3 CANDIDATES SEEK WRIT ON BALLOT ISSUE

Cisco's municipal election preliminaries took a turn into litigation when Mayor J. T. Berry and the five members of the city commission were cited to appear in 91st district court at Eastland Saturday at 10 a. m. to show cause why the names of candidates which the commission had said were filed too late, should not be included on the ballot for the municipal election April 3, already printed.

The litigation grew out of the action of the city commission in declining to recognize petitions filed by W. J. Donovan, L. F. Mendenhall and W. P. Moore for places on the ballot as candidates for commissioners against three incumbents, J. R. Burnett, H. C. Henderson and W. K. (Bob) Winston, who are seeking reelection.

The commission held that under a law enacted last year, it was required to close the ballot in time for it to be printed for absentee voting last Wednesday morning, or 20 days in advance of the election. The excluded candidates claim in their petition for a writ of mandamus that the proper petitions bearing the signatures of over five per cent of the voters were presented to the commission more than 20 days prior to the election and therefore their names should have been printed on the ballot.

The petition asserts that on the 13th day of March each of the above named relators presented applications to the city commissioners requesting "in the manner provided by law and the ordinances" of the city that their names be put on the ballot as candidates for the office of city commissioner to be voted on April 3, 1934.

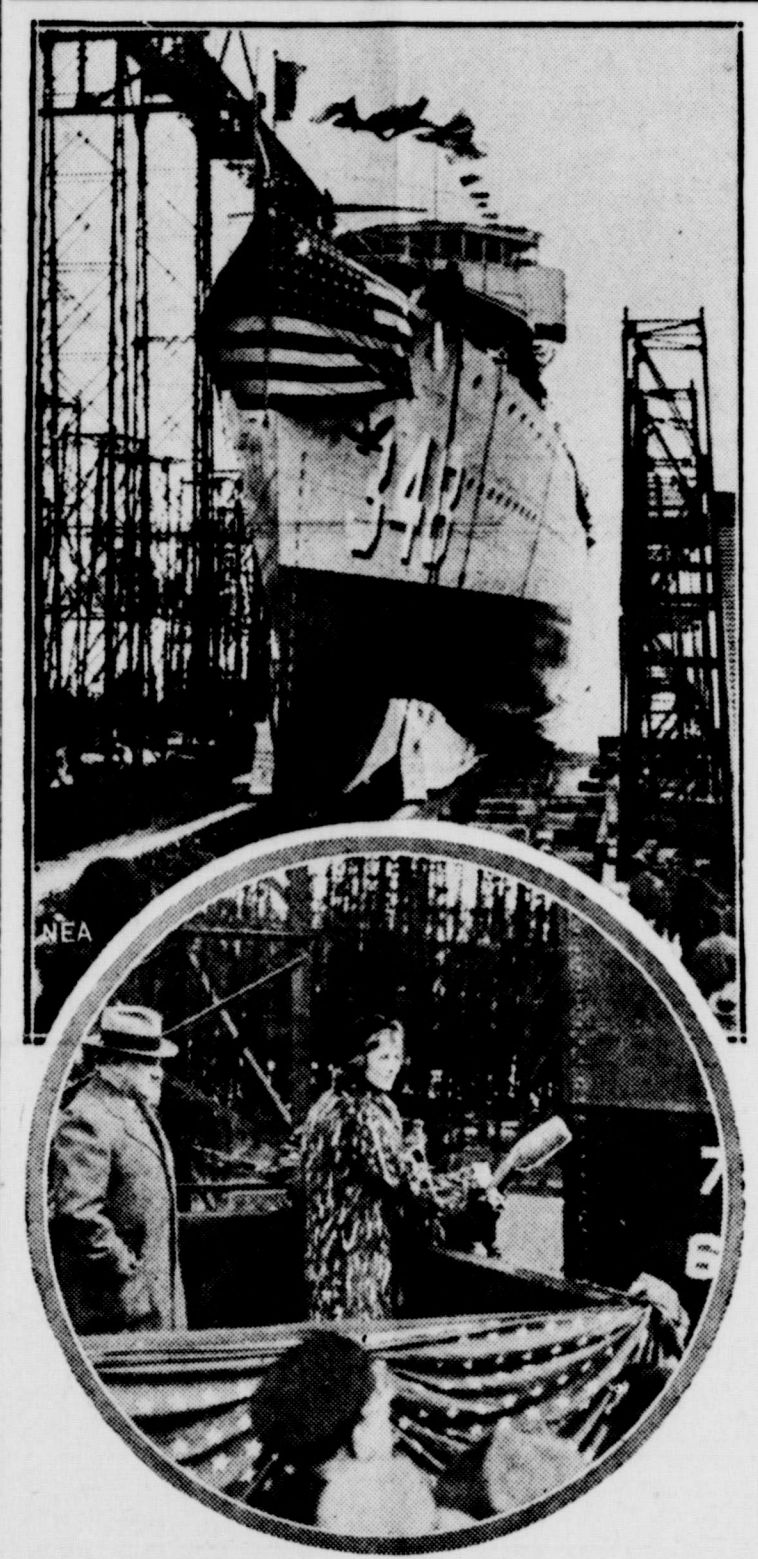
It asserts that the commissioners "arbitrarily" refused to recognize the petitions or the applications and that they thus violated their duty in the premises.

The petitioners also declare that the difficulty of writing names of the excluded candidates on the ballot and the probability that irregularities will arise to keep such ballots from being counted are further grounds for issuing the writ of mandamus requested.

U. S. and Japan Talk Far East Problems

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 21.—The Japanese government has inaugurated direct diplomatic conversation with the United States in an effort to bring about an immediate amicable settlement of Far Eastern questions pending between this country and Japan, it was officially revealed today.
