LABOR BARGAINING TO BE GIVEN ACID TEST

May day came in with the greatest legal battle over NRA provisions under way in the setting of the United States court of Wilmington, Del. It is a showdown or a battle to the death between the heads of the great steel industry and the labor organizations involved the country over. In it the fate of the national recovery act collective bargaining provisions is involved. Fed. Judge John T. Nields had before him a petition asking that the Weirton Steel company be restrained from violating that section of the NRA steel code. Not only the constitutionality of the collective bargaining phase of the recovery act was up for adjudication in a decision that it is said will be of far reaching importance on the entire recovery movement, but the legality and constitutionality of many of the great industrial codes of fair competition and the status of scores of so-called company unions will be affected. The court of last resort will say the last word.






