What To Do About Awkwardness

THE WEEK'S LETTER: I am a teenage boy and I have a problem. I am awkward. I always bump into things, spill things, trip over my own feet. My parents, particularly mother, fuss at me all the time about it. But I can't help it. I'm awkward and there isn't anything I can do about it. Or, is there?

OUR ANSWER: Sure there is. Open your eyes. Stop daydreaming and watch where you put your feet. You are probably awkward, it's true. But, worse than that, you are most likely care-

less. And, because you think you are awkward you have got it in your head that you have to be that way.

Some people, athletes for instance, have perfect coordination. They walk with grace and ease. Some people do have poor coordination, and they may be inclined toward clumsiness—but this does not mean they must go through life bowling things over and stumbling over their own feet.

Teenagers going through the "awkward" stage, just seem-

bent on charging through life, helter skelter. The problem is that they have a difficult time concentrating on what they are doing, whether it be eating, studying, working, or whatever. They go through the motions, but their thoughts are off somewhere in the wild blue yonder—thinking about a dance, a date, a movie—anything but what they are supposed to be doing at the moment.

For most, of course, it is a stage. But it can be an unpleasant one for the teenager who gets emotionally concerned about it and who fails to realize that no one can do two things at the same time. You can't eat and play at the same time; you can't study and play at the same time.

Learn to concentrate. Unless you are sitting down, relaxed, don't allow your thoughts to wander off somewhere. Think about what you are doing at the moment and remember that it's worth doing right if it is worth doing at all.

"BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of Ground Water Conservation District No. 2, North of the Canadian River:

II. Upon each of the ballots used at said election shall be placed the names of the candidates for Precinct Director to be elected as follows:

- Director's Precinct No. 4 — Territory within the District which is situated in each of the following county: Moore. Director's Precinct No. 5 — Territory within the District which is situated in each of the following county: Hartley.

III. Upon each of the ballots used at said election shall be placed the names of the candidates for County Committeemen to be elected for each county composing the District, as follows:

- Hansford County T. C. Harvey Dee Jackson Bernard Barnes E. V. Converse Hartley County Ray Cain Jack Thompson Gene Atkinson Hutchinson County Noble Watson Buster Kirk Jim Womble Moore County C. C. Burnett B. C. Shaw Herbert Clark Ochiltree County Dan Manning Roy Stollings A. L. Swink Sherman County Arlyn Halle Walter Lasley H. H. Caraway

IV. Blank spaces shall be left in order that the names of other persons may be written in. Each person (voter) residing in Directors Precincts Four (4) and Five (5), as set forth above, shall vote for only one Director, namely the Director for the District in which the voter resides. All voters may vote for the candidate of their choice by placing an "X" in the square beside the name or by scratching or marking out all other names in that race and leaving the name of such Director on the ballot. All voters desiring to cast a vote for a candidate whose name is not on the ballot may do so by writing the name of the person in the blank space provided on the ballot and by placing an "X" in the square beside the name, or by scratching or marking out all

other candidates appearing on the ballot for Precinct Director. Each person residing in the counties composing the District, as set forth above, shall vote for two (2) County Committeemen for the county in which the voter resides. Each person may vote for the candidates of his choice by placing an "X" in the square beside the name, or by scratching or marking out all other names in that race and leaving the name of the County Committeemen on the ballot. All persons desiring to cast a vote for a candidate whose name is not on the ballot, may do so by writing the name of that person in the blank space provided on the ballot and by placing an "X" in the square beside the name, or by scratching or marking out all but two candidates appearing or written in on the ballot.

V. The area comprising the District is hereby divided into the following election precincts, to include all or that part of the county designated which lies within the District, such election to be held at the polling places indicated and conducted by the following election officers:

## DON'T RUIN WIFE'S LIFE IF YOU GOOF IT AT 65

YOU have not said nearly enough yet about the inequality of the man and his wife when the man retires from his job.

"This, I am convinced, is the area of greatest unhappiness in most retirements.

"The inequality lies in the comparison of what the woman loses and what the man loses when he comes home with the pension. Primarily, the wife loses some of her peace and quiet. But the man loses his place in our modern society and what feeling of well-being that place gave him. Most important, he loses his daily companions.

"The wife has the same status the day after her husband retires that she had before. She also has the same friends around the same corner. But the man's companions, because of the nature of a man's business these days, are all back downtown and have no time to spare to be his companion in leisure."

"This man retired with a comfortable income in the manufacturing business and same home to a comfortable suburban split-level. He had no particular plans for his retirement, he says, because he figured he was a reasonably well-balanced individual and could find plenty of things to do.

"I guessed wrong," he continues, "and when I realized it, I didn't cry or start a crisis.

"Then I got to thinking I liked to fish, hunt, go on automobile trips, take color photos and play with boats. So I persuaded my wife to take off with me on a

three-month junket through the Northwest where I could play at most of these things.

"It was a good idea—for me. But what I had done was flip the inequality to the other side of the table.

This husband's next idea was to move to another city where he could obtain a job of reasonable importance with a firm that was hiring men over 65. He and his wife went to the other city to investigate and the man immediately realized that if his wife had to settle down in a new neighborhood while he went back to work, she would take on all of the inequality he had in coming home with his pension—the loss of status and the loss of companions.

"The solution in our case," he says, "was found by sitting down on the sofa, analyzing just what our problem was, and acting decisively to solve it.

"We sold our house and moved to a small town in the South where neither of us knew anybody and neither of us had anything to do.

"There are many who will disagree with my attitude and with what I have done, but my wife was not happy when I wasn't. In finding a way to better my own life, I made hers happier and I guaranteed a close companionship for the two of us."

This husband's ideas make a pretty theory. But what he actually accomplished was the destruction of the advantages each of them had.

### Wheat Outlook For 1961

The domestic supply of wheat for the marketing year July 1, 1960 to June 30, 1961 is estimated to be about 2,682 million bushels, another record, says John McHaney, extension agricultural economist. This large supply is the result of a carryover on July 1, 1960 of 1,313 million bushels, and a 1960 crop estimated to be about 1,362 bushels. Added to this will be about 7 million bushels of imports.

Domestic disappearance in the present marketing year 1960-61 will probably be about 610 million bushels, about the same as in 1959-60, McHaney continues. The expected slight decline in per capita consumption will be offset by the population increase, however. Seed and feed use of wheat will be about the same as last year.

Exports during the present marketing year will probably be higher than in 1959-60. About 525 million bushels will be exported as compared to 508 million exported last year. Government export programs, which will account for about two-thirds of the exports, will continue to play a major role in the movement of wheat abroad, the specialist points out. Less favor-

able crop conditions in Europe, however, will also aid U. S. exports.

The 1959-60 price to U. S. farmers average \$1.76 about 5¢ above the average support rate after allowing for storage charges. The price in 1960-61 is expected to again average above the effective support, storage deducted. This is mainly because large quantities of wheat continue to be placed under the price support program, explains McHaney. The support rate for the 1960 crop is \$1.78 as compared to \$1.81 for a year earlier.

With minimum allotments in effect for 1961, it is estimated that about 53 million acres will be harvested. If average yields are obtained, a crop of about 1,235 million bushels would be produced, the economist continues. A 1961 crop of this size would be about 9 percent below the 1,362 million indicated for 1960, but 13 percent above the 1950-59 average. Assuming that domestic disappearance and exports are the same as that estimated for 1960-61, the carryover on July 1, 1962 may be increased about 100 million bushels. The minimum national average support price for the 1961 crop wheat is \$1.78 per bushel, the same as the 1960 average support price, McHaney concludes.

The whole eye is not used as a transplant, as suggested above. As yet this isn't possible. However, the cornea (clear part or window of eye) can be transplanted successfully to persons with scarred corneas. Scarring is usually due to eye disease, injuries or chemical burns. These are the patients waiting for persons to will their eyes. Just imagine the joy of such people able to see again!

Research, the other major use of donated eyes, is also important and hardly needs explaining. Through it many eye diseases will eventually be controlled and much blindness averted. In particular, research into glaucoma will give us ways and means to battle this major cause of blindness.

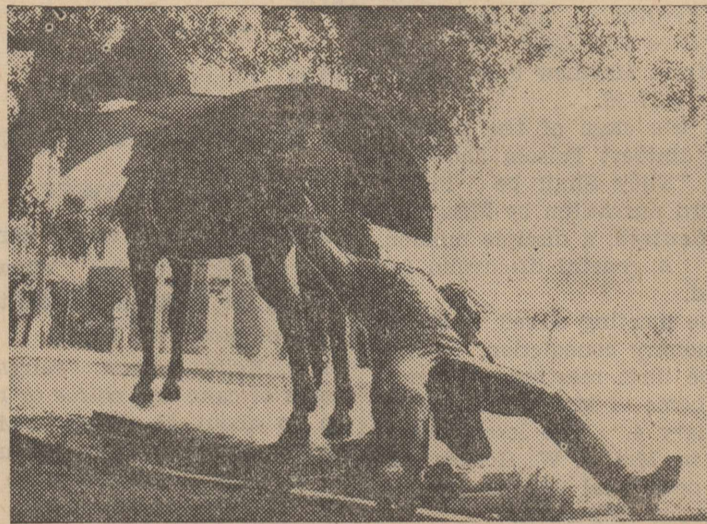

The students have shown unusual response and enthusiasm regarding debates and panel discussions on slavery, democracy vs. communism, segregation and capitol punishment.

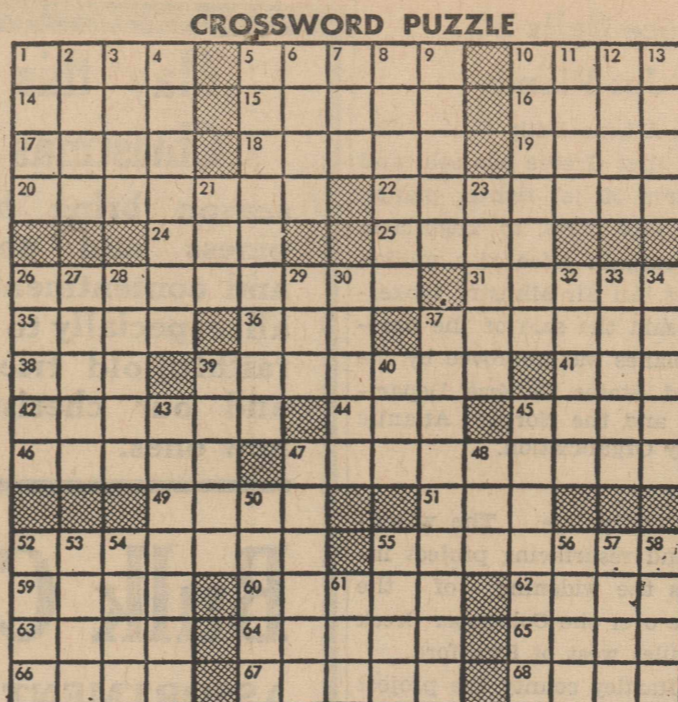

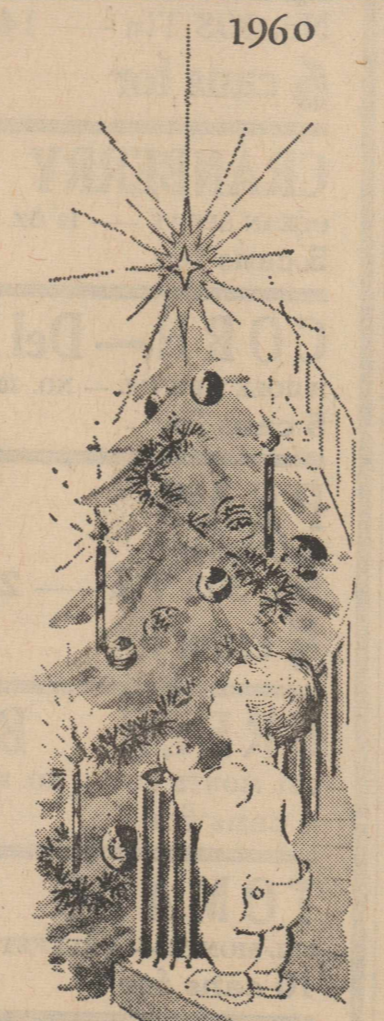

### U. S. Highway 54 To Be Widened From Stratford West To Dallam Line

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$351,000 for highway safety and betterment in Sherman and Hartley counties during 1961, according to an announcement made by Charles W. Smith, district highway engineer of Amarillo. The improvement program will include 6.1 miles of road.

U. S. Highway 54 will be widened from Stratford to the Dal-

### Greece Sells 50 Old Jet Planes

The Athens Daily Post discloses that Greece has sold and delivered 50 jet fighter planes, plus spare parts, to Yugoslavia at a bargain price of a million dollars. An Air Ministry spokesman said the sale of the obsolete planes was approved by the United States Defense Department and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

lam County line. The widening and resurfacing project includes the widening of the bridge over the Coldwater Creek 1½ miles west of Stratford.

In Hartley county the project includes widening of bridges across Cramers Creek, Punta De Aqua Creek and Rita Blanca Creek on U. S. Highway 54, 10.8 miles and 11.3 miles northeast of the New Mexico state line and 1 mile west of Dalhart.

The work will be under the supervision of H. L. Gallegly, senior resident engineer of Dalhart.

This work is part of two statewide "highway housekeeping" programs revealed today by the Texas Highway Department. Totaling \$40 million, the programs are keyed to safety features and proper upkeep of the State's highway systems.

The two safety-and-betterment programs will be evenly divided financially throughout the State with \$20 million to be spent on the U. S. and State Highway Systems and \$20 million earmarked for the Farm-Ranch-to-Market Road System.

The 1,075 items involved in the two programs, covering a total of 224 counties, will all be done during the next calendar year. A total of 2,799 miles of U. S. and State Highways and 3,686 miles of Farm-to-Market Roads are included in the work list. Highways are due for improvements such as surface widening, bridge widening and replacement, base strengthening, and paving of shoulders.

District Engineer Charles W. Smith said a total of approximately 430 miles in this Highway District would be involved, at a total cost of \$1,695,000. Of this total approximately 380 miles, at a cost of \$494,000, will be assigned later to all counties in the Panhandle District for the rehabilitation of the asphalt surface on U. S., State and Farm-to-Market Roads that are showing deterioration after winter snows.

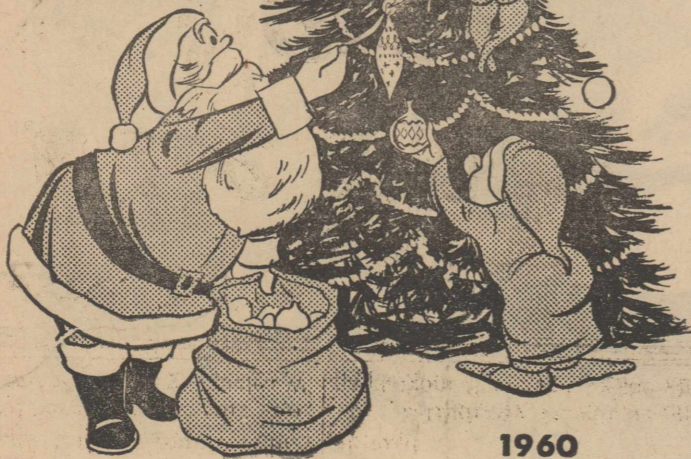
