Moisture Improved Moisture conditions throughout the major portion of the district were improved by heavy rains in late February. The need moisture brightened the agriculture outlook. Fair weather also enabled farmers to make good headway toward completion of and preparation for spring planting. Small grains, however, are in poor condition and prospects are discouraging, the review stated.

Ranges were reported responding to the increased supply of moisture and range vegetation has started to green. Considering the poor condition of the ranges, livestock came through the winter in fairly good condition, and are expected to mend rapidly in the spring. Trading activity on the ranges was increased. Condition of the range cattle in Texas was placed at 69 per cent of normal. Condition of sheep and goats declined 3 and 2 per cent, respectively.

Cattle receipts of the Fort Worth market exceeded those of the previous month and a year ago. Hogs showed a substantial decline.

Deposits Grow A further growth in deposits of member banks of the federal reserve characterized the district's financial situation. The daily average of combined net demand and time deposits of member banks rose to \$728,463,000 in February, which was \$30,340,000 greater than in the previous month, and \$120,851,000 larger than a year ago. Loans reflected seasonal declines.

Debits to individual accounts in principle cities were seasonally a per cent less than in January, and 28 per cent in excess of those in February a year ago.

Consumption of cotton at domestic textile mills during the month continued in larger volume than in the corresponding month a year earlier, the report revealed. There were 447,890 bales consumed as against 441,202 bales a year ago.

Savings deposits held by 130 reporting banks rose from \$133,759,094 on January 31, to \$135,449,231 on February 28, registering an increase of 1.3 per cent.

Seasonal Declines Customary seasonal declines were noticed in exports of cotton through ports of Houston and Galveston during February. Shipments from Galveston, however, were materially larger in volume than in February a year ago.

Receipts of cotton at Houston and Galveston ports were seasonally smaller than in January, but at Galveston they showed a small increase over those in February of last year.

Due to the shorter month, a sizable reduction from January was shown in the total output of crude petroleum during February. Petroleum which amounted to 27,384,000 barrels, was 2,697,800 barrels larger than in the corresponding month last year. Daily yield in the district

been sent to Cleveland, for the board there sent an inspector here to check up. He found conditions "satisfactory."

Job Gain Is Slight There being no local board, no one knows how much employment resulted from NRA. But the condition of relief rolls would suggest that the increase in employment in small factories was small.

The retail stores along Main street, however, put on quite a few, and the shops proceeded to lift one another by one another's bootstraps. Adolph Goldman, proprietor of a small but good ladies wear shop says there was an immediate increase in buying as soon as NRA increased girls' salaries from the going rate of around \$6.50 a week to the code standard of \$12-14.

Goldman says this increased buying soon balanced his own 20 per cent increase in labor costs. The retail trade, he says, is all for the NRA basic principle, and believes in carrying them further, as planned today.

Industry Hard to "Sell" The industrialists were harder

to convince. Many shifted their hours around to comply with codes literally without really taking on more employees. At the end of six months of NRA, their payrolls are up somewhat, but allowing for a 10 or 20 per cent increase in production due to increased business, it is hard to see that much of the increased payroll is due directly to NRA codes.

There has not been a single labor dispute sharp enough to bring a strike or lockout, and efforts failed to organize several plants into vertical shop unions under section 7-A of the Recovery Act.

Employees voted to keep their own independent organization, or none. Some of the old craft unions, like printers, carpenters, masons, and the like, have gained somewhat, and have revived a Labor Trades Council which for years was dormant.

Home Town of Labor Chief There is considerable sly smiling about town over this lack of labor progress in the home community of William Green, leader of the A. F. of L.'s organized millions of workmen.

Green, the town's most distinguished "alumnus," maintains a home here, and visits it frequently. The home loan program has made almost no progress at all, reports Ed Crawford of the Home Building and Loan association. Only four homes actu-

ally have been refinanced since last August with HOLC loans.

Red tape is its bane. Crawford indicates, telling how 50 applications had to be re-made (and repaid for at \$3.50 each) because of a change in the printed form.

Farmers Gain Little

There are no signs that farmers are paying off mortgages in AAA benefits. Such benefits are small, as farms average no larger than 180 acres, and are well-diversified.

Allotments average perhaps \$50 or \$75 on wheat. You can't pay mortgages on that. So retail trade gets it and is happy.

Corn loan money will begin to

flow in soon, but will be small in this same proportion.

But the mortgage situation never was so serious here as in the specialized-farming areas, where land prices skyrocketed and had to fall sickeningly.

So most farm mortgages has less water in them here, and are hanging on. Every one of the three banks opened immediately after bank holiday.

CWA was a boon even in so small a community. The week after 750 CWA jobs began, 320 families were taken off relief rolls of 450. Meticulous records of Seth M. Snyder, in charge of county CWA work, and

the small size of the community, made it certain that all CWA men who have been building roads, repairing schools, and renovating the courthouse, be men who were in need and "on relief."

Snyder feels that work under the successor plan to CWA will be needed here—that re-employment hasn't nearly taken up the slack. There were 30 applications for relief the day the first batch of CWA workers were discharged.

A good indication of employment conditions lies in a survey by the Business Men's association in angling for a new factory. It showed 1900 women within a 20-mile radius

were willing to take jobs there. The entire population of the county is only about 29,000.

One gas station closed, reports Arthur Hale, president of the Business Men's association, himself a gas station proprietor. It was a chain station, and closed not because the company could not afford to pay the code wage, but because the station did not itself produce enough income to pay that scale.

Keep Even Tenor of Way

Hale believes that perhaps 150 other gas stations in the state have been eliminated for the same reason.

The building throughout the sum-

mer and fall of a new condensed milk plant, branch of a great national firm, helped building trade employment to the tune of 150 men, any may be a sign of the trend to decentralization of great city factories.

Never a boom town, and never quite down to the depths, this typical small community goes quietly on its way, accepting what it likes in the recovery program, benefiting mildly by its workings, confident that whatever comes the farmers' muddy car still will park in thick rank along Main street.

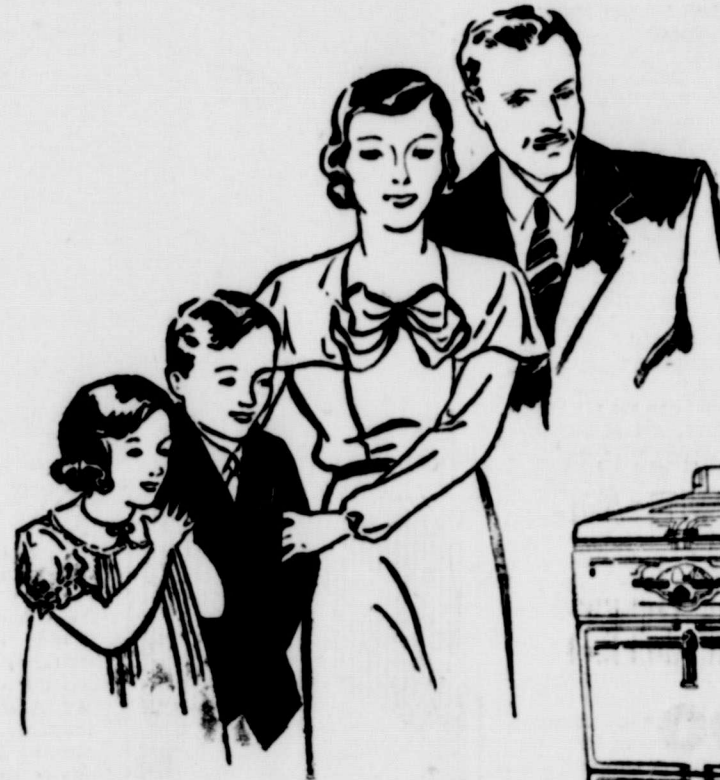

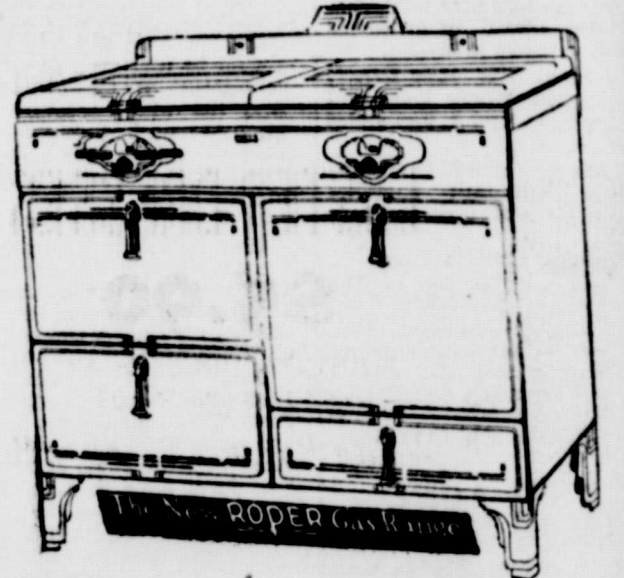

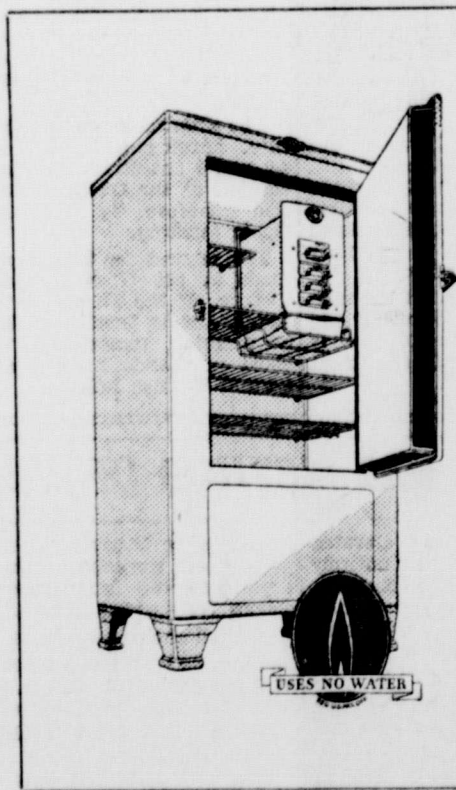

WILL TRANSFER CWA WORKERS NEXT MONDAY

WASHINGTON, D. C. March 30.—Two million CWA workers will be transferred Monday to work projects under the administration's new relief program, Relief Adm'r Harry Hopkins estimated today.

The CWA program ends Sunday and the government then will place major part of relief responsibility on states, cities and counties.

Hopkins said that about 2,000,000 persons mostly city folk, remained on CWA rolls today, and that a majority of them would move into the new work program.

Under the new policy, in communities over 5,000 population there will be flexible public works projects designed to give employment to as many as possible at a minimum wage of 40 cents per hour on a 24-hour week basis.

In rural areas, farmers will be given sufficient employment on public works projects to supplement their farm income. The government also plans to provide them with farm stock where it is needed.

GIESECKE SAYS TEXAS RANT MATCH BOTH

PORT WORTH, March 30.—The Texas Relief commission will not start the new work relief program, replacing CWA, until it determines whether Texas must match federal expenditures for both work relief and direct relief, Vice Chairman B. Giesecke said here today.

Texas relief funds would be exhausted within a few months if it is to match every dollar the government spends for both kinds of relief, Giesecke said.

The commission will favor matching only funds spend for direct

relief, for persons physically unable to work, he said.

"Many other details in the work relief program have to be worked out in Texas before the program be started, if the funds matching question is settled," he continued. Giesecke said the commission tentatively had set April 16 to start the work relief program.

U. S. Steel Joins In Wage Increase

NEW YORK, March 30.—The U. S. Steel corporation today announced an approximate 10 per cent wage increase, spreading the raise to virtually the entire industry.

About 350,000 employees in the industry are affected by raises so far.

The announcement, climaxing a chain of steel pay increases this week, is expected to bring millions of dollars in extra purchasing power. U. S. Steel employs more than 190,000 wage earners and salaried men. It represents about 40 per cent of the nation's production capacity.

GENERAL ELECTRIC HIKES PAY RATE

NEW YORK, March 30.—The General Electric company announced today a 10 per cent wage increase for its employees.

COLUMBIA STEEL INCREASES PAY

SAN FRANCISCO, March 30.—A ten per cent wage increase will go into effect Sunday for 5,000 employees of the Columbia Steel company, the president of the company announced today.

PROVIDENCE R. I. March 30—Senator Joseph J. Kirby of Newport has asked the state legislature to appropriate \$20,000 to assist in entering the United States fleet while it is stationed in Narragansett Bay off Newport next summer. After two years' absence, the battle fleet and scouting squadron of the Navy, a total of 80 ships with 35,000 men aboard, is scheduled to return to the east coast this year.

However, most of the prison breaks in Texas have been from jails, not from the penitentiary. There have been few escapes from Huntsville and from the prison farms on which prisoners are employed.

The tendency in times of difficulty is toward centralization of authority. The theorists, represented by "brain trusters" and cloistered students of government and sociology, are constantly building up attractive, and even inspiring hypotheses of government and social organization designed to eliminate wasted space and motion; but these structures are cold formal mechanisms entirely lacking in human sympathy.

The sin of democracy is that it fails to train its beneficiaries how properly to handle its instruments. That is the seed of its destruction. There ought to be a warning hand raised in the path of the present trend; and there ought to be a return of the sense of responsibility to every citizen who shares the privileges of democratic self-government.

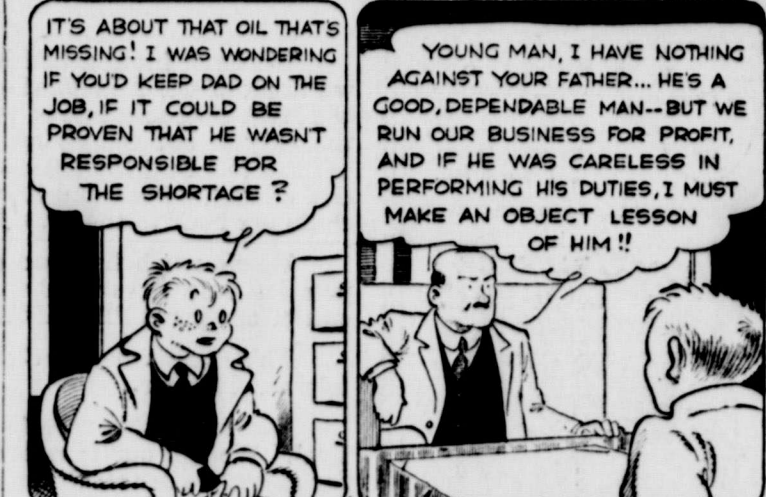

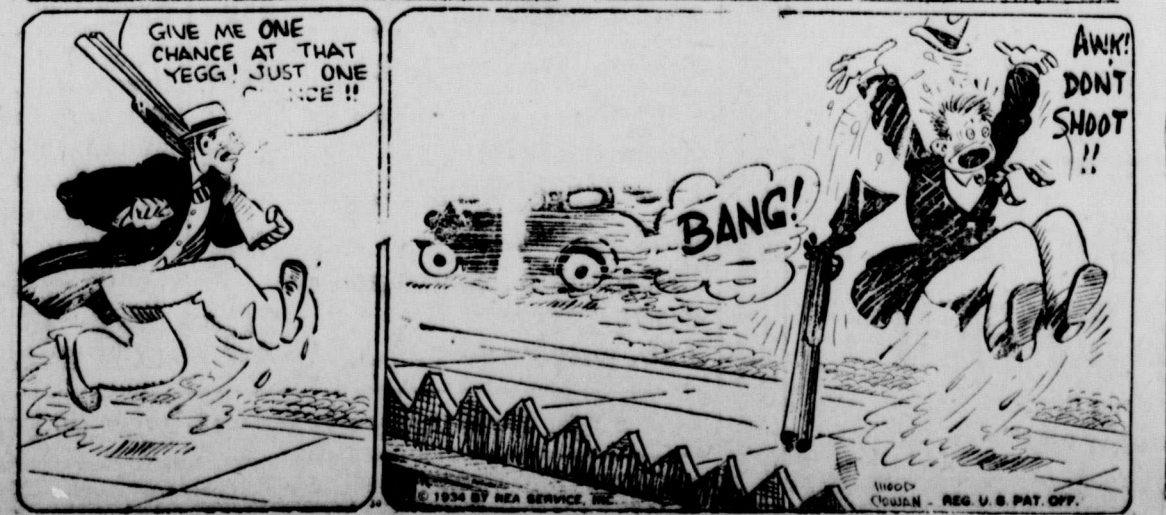

Village of Ottine May Become Park

GONZALES, March 30—The village of Ottine, once a thriving trade center that supplied Germany with gun stocks from its walnut woods, may shortly find new fame as the site of a state park.

Gonzales county citizens have raised \$3,000 toward the purchase of approximately 600 acres with the hope of preserving marshes and mud bogs said to hold a botanical wealth, ferns, palms and rare woods that break the monotony of a rolling prairie covered with sage brush.

The state park board has asked an option on the land. The federal government has been asked to join the park proposal by designating the site for a camp of the Civilian Conservation Corps.

ervation Corps. The village derived its name from its tradesman-founder, J. A. Otto, and his wife, Christine. Shortly before the turn of the century, lumber mills supplied large quantities of walnut and other woods to foreign markets. One lumber mill still operates at Ottine on water power from the San Marcos river. Ottine also possesses historical significance. The Battle of Plum creek, which routed Comanche Indians who fled across a human bridge of their own struggling warriors and horses, occurred near there.
