Start Evaluation Of Stratford Grade School

Dr. Fred Stoker, professor of education at West Texas State College and advisor for the Stratford elementary school program met Wednesday night of last week with the elementary faculty members of the school. The purpose of the meeting was to begin a self evaluation of the Stratford Elementary School System.

Self evaluation of the Stratford Schools, through necessity, is divided into two categories. Grades one through six which compose the elementary school, will be evaluated by standards set by the Boston University School of Education for elementary schools. The secondary school will be evaluated by a different criteria developed by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. School administrators had hoped that the two programs could be started at the same time. However, material for the elementary school

It was reported that in Texas in 1959 there were 340,153 wrecks with 2,453 persons killed, 139,846 injured and an economic loss of \$381,781,000.000.

should provide for its students an adequate curriculum that will present a challenge to the individual student and will lead to personal growth and development, physical and mental health, cultural life and effective democratic citizenship in our changing society. The curriculum should be organized to prepare students for higher education to serve as a terminal basis for those students who do not desire to continue their education, and to serve the needs of the community."

This philosophy has been approved by the teachers of the secondary school, but will not be official until adopted by the administration and board of education.

Objectives are the means by which leaders hope to develop the philosophy of the Stratford Secondary School, and the committee feels that the following objectives will accomplish this purpose:

"To present courses in such a manner that it will challenge the students' initiative to a higher level. To offer courses that will lead to the personal growth and development of the student. To aid in physical and mental health through physical education, health service, and safety and sanitation measures in the school plant. To develop the cultural life of the students through the areas of arts and sciences. To teach by precept and example effective democratic citizenship in all courses. To prepare for higher education by presenting a curriculum acceptable to institutions of higher learning. To provide courses in specialized fields to meet the needs of those students who do not plan to attend college. To meet the needs of the community by offering special services and night classes when there is a demand."
