Four Deep Wells to Be Drilled in Territory North of Cisco

THREE HOLES PROVIDED FOR IN ONE DEAL

Announcement Saturday that tracts had been signed for drill- ing four deep wells on tracts ad- jacent to the north and east limits Cisco, signalled what operators in the most important oil depen- dent transaction near Cisco in recent years.

Three wells are involved in one agreement between the Lone Star company and the Lone Star company and four Cisco oil operators— E. J. Krouph, J. M. Army, Luther McCrea and J. A. Arman. The Lone Star people contracted with these four men for the three wells on leases by them. The three are to be drilled each about one-quarter of a mile from the Kincade tract located in the south part of the east half of the southwest quarter of section 81; the Kincade tract and located in the south part of the east half of the northwest quarter of section 80; the Phillips tract and located in the north part of the west half of the northwest quarter of section 80; the Humble Oil and Refining company retains an interest in the three wells, it was also an- nounced.

The fourth well is to be drilled by the Consolidated Gasoline company in a semi-proved area in the east part of section 80. The well is approximately half a mile north- west of the Bearman Kincade tract. The area thus to be drilled is about a mile and a half of what is known as the East Cisco field. The wells are in a semi-proved area and five wells are now producing gas. The industry will respond to the three to be drilled to a depth of 3,000 feet. It is estimated that the wells will be drilled in about 3,500 feet.

Old Wells
The wells are located in the C. H. Fee, the George Fee, the Charles J. Klemer tract and the Phillips tract. The first three are oil producers and the last two are gas producers.

Clark Wells
The wells are located in the Wm. Lorenzen Clark No. 1 tract. The wells are being drilled in the Caddo gray lime at around 3,000 feet, will be treated with acid. The cement has been set and the well will be drilled within the next few days. Production of both oil and gas in commercial quantities is expected.

The outlaw was aided by three other men in stealing the automob- ile, Gaskin said. The outlaw carried a machine gun similar to the weapon taken from the Crown Point, Ind., jail during a jail break a week ago.

DAVIS PICKED AS LEADER FOR ADAMS PLACE

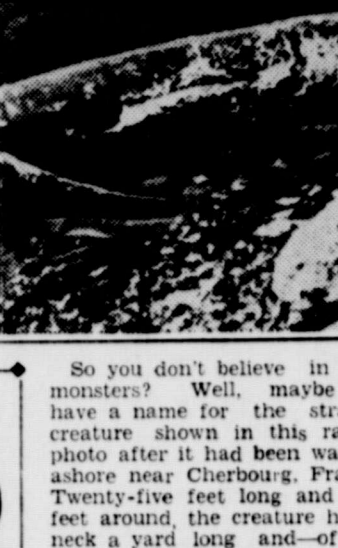

EASTMAN ASKS EXTENSION OF I. C. C. CONTROL

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 10— Congress and President Roosevelt were called upon today by Federal Transportation Coordinator Joseph B. Eastman to provide immediate legislation for federal regulation of motor and water transportation systems.

The two systems, he said, should be placed under jurisdiction of the Interstate Commerce commission which guides the railroads, in an effort to harmonize transportation problems and remove present "chaotic conditions."

Roosevelt to Get Test with Illinois Vote

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 10— The first test of national political sentiment since Franklin D. Roose- velt swamped the republican party in 1932, will begin one month from today in statewide Illinois primaries.

Accompanying his report were drafts of three proposed bills. They are: 1—Authority for the I. C. C. to regulate motor carriers operating in interstate and foreign commerce. 2—Authorization for the I. C. C. to regulate water carriers operating between United States ports and in inland waters.

NRA Acts to Tighten Observance of Codes

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 10— The NRA today acted to tighten code enforcement, hailed announce- ment that the refractories industry had adopted the president's appeal for reduced working hours and in- creased pay, and prepared for return of several high officials to private affairs.

The code authority for the re- fractories industry here for the NRA conference, agreed to adopt a 36- hour week and to maintain present weekly wages. This action is ex- pected to mean re-employment for 2,000 workers. New wage provi- sions in the code will increase min- imum wages of common labor at least 10 per cent.

State General Fund Is Nearer Cash Basis
AUSTIN, March 10.—The state general fund was nearer to a cash basis today than it has been at any time since May 1, 1933. State Treasurer Charlie Lockhart today called in \$1,000,000 outstanding state warrants for payment. The deficit now is \$3,743,792.
