PRICE-FIXING POSTPONED

Postponement of the effective date of the price-fixing order for the petroleum industry has been announced by Sec'y of Interior Ickes, who is the czar of the oil administration. In announcing postponement of the date from December 1 to January 1, the oil administrator made it clear that the way has been left open for further extensions of the effective period as might be determined needful or wise in the light of

The extension of time, so the announcement says, was granted as a concession to opponents of the price-fixing cheme who had suggested the postponement so that a fair test might be given to the effect of production control. GIFFORD PINCHOT HAS

Gov. Gifford Pinchot of Pennsylvania is a lifelong dry. He has asked the Pennsylvania legislature in special session to control the sale of hquor through state operated stores and to apply the profits to unemployment relief, emergency aids to schools and old age pensions. Pinchot has estimated that a tax of \$2 a gallon on all liquor manufactured and in storage before national prohibition repeal would bring in immediately \$25,000,000 and that a tax of \$1 on each gallon made after repeal would give the state of Pennsylvania \$25,000,000 annually. In his message to the legislature this life long dry, who is said to have cast his ballot for Roosevelt and Garner in 1932, bluntly asked his legislature to let political considerations to hang and join with me in a single mignty effort to save the common-He recommended the enactment of a liquor control law designed "to prohibit forever the open saioon, as well as to prohibit bars and make it unlawful to display mixed drinks in public dining

His proposed law would permit the sale of liquors in unlimited quantities at wholesale to bona fide hotels and restaurants and clubs. All other sales would be at retail. No liquor would be consumed on state premises. License fees for hotels, restaurants and clubs would be double those charged in the present beer law of Pennsylvania, which ranged from \$150 to \$300 a year, and would go to local municipalities. No liquor could be sold to minors, intoxicated persons, habitual drunkards or insane persons. 





The roasting of the coffee berry brings out the flavor and makes the berry brittle enough to grind. There are several different degrees of roasts—heavy or dark, light, medium. Italian and French. As might be expected the degree of roasting affects the flavor and color of the beverage.

Grinding is done so that all the possible flavor can be drawn into the finished cup of coffee. There are several grinds, too. The grind chosen, is of course, determined by the method of making the beverage.

Od. both coffee and water must be measured accurately and the boiling or percolating stopped at the proper time. The drip and filter methods require only the precaution of keeping the beverage hot until ready to serve.

Another important point in coffee making is the necessity of serving coffee as soon as possible after it is made. The longer it is hot the more flavor it loses.


