

AUTHORITY TO REPORTS

One suggestion offered for the suppression of kidnaping by the hero of a motion picture drama—and it was a good picture—was that the newspapers assist the law enforcement officers by omitting to print the amount of the ransom obtained by the kidnapers. The theory was that there would be no published large figures to fire the criminal avarice of the potential kidnaper and he would, therefore, be less tempted to engage in that nefarious trade.

The suggestion, contained in a make-believe as it was, rather well illustrates a common fallacy of the public mind concerning newspapers. If it were true that merely omitting some information from the printed page would suffice to keep that information confidential, there would never have arisen a need for the newspaper or the regular journal of news. But, as the progress of any sensational or near-sensational street rumor will prove, such is not the case. The public cannot keep a secret. Nor can rumor preserve facts he tendency to exaggerate, a result, perhaps, of the innate human urge to create, invariably results in distorted reports of an incident within a few months of its origin. Every newspaperman can relate numerous cases within a hint, forecast or suggestion carelessly dropped in his presence—perhaps even by himself—returned later in violent and positive proportions. It is easy to imagine what proportions certain opening move of a historic attempt nationwide next year for the elecnews events and trends would assume were the facts dependent upon rumor for dissemination. It is easy, because one merely has to allow ones imagination to roam. That is the

news as it exists to give authority to factual reports. The modern journal has added to itself numerous functions, including entertainment features, etc., but its primary responsibility to the community is to provide that community with a medium of news reports and advertisement of goods and service which has authority. The printed columns of the newspaper are evidence that behind the report there is a known organization which assumes the responsibilfor the accuracy of the account; which, indeed, is staking its existence and success upon providing news without distortion, "keeping the record straight," so to speak.

Merely keeping an item of a newspaper will not keep it out of circulation. It may delay it a while. But putting it accurately in a newspaper will serve all concerned with equity and prevent the injustices that invariably arise in mouthto-mouth transmission. 


