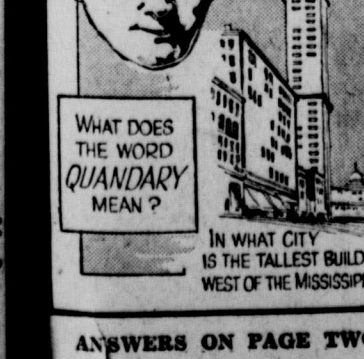

Home Rule for Counties Most Complicated Amendment for Texans in Coming Election

By GORDON K. SHEARER, United Press Staff Correspondent. AUSTIN, Aug. 4 — Most complicated of all the constitutional amendments upon which Texans will vote August 26 is the one authorizing a system of home rule charters for counties.

A home rule charter is one that is drafted and adopted by the local voters as distinguished from the rules for local government specified by the state legislature.

The amendment to be voted on extends this home rule privilege only to counties of 62,000 or more population. There is also provision that the privilege may be extended to a county of less population by two-thirds vote of the state legislature.

A small county seeking such a special legislative charter must give notice by publication in a county newspaper once a week for four weeks.

The counties over 62,000 seeking to adopt a home rule charter, if the amendment carries, may call elections. In such elections it is required that returns from each incorporated city and town in the county shall be kept separately. The votes cast in parts of the county outside incorporated cities and towns will also be kept separately. To adopt a charter it will be necessary for the proposal to have received a majority vote both of voters outside of cities and towns and a majority of the votes in the cities and towns, counted collectively.

New Governing Body

The new charter may continue county government through a county commissioners' court, as at present, or it may call for a different governing body, but the members must be elective. Their terms may run six years.

Such a governing body may change the compensation of the county judge and peace justices from the fee system to a salary plan and they may make the peace justices appointive. They can also limit the duties of the district or county attorney to representing the state and enforcing the penal code and put them on a salary basis. They can consolidate or abolish other offices of only county-wide extent, fix the tenure and compensation and otherwise regulate them. The legislature inserted a provision that new charters may not affect the pay of members of the legislature.

While officers may be put on a salary plan the fee system can also be continued. In such cases the fees would go into the county treasury instead of the official. The county could fix the fees except that no fee could be set in excess of that fixed by general law for the same service.

Possible transfer of separate city and town government to the central governing body is one of the important features of the amendment.

Second Revolt of Nazis Is Foreseen

BERLIN, Aug. 4 — One of the dangers of the Hitlerite revolution has been the possibility of its drifting toward radical anti-capitalist ideas.

Of late this danger has become acute. Ever more frequently, predictions have been made of the advent of a "second" Nazi revolution, which only could mean a swing toward radicalism with purely socialist, or even bolshevist, tendencies.

The danger that events might take such a turn lies in the very make-up of the national-socialist party as it stands at present. In the beginning the party embraced a comparatively small proportion of the country's industrial population.

Since the summer of 1932, however, this has been changed fundamentally. In the three general elections held since that time, the Nazis have made heavy inroads on the constituencies, of both the socialists and the communists. During that period the socialists lost 800,000 and the communists lost 500,000 voters.

To assume that these former socialists and communists had jumped aboard the Nazi band wagon would be erroneous. There is no doubt that many of them joined from conviction. But in joining the

Hitler party, only a few of these industrial workers thought of giving up their old ideas. They merely deserted from parties which, in their opinion, had failed to stand up for the interest of the working classes.

OLD LEGEND OF GOLD REVIVED IN CALIFORNIA

BRIDGEPORT, Cal., Aug. 4 — A legend of gold based on the tragedies of a Mexican and a Scotchman, is one of the tales told in isolated Mono county of the high Sierra section.

The story had origin in 1879, when a carefree Mexican rider for Jesso Summers, was herding cattle near here. Returning to the ranch, the Mexican tossed a piece of rock to George Pettigrew, a Scotchman of the Summers cowboy band.

There was a strong friendship between the two. Old-timers say that Pettigrew was overjoyed when the Mexican told him he was to be his partner and that they would go out to stake a joint claim on the spot where he had found the rock the next Sunday.

The Scotchman's claim was well founded, for it was discovered that the rock assayed half gold.

But fate took a hand. Rancher Summers ordered the Mexican to accompany a drive of beef cattle to the boom town of Bodie. Hardly had the cattle been disposed of when the Mexican went to one of the gayest establishments. Gambling was in full sway. Drinks flowed.

The stage was set for something to happen. He became embroiled with another Mexican. Knives flashed. The young Mexican fell mortally wounded to the floor. He died without disclosing the secret of his gold lode.

George Pettigrew kept the gold-laden stone for many years. Frequently he searched for a clue to the Mexican's treasure. Pettigrew died, without success. Modern gold seekers also have been unsuccessful.
