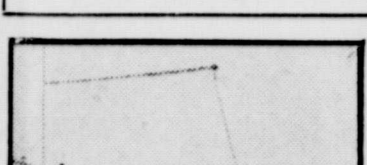

#### Moscow Center of Activity

## SISTER MARY'S RECIPES

DRIED fruit of any variety is an ever-present help when economy must be given first consideration in planning meals. Adequate nourishment at a minimum cost as well as increasing palatableness is supplied by the clever use of raisins, dates, prunes, figs, apricots and the rest of the dried fruit family.

Raisins especially are easy to use because they require no preliminary soaking for several hours as do most of the other dried fruits. Because they are an excellent source of natural sugar, their sweetness decreases the amount of sugar usually called for in a recipe. They add much to the palatability of many dishes and furnish iron to a high degree. Their caloric value, being almost 100 calories per ounce, is also important. One-fourth cup of raisins weighs 1.1 ounces and supplies 3 calories of protein, 9 of fat and 88 of carbohydrates.

**Heighten Flavor of Beets**  
Most of us use raisins and dates in puddings and cakes but you know that hot boiled beets gain interest and provide extra nourishment if served with a sauce to which raisins have been added? The small seedless raisins are delicious in either a lemon or orange sauce.

The flavor of hamburger steak is greatly improved by the addition of a few raisins. Chop raisins finely and work well with meat. Although the protein content of raisins is much lower than that of beef, their iron content compares favorably and they are inexpensive and highly nutritious.

Other meats beside beef are made more appetizing if combined with raisins. Raisin sauce with ham is traditional but seeded or seedless raisins can be sprinkled over the ham while baking with excellent effect. Hot boiled tongue

with raisin sauce, baked stuffed heart with raisin sauce, braised liver with raisin sauce—these are inexpensive and worthwhile meat dishes that owe much of their popularity to the sauce.

**Add Iron to Puddings**  
Bread puddings and rice puddings become a means of adding iron to the diet when raisins or dates are included in their composition.

Many salads are made more appetizing and nourishing by the addition of dried fruits. Raisins added to raw vegetable salads or fruit salads increase their food value. Prunes are good with a cabbage salad and are often combined with cream or cottage cheese and nuts. Dates make a delicate salad stuffed with cream cheese and served with a French dressing made with orange juice.

The sandwich fillings made with dried fruits are numerous, limited only by the cook's ingenuity.

The next time you serve rice in place of potatoes, try this raisin sauce.  
**Raisin Sauce**  
One cup white sauce, 1-2 cup grated cheese, 1-2 cup seeded raisins.  
Add cheese to hot white sauce and when melted add raisins. Keep hot over hot water if not served at once.

## BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—Although it resembles a small skiff trying to carry the cargo tonnage of a huge freighter, the National Labor Board proceeds steadily as an instrument for the unionization of labor.

Its small staff operates in a madhouse reminiscent of NRA itself in earlier days. Senator Robert Wagner, the chairman, is fagged badly. To deal with the epidemic of strikes, a score or more regional boards are being appointed rapidly—a national network of mediatory machinery to have primary jurisdiction over labor disputes. Each board is being organized like the N.L.B., with six to 10 members equally representing industry and labor, plus an impartial chairman.

In practice, the N.L.B. has been an enforcement agency for the collective bargaining and employee representation clauses of the recovery act. When disputes over union recognition arise, it asks for free employee elections. In only a very few small mills have workers voted nonunion.

THEY tell this story to illustrate the cautious training instincts of the forthright Maxim Litvinov, who soon will be here to discuss Russian recognition with President Roosevelt.

At Riga in 1921 he was negotiating entry of an American relief expedition to Russia. The Soviet still suspicious and fearful of interventions, said American representatives must bring in

no weapons. Litvinov was told they would bring only food. "Well," he exclaimed, "but food is a weapon."

This conference will be held under more pleasant auspices. THE chief trouble about guaranteeing farmers their cost of production is the difficulty of ascertaining costs, which is partly due to the great variability on different farms.

The Department of Agriculture experts have figured that the average cost of producing a bushel of wheat last year was 72 cents, a bushel of corn about 34 cents, and a pound of cotton around nine cents.

President John Simpson of the Farmers' Union says the cost of producing a bushel of wheat is \$1.50 and the Farm Holiday Association demands put it at \$1.35, with other costs varying in proportion.

All those figures ignore differences in efficiency and other factors. The farmer with 100 acres, for instance, can raise cheaper wheat per bushel than the farmer with 10 acres.

Averages don't mean much. If the average cost were used in a guarantee plan, hundreds of thousands of farmers still would receive less than their production cost.

Worst of all, according to officials, farmers demanding production cost are unwilling to tie the scheme up with any plan for production control.
