# Annual Appeal for Library Support To Be Made During Tag Day Saturday

TOTAL 6,080 Six thousand and eighty (6,080 citizens of Eastland county, plus an additional 500 more or less, are eligible to vote in 1934 state and county elections, according to the records of Tax Collector T. L.

Cooper. The former figure represents the number who paid their poll taxes in time to make them eligible to vote The latter represents a rough estimate of the number of citizens who I are "overs and unders" or excused, by reason of physical disabilities from the requirement of paying a poll tax to qualify themselves as vot-

The poll tax figure compares with about the same number issued in 1932, the tax collector's office said. Last year, an "off" season in state politics, only about 3,500 citizens paid the tax. No Certificates

No exemption certificates for either "unders" or "overs" are issued in this county. The reason is that the new law requires issuances of such certificates only in cities of more than 10,000 population, into which category none of the Eastland county communities fall.

Citizens entitled to a vote eithe or having arrived at majority in the current year may be required to furnish an affidavit in the absence of a certificate of exemption if doubt exists in the minds of the judges, it was said Physical infirmities are considered as their own evidence.

MIAMI, Okla., April 6 .- Clyde Barrow and Raymond Hamilton, outhwestern desperadoes, were sought in northeast Oklahoma today as killers of one Oklahoma officer and probably killers of anothe

With the fugitives, travelling in a circle that appeared to be taking them toward Chetopah, Kan., was a woman listed as Bonnie Parker, Barrow's sweetheart.

Cal Campbell, 60-year-old Commerce constable, was dead of machine gun wounds Percy Boyd, chief of police at Commerce, was wounded, miss-

ing and thought probably dead in a roadside ditch somewhere along the fugitives' route







#### BROADENING BANKRUPTCY ACT

Extension of the federal uniform bankruptcy act to corporations besides railroads is before the senate after having been favorably acted upon by the judiciary committee of that body. The bill was enacted by the house last year. It would provide corporations in difficult financial straits with a legal machinery for working out reorganizations and refunding processes which they now lack. The method has proved logical and workable in the case of railroads, and the terms held out to the carriers under the railroad bankruptcy act would be extended to other corporations by this broadening measure

Under these terms corporations could proceed with a reorganization after agreement of creditors holding two-thirds of its obligations. Such a condition guarantees the interests of all concerned. #### HIGHWAY BOYS YOUR FRIENDS

From the cruel slaving of two state highway patrolmen near Grapevine last Sunday, the Fort Worth Press points a pertinent moral in public courtesy and respect for the boys in blue-gray uniforms who patrol the pavements. The courtesy that these young men habitually show highway users, intimates the Press, was directly responsible for their murder at the hands of a couple believed to have been Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker. Their duty is primarily to keep the roads safe and to assist people in distress thereon-not to harass or bulldoze the public with a wanton display of weapons and authority—and the fact that they do not approach a normal situation except in a cooperative effort to help people out of difficulties puts them at a serious disadvantage before a craven with a machine gun or shotgun instantly available, says the Press.

'We sincerely hope that the tragedy of Sunday afternoon will result in better understanding and better acceptance by the public of the work of the highway patrol, though this could not of course compensate in any way for the loss of the two fine officers so cruelly shot down.

The highway patrolmen are on the roads to help all lawabiding citizens. The only trouble with them is, they are too few. Their primary duty is not enforcement of the crimnel laws although of course they have police powers and

For the first time, young political eaders feel that they can strike out boidly to attack the economic problems of the island, for they believe they have the interest of Washington.

### Tobacco Plan

A plan for the tobacco industry already is under way. Chief Forester F. A. Silcox, who

was a member of the Tugwell mission, is enthusiastic about reviving the forestry industry of the island, He found fine cabinet woods of many varieties, only one of which competes with continental lumber, Assistant Secretary Tugwell particularly is interested in a homesteading and sugar stabilization plan plan which was being debated in the insular senate at the end of his visit. This proposal, that the insular government buy the bankrupt United Porto Rico Sugar company, with its 31,000 acres and five centrales to provide a basis for homesteading, was singled out for special study by insular and continental agricultural eaders.

### Credit System Studied

Recoganization of the credit sys-tem, to divorce credit control from the big sugar companies and to reduce interest rates, is being studied. With prohibition repealed, and with the beauties of the island called to the attention of the continental public, the islanders hope that Puerto Rico will become a winter and summer playground, since its range of temperature is very narrow, and it never gets as hot here as it does in most parts of the United States.
