The opportunity is offered in a variation between state constitu-tional prohibition and the state's prohibition law known as the "Dean law.' The constitution prohibits only manufacture and sale and gives further regulation to the legislature. The Dean law prohibits possession and transportation.

Ass't Attorney-general Hooper has been asked by liberal legislators for consideration of amendments to the Dean act which will permit transportation of liquor into Texas by regular agencies such as rail and motor lines.

LONG PROTESTS MOORE APPOINTMENT

Daniel D. Moore of New Orleans was named by the president to be collector of internal revenue in Louisiana. Kingfish Long is offering strenuous opposition to the confirmation of Moore. The Kingfish declared that Moore is "personally obnoxious to him.

Moore is not "personally obnoxious" to Sen. Tom Connally. Connally is a member of the senate finance committee before which the Moore nomination is pending. Connally conducted a recent investigation into the Broussard-Overton so-called political scandal in Louisiana. This is what the unior senator from Texas said to Washington correspondents: "From my knowledge of political affairs in Louisiana I want to say that unless there is something more against Moore than that he is 'personally obnoxious' to Sen. Long I will most certainly vote to confirm the appointment. President Roosevelt and his administration ought not to be hindered in making appointments in Louisiana because they do not suit Sen. Long."

A sub-committee of the senate finance committee will handle the Moore case. It is composed of Sen. Alvan Barkley of Kentucky and Sen. Harry Byrd of Virginia. David A. Reed of Pennsylvania is the republican member of the subommittee. This trio will investigate Kingfish Long's charges against the choice of the president for collector of internal revenue in the district of Louisiana.

David D. Moore is one of the outstanding newspapermen of New Orleans and Louisiana. He is a native Texan. In his youth he became a practical printer and studied the game while walking the treadmill of a weekly newspaper. He w. Winningham, Mexia, is busily moved on to New Orleans. He became a ready and forceful engaged in organizing an anti-sales writer. For years and years he was a high executive either tax bloc for the expected second as publisher or editor of leading daily newspapers of the Creole city. After an absence he returned to Texas. This when Col. William Randolph Hearst became the owner of the old Fort Worth Record. Hearst named Moore as his executive representative of the Fort Worth morning newspaper. Then the Record changed ownership again. Moore returned to New Orleans and again identified himself with a leading daily newspaper which never did take kindly to the political practices or methods of the Kingfish who came from the bills of Louisiana.
