LAY-OFF PLAN **ADOPTED FOR** FORD PLANTS

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 4 - Employes of the Ford Motor company will be laid off one week each in rotation, in order to bring their average working weeks over a threemonths period to 35 hours, the Ford company announced today.

While Ford officials would not comment on the point, it was understood wages were to be paid only for the 35-hour week average. Previously the men had been working on a 40-hour week average. Ford officials insisted their action

was based on a desire to comply explicitly with the NRA code and some bservers saw no new conflict in it between Ford and the recovery administration. But others interpret-ed a remark of a Ford official in connection with the announcement of the plan that the NRA embodies "prohibition against work," as at least emphasizing the disagreement between Ford and the administrators of the recovery act.

Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt opened the campaign under the auspices of the 1933 mobilization for human needs and City. A foreign court has vindicated Texas has not been overlooked by generous contributions by "the well-to-do Americans in particular." In her foreword she said it was the job of the well-to-do ones to help Uncle Sam to take care of the needy unemployed. Newton D. Baker is the head of the nationwide organization. "The more work you put on government the more taxes go up. declared the wife of the chief magistrate. Mrs. Roosevelt declared it the duty of the women of America to educate the people into the importance of relief needs, a job they are especially fitted for." 





late Col. Charles L. Frost and go the contract to build the first tele-graph line from Fort Worth to Dallas. The two controlled and operated the line until the T. & P. was extended to Fort Worth in 1876 and bought the telegraph.

Thereafter, Mr. Elser built under

contract some 1,500 miles of telegraph lines in the virgin territory of Louisiana, North and West Texas He built lines from Fort Worth to El Paso, to Shreveport and to New Orleans for the T. & P. He constructed the line from Greenville to McKinney for the Missouri-Kansas-Texas and from Fort Worth to Wichita Falls for the Fort Worth and Denver City railway.

Pan Electric Venture.

When citizens of Fort Worth and Cleburne decided to build themselves a telegraph line, he linked the two cities by wire in 1870. Together with John Peter Smith and a handful of other early day business men in Fort Worth, he built up the illfated Pan Electric telegraph system connecting Fort Worth. Dallas, Denison and Abilene. The supreme court held that the company infringed on Bell patents and the

company went out of business. One of the original directors of the Fort Worth and Denver City railway, Mr. Elser also was one of the first cashiers of the old City National bank of Fort Worth. held the post from 1887 to 1895. He held the office of alderman in the 'eighties" and was city treasurer for two terms in the early "nine-

Well Near Putnam.

For the last 35 years of his life, he was interested principally in the development of Texas' mineral resources. He drilled an oil well near Putnam in Callahan county in 1900 —said to be the first drilling west of Thurber. Although the acreage is now dotted with shallow producing wells, Mr. Elser's test well was

Mrs. Hardy, at whose home Mr. Elser died, is his daughter by his first wife, who was Miss Inez Harding of New York. She died in 1879. By his second wife, the late Mrs. Lilly Loving Elser, he had two sons, Frank Bell Elser, author and playwright, and Maximilian Elser, Jr., newspaper man, both living in New York City.

His second wife was the widow of Gen. J. J. Byrne, who was killed by Indians near El Paso. She had come to Fort Worth to live with her mother, Mrs. Mary Davis Loving, and her two sisters, when she met Mr. Elser. They were married in




