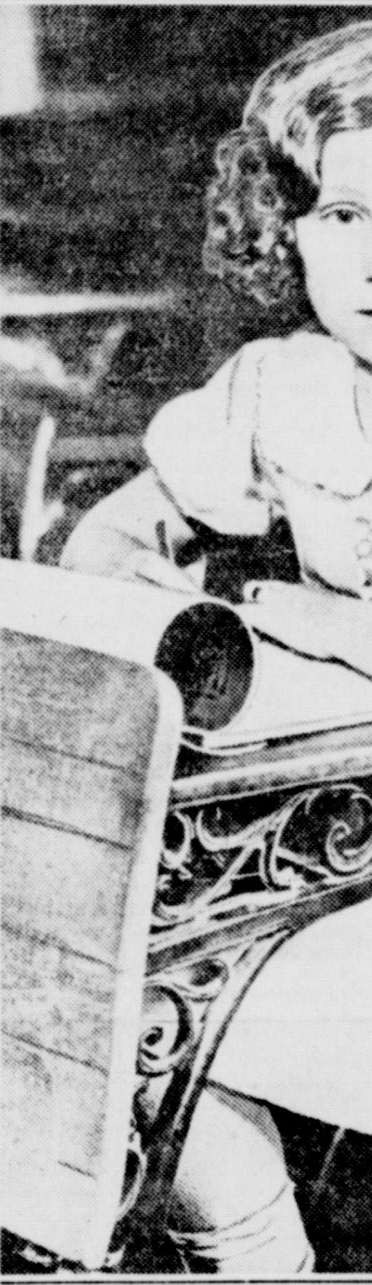
NRA Moves to Take Care of Defectives

PRICE-FIXING POSTPONED

Postponement of the effective date of the price-fixing order for the petroleum industry has been announced by Sec'y of Interior Ickes, who is the czar of the oil administration.

The extension of time, so the announcement says, was granted as a concession to opponents of the price-fixing scheme who had suggested the postponement so that a fair test might be given to the effect of production control.

Higher oil prices, commensurate with the economic levels about the oil industry, are the aim of the administration. If that object can be reached without fiat price stabilization, so much the better.

GOLD ORDER WINS A FAVORABLE DECISION.

Federal Judge John W. Woolsey of New York has ruled that technically the executive order of Aug. 28 directing gold holders to turn their gold over to the federal reserve banks was invalid in that it exceeded the authority given by congress.

REALIGNMENT OF GOVERNMENT ACTIVITIES.

President Roosevelt is facing another problem. He is concerned about the multiplicity of government boards, committees and agencies and is drafting a program which will undertake to simplify and consolidate this nation-wide machinery.

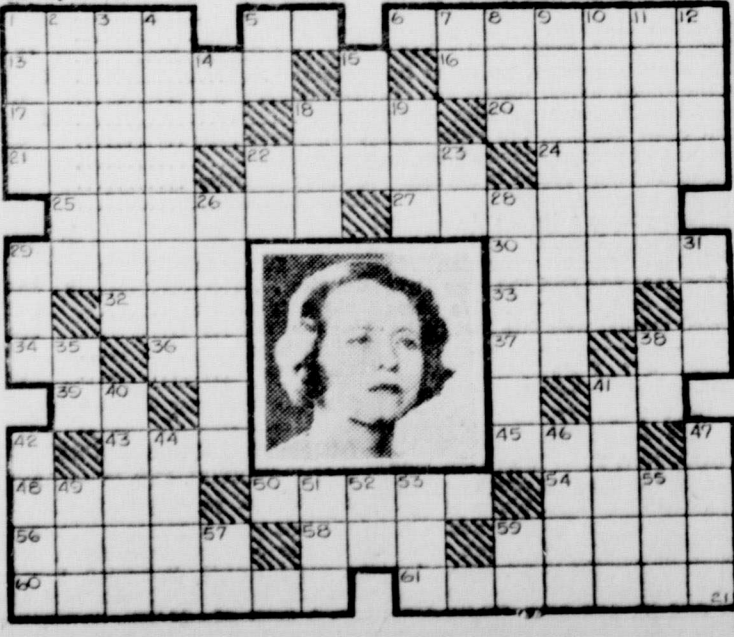

ARCHITECTS TIE UP MONUMENT FUND IN FRANCE

PARIS, Nov. 21 — The battle monuments commission of the United States government in France is quietly winding up its affairs with its work unfinished.

Glorification of the World war doughboy through erection of memorials in Flanders and elsewhere never will be completed, it was indicated by the discovery that the funds of the commission, of which General John J. Pershing is chairman, have been attached by French architects.

A near-diplomatic incident, which the parties involved succeeded in keeping under cover for many months, resulted from the architects' action.

The architects charge that the commission, under direction of its secretary and acting supervisor here Major Xenophon H. Price, deliberately set out to defraud them of their rightful gains.

General Pershing declined to comment, but the commission, in a statement through the American Embassy, denied most of the architects' claims.

Officials of the Quai d'Orsay, however, admitted having had conversations about the matter with the embassy. Court records show the battle monuments commission's funds were attached June 16, 1932.

Sums totaling 5,000,000 francs are involved, according to the French architects. This is denied by the commission. The board's account was attached by the firm of Lahalle & Levard. The claim, admitted by the first chamber of the Seine tribunal, was for \$10,000.

Lahalle's lead was followed by several other architects, including Maurice Noyer and Maxine Rateau.

Embassy's Statement

The statement issued at the embassy said:

The total amount in dispute with all contractors who have done work for the commission is very small — less than 500,000 francs. The commission has no knowledge that Mr. Rateau has taken any differences
