OTHERS GROW ON OUR FAILURES

A group of Austin citizens have launched a movement to put a wool and mohair scouring plant in the state capital, according to the Austin newspapers.

It will be recalled that it was recently suggested that Cisco make an effort to obtain such a plant. It was pointed out that raw wool and mohair loses from 50 to 60 per cent of its weight when scoured and that this shrinkage would mean a great saving in freight costs to Boston where most of the Texas clip is consigned.

However, it was discouragingly explained after some desultory attempts at investigation, that wool scouring had been tried at San Angelo, the wool capital of the state and by the persuasiveness of logic the spot where such a scouring plant should first be located, and that the venture had proven uneconomic.

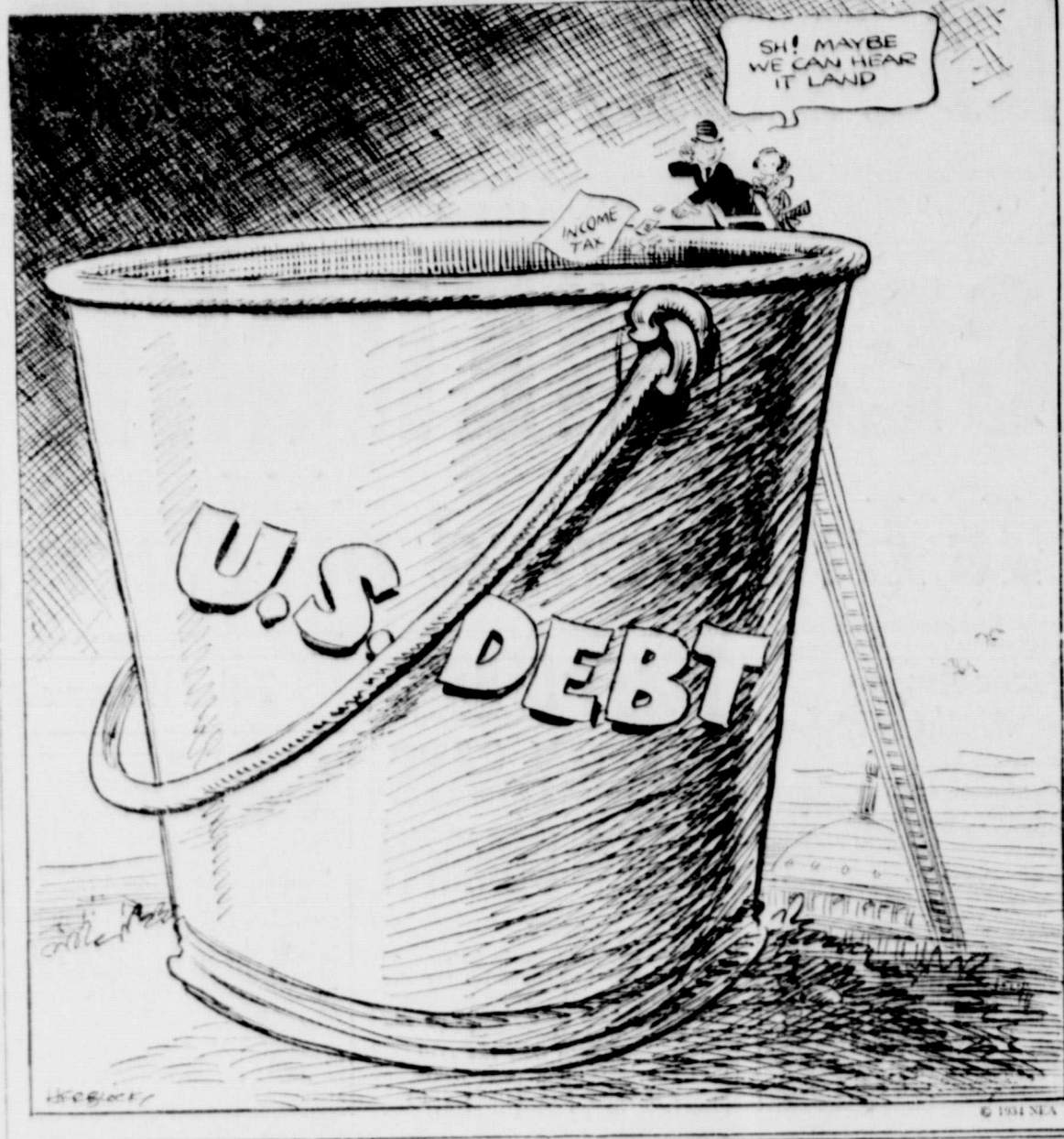

EDITORIAL

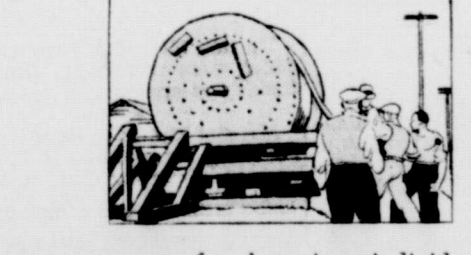

BAILEY UNABLE TO VOTE TO PAY BONUS, HE SAYS

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 14—Explaining that while he believed the payment of the bonus would be both just and beneficial to the recovery program, Jos. W. Bailey, Jr., representatives-at-large from Texas, said he would be unable to vote for it at this time because of the president attitude and the refusal of the democratic convention to adopt a plank of that character. Bailey will be a candidate for the democratic nomination for the United States senate in next summer's primaries. His statement follows:

"I have felt that because the democratic convention at Chicago refused to adopt a plank calling for payment of the bonus and, further, because the great leader of our party Mr. Roosevelt, has taken an attitude contrary to its passage, that I was bound not to vote for that bill. That seems to me to have been the promise which the democratic party made to the people and as I heartily endorse that platform, and that leadership that promise binds me.

Expanding Large Sums
"Since that time, however, the administration has undertaken an enormous program of expenditures to restore prosperity: \$5,000,000,000 to the Reconstruction Finance corporation; \$3,300,000,000 to the public works administration; \$2,000,000,000 to the federal relief; \$2,000,000,000 to the home owners \$2,000,000,000 for farm mortgages. Additional demands are continually being made and all of this has been done in accordance with the theory that such expenditures contribute to the general prosperity of all.

"If we are going to be just, how can we deny to do for every one what we have done for any one? How can we give to anyone and not

give to everyone? We must stop all aid, or we must aid all our people. **Favors Paying Bonus**

"I have therefore, after mature study, reached the conclusion that the payment of the adjusted service certificates would not only be just to the soldiers, but would do more than all else to restore prosperity. Many soldiers are in need; many would be removed from the relief rolls; and in addition many debts would be paid, many necessities bought, and much needed currency would be put in circulation for the benefit of merchants and all lines of business. Despite these considerations, however, I can not break my election promise at this time.

"I am now a candidate before the people of the state of Texas this summer for the nomination of the senator representing that great State. My opponent has consistently refused to favor the payment of these certificates. In the election this summer I shall discuss this question fully and the people can choose between the arguments presented. Accordingly, I shall thereafter feel free to vote my convictions on that subject after that election."
