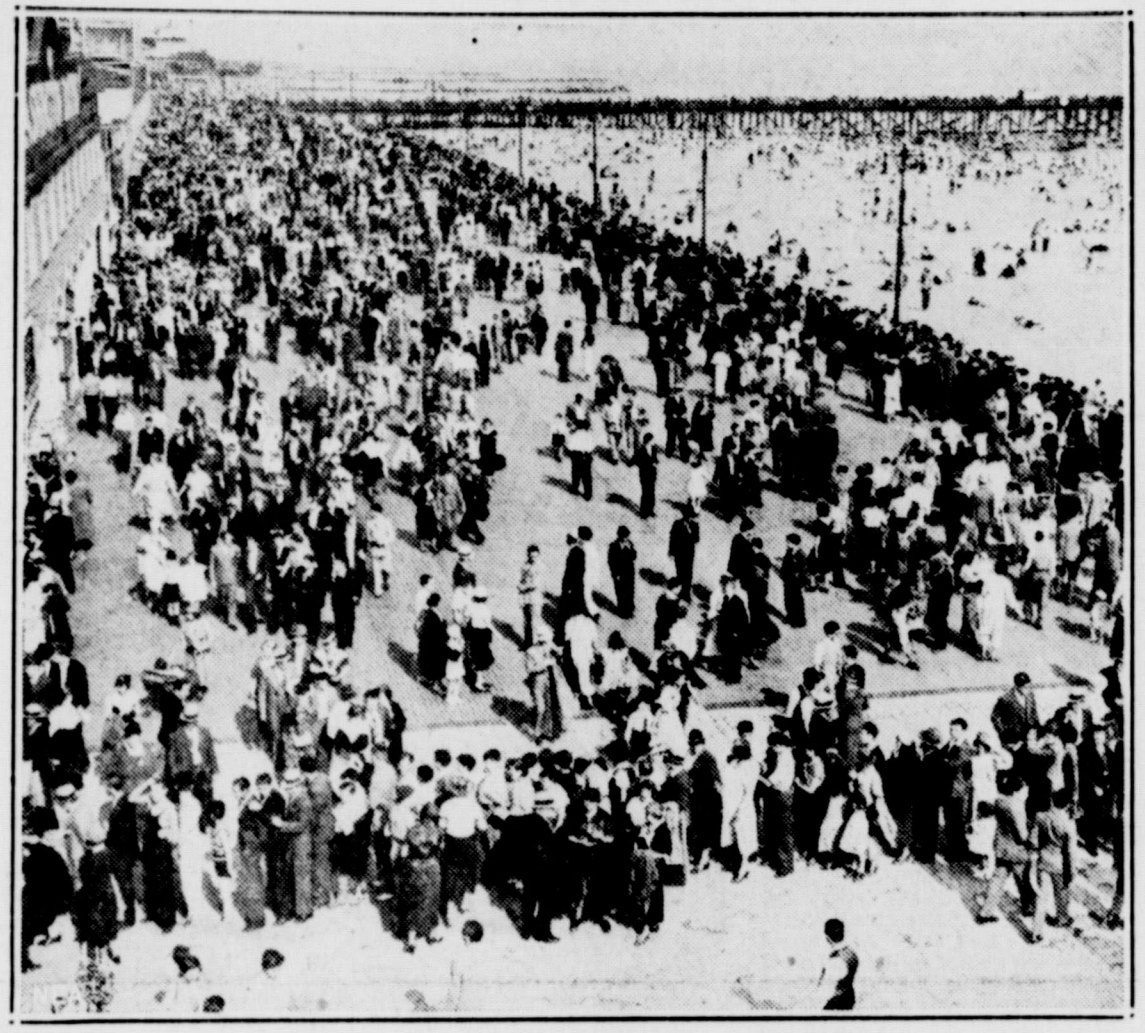
#### Car of Maytags Is Ordered for Cisco

 The initial include 44,909 votes from the three Eastern States of New York, New Jersey and Pennsylvania.  
 29,724 ballots, or 66.19 per cent of the total, are tallied "Yes" in answer to the question, "Do You Approve on the Whole the Acts and Policies of Roosevelt's First Year?" 15,185, or 33.81 per cent voted "No" to the query.  
 An analysis of how the same voters voted in 1932 reveals that 19.22 per cent of those who were for Roosevelt two years ago disapprove his policies now while 80.78 per cent who voted for him then support him now.  
 41.23 per cent of those who voted for Hoover in 1932 now vote in support of the administration's program while 58.77 per cent of the Hoover followers vote against the Roosevelt acts and policies.  
**67.20 Per Cent**  
 Of the 39,445 ballots received from New York state 26,506 or 67.20 per cent voted that they support the Roosevelt policies while 12,939 or 32.80 per cent answered that they disapproved the acts of the New Deal.  
 Of the 4,054 ballots mailed back from New Jersey voters 2,322 or 57.28 per cent vote in support of the Roosevelt policies and 1,732 or 42.72 per cent vote against them. New Jersey registers the strongest opposition voice among any of the three states tallied in the early returns.  
 1,410 ballots were received from Pennsylvania, of which 896, or 63.55 per cent vote affirmatively and 514, or 36.45 per cent vote negatively.  
 Of the total vote of 39,816,522 cast in the 1932 presidential election

Roosevelt then received 57.32 per cent to Hoover's 30.50 per cent.  
 "It would be rash to jump to the conclusion," The Literary Digest states editorially, "that the ultimate verdict of the referendum of 15,000,000 ballots, now in process of distribution over the entire country, is foreshadowed in this handful of early returns."  
 "The complexion of the poll this week may be transformed at any moment during succeeding weeks, as the return tide of ballots swells by degrees to its full strength and all the states contribute their quotas to the tabulation.  
 "Nevertheless the first figures will be studied with speculative interest especially in the light of the presidential election figures of 1932."  
 "The Literary Digest advises its readers to suspend judgment as to the continuance of Mr. Roosevelt's high score of 66.19 per cent in the present slight and sketchy initial report of the poll.  
 "Strange coincidences bob up in the handling of numbers. Some chance as rare as a 'perfect hand' at bridge may have given the president in this straw poll, up-to-date, the appearance of a proportional lead far exceeding that of his landslide in 1932.  
 "The balloting opponents of the New Deal are expressing their hostility with a vigor which suggests a hot and well-matched fight. Their letters breathe determination. Some of them scribble pungent comments on their ballots. 'I am living in a new Russia,' writes one.  
 "There are many controversies:  
 "Am in favor of impeaching Roosevelt.  
 "Very definite fascist policy with labor squelched (company unions).  
 "He is giving labor too much rope."  
 "He should grab the capitalistic

bull by the horns instead of grabbing him by the tail."  
 "But the 'No' voters are not the only ones to scribble on the ballots. 'He is the twentieth century savior to all Americans,' exclaims one
