

The amendment is permissive and not mandatory. It is similar to the city home rule statute under which the city of Cisco adopted its municipal charter. In the case of county home rule, it was necessary to seek a constitutional amendment in order to overcome certain constitutional inhibitions which stand in the way of consolidations of some county offices and departments, abolition of the fee system and other reforms which the county home rule amendment seeks to make possible for those counties which desire to reorganize money for such improvements. The legislature is forbidden to grant money for such improvements. Kelley Hall at the Field Museum of their governments along lines of greater economy and efficiency as well as to meet the peculiar needs of those counties. All the room in the world, consistent with state sovereignty, is allowed counties to reorganize under the proposed amendment. No specific form of government is required. THE LEGISLATIVE INTENT.

In court trials much is made of the legal fiction of "leg islative intent." The story is told of a lobyist trying a case who answered the argument of legislative intent by saying 'I ought to know something about it; I wrote the bill."

In future arguments over the legislative intent in such statutes as will be passed in September to adjust Texas law to the spirit of the various industry codes, as to anti-trust regulation, we may have to go to Washington to find out the Texas legislative intent.

The severely efficient Gen. Johnson, head of the national recovery administration, has sent to Texas a mimeographed copy of a general bill that would be acceptable to the national government. He was careful to point out that the legislature had authority to use it in such way as it chose, either as the basis for a state law, or as the exact law.

Copy of a mimeographed letter also was sent the Texas rovernor, saying the model draft embodied practically what the federal government believes necessary by state enact-

This is very convenient. The advantage of substantial uniformity in the various state acts is on the side of the product of the Washington bill-factory.

Not all the Texas lawmakers may see the question just as Washington does. But in the form of this request for legislation, nothing prevents the shaping of the model draft to meet the particular questions at stake in Texas, or the defined attitude of the state government.

THE SEMI-LUXURY PRINCIPLE.

Rep. Sam S. Duvall, a member of the revenue and taxation committee of the Texas legislature, has declared his belief that it will be impossible in September to enact a sales tax bill that puts a burden on the buying of food and clothes by the people of small or average income.

Instead of a general retail sales tax, Rep. Duvall has stated that if any revenue bill is passed, probably only the semi-luxury type of bill can be put through.

By this, he said he means a tax law exempting a base range of the price of all articles, and the levy of a retail sales tax on the amount above the base exemption; thus in effect making the tax only on the higher-priced goods. He believes exemptions must be liberal, or possibly total, on all staple foods, and relatively liberal on wearing apparel.

This, he has pointed out, is far milder than either the rvramided sales tax originally advocated in the legislaturewhich would have reached between 5 and 6 per cent-or the universal retail tax on every necessity of life.

People pay better than a 50 per cent sales tax on gasoline and ride just as far as without it, Rep. Duvall conceded but at the same time he predicted that the legislature will extend the sales levy only in a sparing way, at comparatively low rates, and only on the semi-luxury and luxury range of prices, if a tax bill is voted through the September session.






