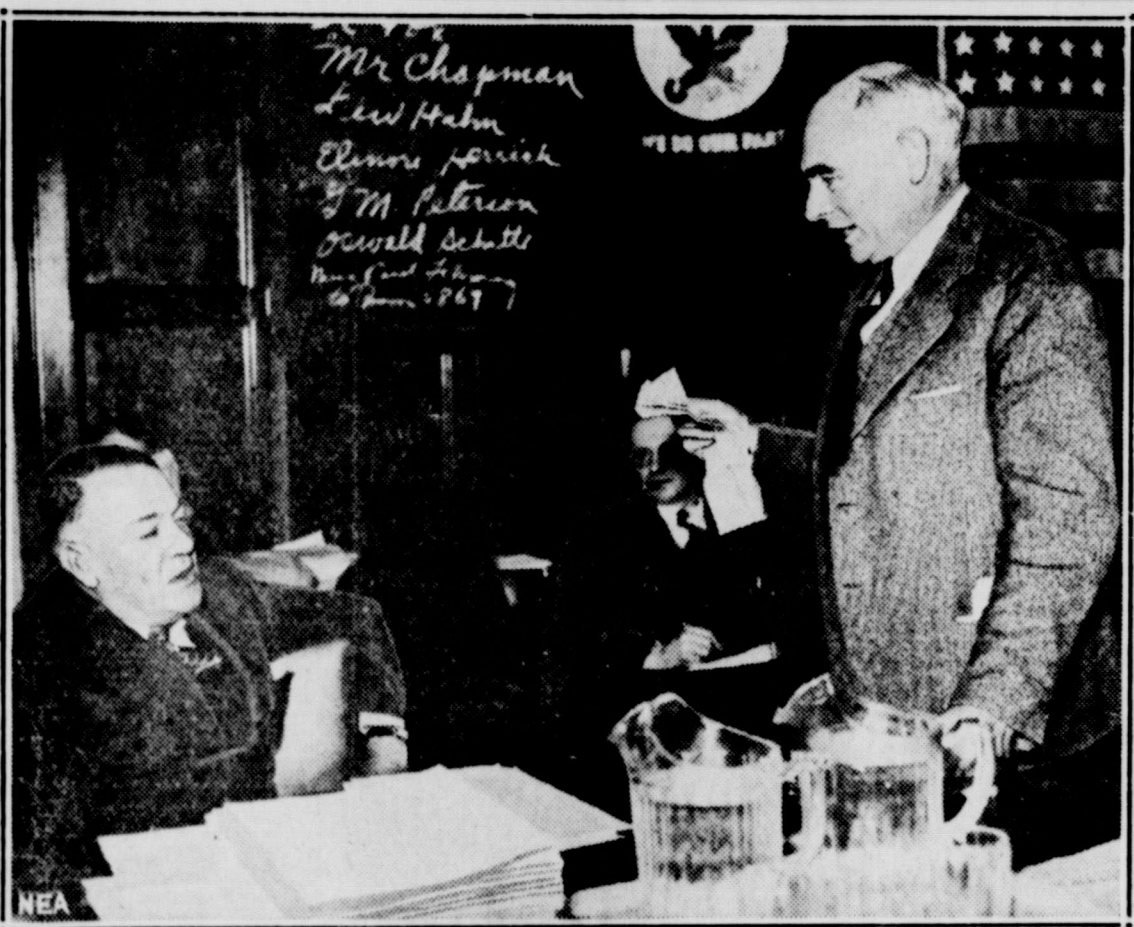

Rainey said he would recognize the silver bloc leaders Monday to force votes on the reauthorization bill and on a bill for payment in silver of commodities sold abroad.

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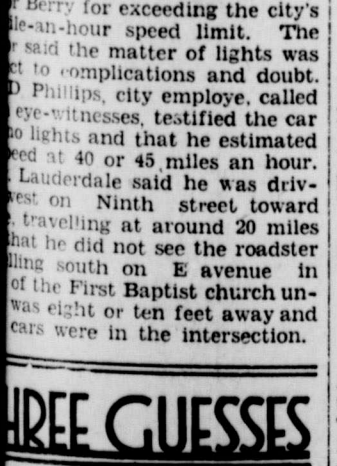

PEACEFUL WAR S WAGED FOR ARCTIC LANDS

MONTREAL, March 16 — A grim silent war, which has already cost the lives of many men, is being waged in the possession of a vast snow-covered empire in the Arctic.

The prize is supremacy over 2,000 square miles of land and a vast quantity of minerals which may revolutionize the future of the world. The battle is being waged, not by armies and guns, but by groups of prospectors and scientists.

Recently the Arctic was regarded as a land of frozen waste. Today it is known that some of the so-called barren lands are among the richest of the world.

Gold, silver, lead, zinc, coal, iron, great reserves of fish, game and furs are being found in increasing quantities. It has been estimated that in the Arctic are quantities of many weather products which have so far baffled meteorologists.

Unknown Islands
Many of the discoveries made in the Arctic have been made on land already known to Canadian or Soviet territory. But hitherto unknown islands have been found by each country and quietly annexed. Airplane settlements and methods of navigation with the outside world are being established, for it is believed that the nation which can dominate the Arctic may in time dominate the world's mineral supplies.

Monopolize highly important routes between Europe and the East.
The battle for possession of the Arctic was started five years ago when the United States declared that "the Arctic became Soviet Arctic." and announced a five-year plan for the Arctic.

Canada took up the challenge. She then both countries have achieved miracles in the vast wastes, which hitherto had been regarded as useless and unexplored.

Canada's activities in the Arctic have been less spectacular than those of Russia, but just as successful.
Canada is not driving whole populations into remote territories, but concentrating on extending her knowledge of the geography of the Arctic year by year she is increasing her hold.

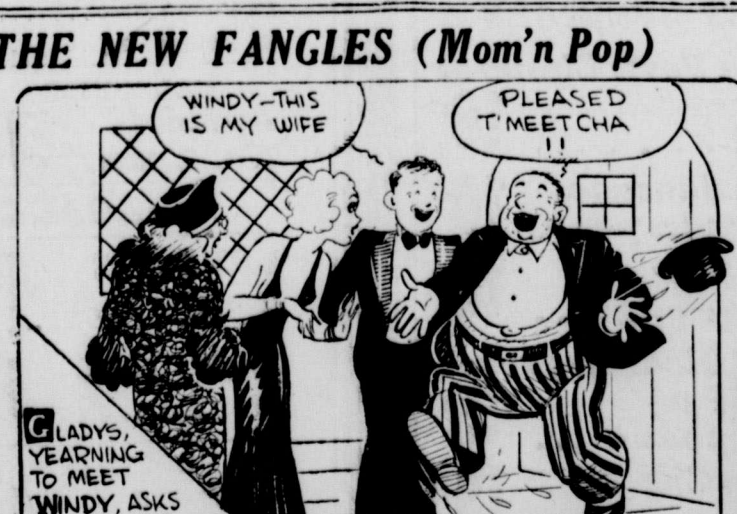

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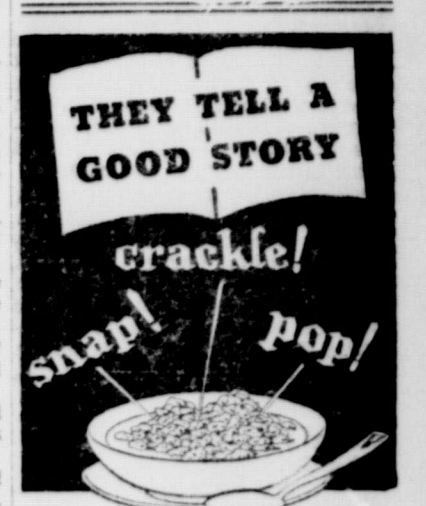

BO M'MILLIN GAINED FAME AT FT. WORTH

FORT WORTH, March 16 — If someone 20 years ago had told a tousie-headed North Side high school student that someday he would be head football coach at Indiana university, the youth's response would have been equivalent to the modern "Oh, Yeah?"

Yet this spring that same tousie-headed youth, none other than A. N. "Bo" McMillin, will take over the Big Ten post, climaxing a football career that reeks with glamor and fame.

In 1912 McMillin's name became a football talisman in Texas high school circles. As halfback on the North Side high school team, his name was on the tongue of every follower of high school football.

In 1914, as captain, he led one of the greatest high school football teams ever assembled in Texas, a team which produced several national football figures.

Team Mates
Beside him played Duke Weaver, later to become an All-American star at little Centre college in Kentucky, where Bo himself whirled into national prominence as All-American ace at Indiana, and Matty Dell, until this spring coach of football at Texas A. & M. college.

McMillin was not able to win the state title with his team. It was defeated in the finals by Austin. Nevertheless the passing arm that carried him to wider fame at Centre college was in evidence. His courage and daring made him a nemesis of Texas high school eleven.

Through his final year in high school, according to an account in the North Side annual for that year McMillin directed the teams play, although he was suffering from injuries.

"Bo" McMillin held his team up to

championship class through sheer grit and force of will," is the tribute paid him in the annual.

It was the same grit and brain power that carried him to college success, believes Sully Montgomery, teammate at Centre college with McMillin and a former heavyweight pugilist.

"He was the smartest football player I ever saw on a football field," Montgomery said. "He had a lot of running ability, and it was like playing the Brain Trust to encounter Bo in a game of wits. Sure he'll make the grade at Indiana."

Mrs. Tucker's Recipe of the Week

LEMON SPONGE PIE

2 Tbsp. Mrs. Tucker's Shortening
