

JUDGE UPHOLDS FARM ACT.

The chief justice of the supreme court of the District of Columbia has dismissed the suit of two Chicago milk dealers for an injunction restraining Sec'y of Agriculture Wallace from enforcing terms of a milk retailer's code. The plaintiffs based their plea upon argument that the agricultural adjustment act, authority for the milk agreement, is unconstitu-

Said Justice O'Donoghue:

'A national emergency exists and the welfare of the people is at stake."

This is the second instance in which a phase of the Roosevelt emergency recovery program has stood the judicial test in a District of Columbia court. In both instances the issue of constitutionality was subordinated, the court holding that the state of national emergency declared by congress to exist was the superior consideration in the light of which recovery legislation must be judged. Self-preservation, observed the preceding opinion, would appear to be the first law of a nation as well of an individual.

Recently an Austin student of government remarked that the courts would uphold the legality of the industrial recovery act. He cited reasons similar to the opinions handed down by the District of Columbia judges. At another time and under other conditions the opinions of the justices might have been different. But circumstances alter cases. And who shall say that it is not a tribute to the wisdom and the integrity of the courts, that they have judged the letter by the time.

unconstitutional simply because the judicial opinions so far expressed have ignored the issue. On the contrary one should appreciate the determination of the particular section of the bench thus far heard from to view the "welfare of the people" as involved in the emergency which is recognized to exist as the supreme issue and to answer the question of legality or illegality of recovery legislation from that standpoint. In other words another judicial predicate is laid down, to the effect that the issue of recovery is of more vital consequence to the American nation than the question of the literal constitutionality of the acts which tend to further

Final determination of the issue rests with the supreme court of the United States. But by the time it reaches that court of the United States. If there should be, indeed, it will probably make little difference whether or not the NIRA and kindred legislation is constitutional.




