He immediately conferred with the governor after the writ was served. He refused to say whether he would comply. The attorney-general's department probably will be requested to advise him.

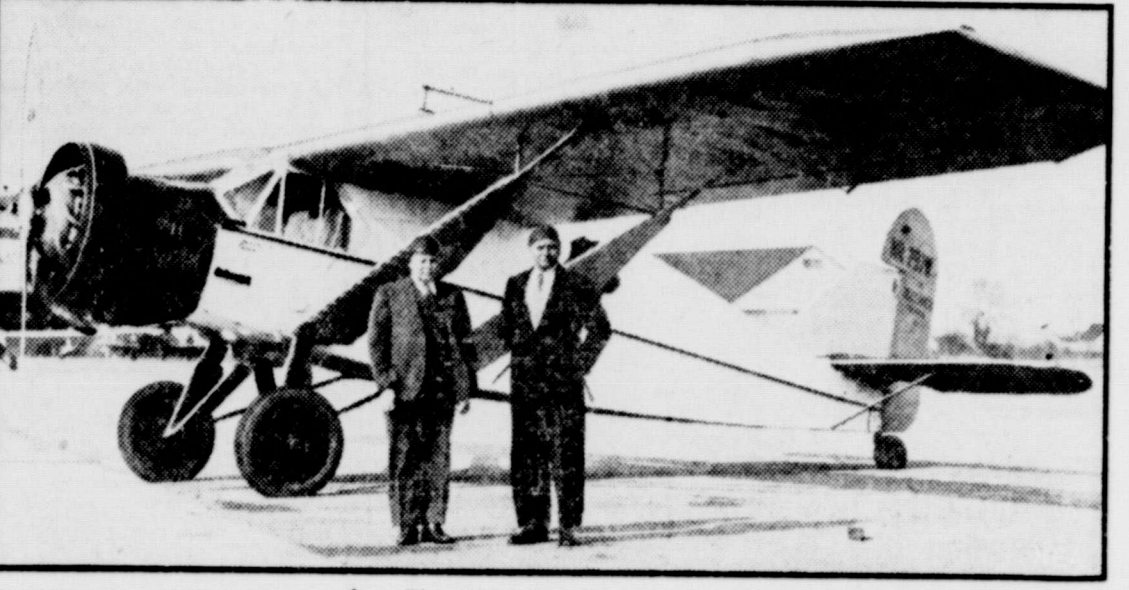

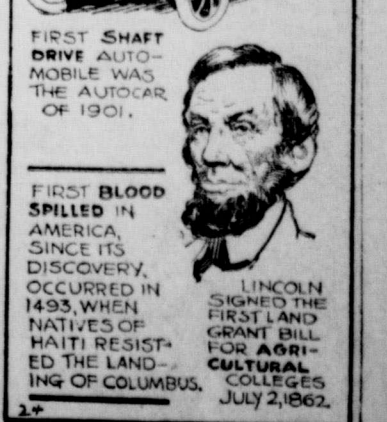

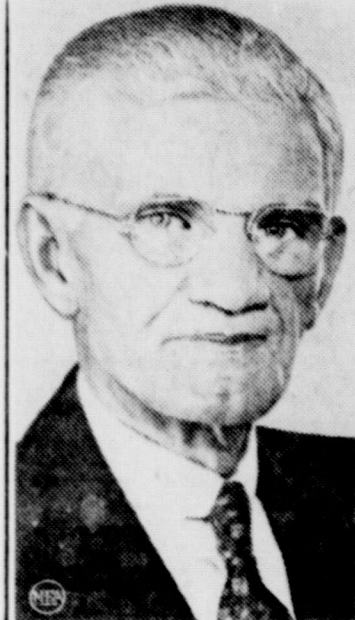

Texas Topics

AUSTIN, April 19.—The Wirt investigation at least gave the country a verb and a common noun, often needed in connection with our venerable national legislative proceedings — **T o b u l k i n k l e**: A strutting, pompous pose, accompanied by a tendency to make personal accusations from the security of official immunity.

BROOKS Amarillo, heart of the Panhandle empire, metropolis of a section ready to lead Texas march forward, has started the visible advance. The city has prepared to make an aggressive bid for the 1936 West Texas chamber of commerce convention. In this campaign, Amarillo will show that, even with a long and severe drought, it has remained in the white zone of good business condition longer than any other spot of the nation except the East Texas oil field.

Amarillo waited a long time for rain, then didn't get it; but a 21-inch snow — third of a century record — served as an adequate substitute.

The city and its section are on the march, not to recovery, but to a new advance on our ahead of anything so far known. Part of its advance is the fact that Amarillo's hinterland has had more railroad building during the past four years than perhaps all the rest of Texas, plus any other five states put together.

Not with respect to any single case, certainly not with respect to legislators who wanted to preserve their right to serve their people without doing violence to the interests of clients—but the respect to a collateral effect, this column has repeatedly touched on the wrong of the law which is now under debate between Rep. T. H. McGregor and Atty.-Gen. James V. Allred—giving a legislator the right to continue any lawsuit during a legislative session.

That collateral wrong is that the legislature legislated a special advantage to members of succeeding

legislatures with respect to employment as counsel. It created a privileged class of lawyers — that is, legislators — who had powers in court not possessed by others. It legislated an open invitation to litigants to hire legislators for lawyers.

And the body which passed the act certainly could not have had that intention.

And while they talk about abuses by the legislature of the public good, why doesn't one rise to inquire why friends of corporations in the legislature so long have blocked the constitutional mandate that in civil cases nine, 10 or 11 jurors might return a verdict, instead of forcing so many thousand mistrials and delays by requiring a unanimous verdict.

The Reich Ladies Home Demonstration club met at the Reich school house Friday with eight members present.

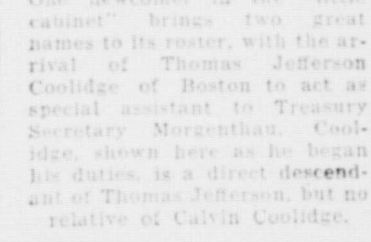

UM RUNNER WILL RETURN TO CHANGED SCENE

WALVESTON, April 19. — When Moseley once chief of the Gulf gum runners, returns from the prison at Atlanta in June he will place openly selling the gum for which he lost his liberty. Galveston and San Antonio are the most openly wet. Fortune Suspected. Moseley's empire broken and scattered now in handing the gum he once risked his liberty to sell. Moseley will come back to Galveston where he was a garage man in the days before he entered the gum business. Although he took Moseley's oath when asked to pay the price of the same time he was sentenced to the federal prison for those who believe the gum runner has a fortune ahead.

LOANS EFFECT ON EUROPEAN LINE-UP EYED

By STEWART BROWN United Press Staff Correspondent GENEVA, April 19. — Because the League of Nations is sponsor for loans totaling \$30,400,000,000 to six European nations, the recent tendency toward new political and economic alignments in Europe is being watched anxiously here. Great Britain and the United States chiefly will be affected by any changes, beneficial or adverse. British buyers took about 50 per cent of the League-sponsored loans, while the United States subscribed about 20 per cent of the various issues. Approximately one-half of the loans are now partially, or entirely, in default as regards service. Danzig and Estonia are the only two states which have maintained their service throughout. Payments Met. Austria has been in technical default, but since the advent of the Dollfus government interest and sinking fund charges have been met in full. She was saved, however, from financial collapse by a timely new loan from the great powers. Bulgaria, Greece and Hungary hold about half of the loans and all three are behind on their interest and sinking fund payments. This fact has caused considerable anxiety in League financial circles because bondholders do not hesitate to complain that they bought these bonds because they were sponsored by the league. In all of the loans granted to needy European nations the league has reserved the right to advise them in the preparation of their budgets and necessary measures of reform. Many impartial persons say that for league advice and reform several of the central European states would have gone into bankruptcy and revolution during the critical postwar period.

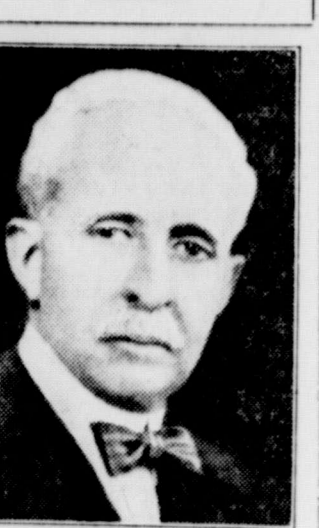

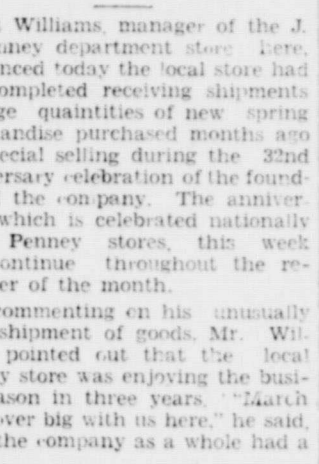

Texas Topics

By RAYMOND BROOKS



AUSTIN, April 19.—The Wirt investigation at least gave the country a verb and a common noun often needed in connection with our venerable national legislative proceedings—T o b u l w i n k l e: A strutting, pompous pose, accompanied by a tendency to make personal accusations from the security of official immunity.

BROOKS, Amarillo, heart of the Panhandle empire metropolis of a section ready to lead Texas march forward, has started the visible advance. The city has prepared to make an aggressive bid for the 1936 West Texas chamber of commerce convention. In this campaign, Amarillo will show that, even with a long and severe drought, it has remained in the white zone of good business condition longer than any other spot of the nation except the East Texas oil field.

Amarillo waited a long time for rain, then didn't get it; but a 21-inch snow—third of a century record—served as an adequate substitute.

The city and its section are on the march, not to recovery, but to a new advance on out ahead of anything so far known. Part of its advance is the fact that Amarillo's hinterland has had more railroad building during the past four years than perhaps all the rest of Texas, plus any other five states put together.

Not with respect to any single case, certainly not with respect to legislators who wanted to preserve their right to serve their people without doing violence to the interests of clients—but the respect to a collateral effect, this column has repeatedly touched on the wrong of the law which is now under debate between Rev. T. H. McGrigg and Atty-Gen. James V. Alred—giving a legislator the right to continue any lawsuit during a legislative session.

That collateral wrong is that the legislature legislated a special advantage to members of succeeding

legislatures with respect to employment as counsel. It created a privileged class of lawyers—that is, legislators—who had powers in court not possessed by others. It legislated an open invitation to litigants to hire legislators for lawyers.

And the body which passed the act certainly could not have had that intention.

And while they talk about abuses by the legislature of the public good, why doesn't one rise to inquire why friends of corporations in the legislature so long have blocked the constitutional mandate that in civil cases nine, 10 or 11 jurors might return a verdict, instead of forcing so many thousand mistrials and delays by requiring a unanimous verdict.
