted awhile then returned to the deceased's home where a sumptuous meal awaited them.

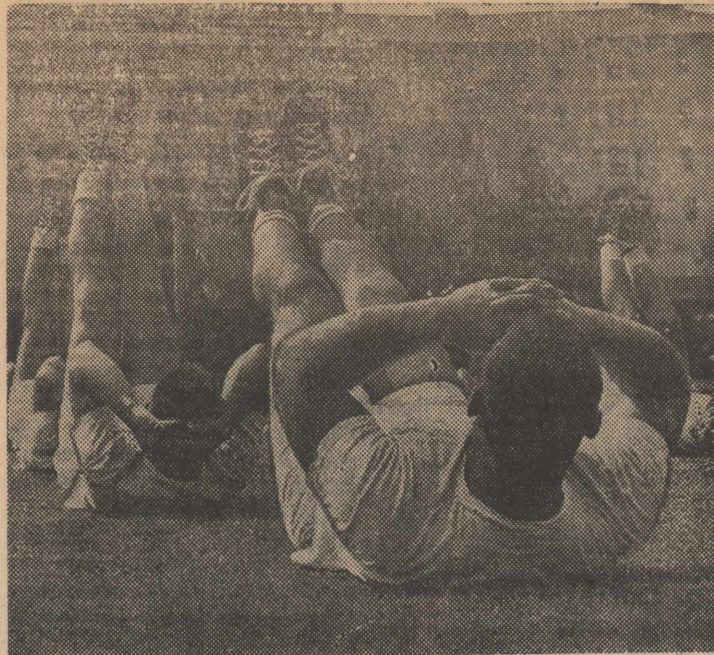
