Muleshoe sales tax revenue remains down



Combs' office sent sales tax allocations, a 7.6 percent decrease compared to a year ago. So far this calendar year, local sales tax allocations are down 3.7 percent compared to the same period in 2008.

Combs' office distributed monthly sales tax allocations of \$282.8 million to Texas cities, down 7.3 percent compared to last October. Texas counties received sales tax allocations of \$25.5 million, down 10.7 percent compared to a year ago.

The 153 special purpose taxing districts around the state got \$16.7 million in sales tax revenue, a decrease of 1.4 percent compared to a year ago. Ten Texas transit systems received \$93.3 million in sales tax, down 8.4 percent compared to a year ago.

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
Hispanic In America!



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

Last year, the US Supreme Court issued a landmark ruling that affirmed the Second Amendment right to bear arms as an individual, protected right.

In D.C v. Heller, the court declared that the District of Columbia's ban on handguns was an unconstitutional restriction on that right.

The day the nation's highest court handed down its opinion, and I was proud to stand on the steps of the Supreme Court with scores of other Americans, including Dick Heller, one of the plaintiffs in the case, who all count the right to bear arms as one of their most precious liberties.

The court's decision was a triumph for firearms owners and defenders of the Second Amendment. It was a victory for the citizens of Washington, D.C., who had been denied the right to protect themselves in their homes by the most restrictive where they live. gun ban in the nation.

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





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Texas H1N1 vaccine update released

of the H1N1 vaccine have been allotted to Texas by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention during the first two weeks of national allocation of the vaccine supply.

Texas' allocation for the week that ended Oct. 2 was 142,400 doses, all of it the nasal mist form of the vaccine.




