#### THE DIGEST POLL

The Literary Digest has begun another of its national polls, the issue this time being the New Deal policies of President Roosevelt, whose election by a landslide in 1932 the Digest correctly forecast. Chief straws in the national political wind since 1920, these Digest polls have proved an accurate gauge of popular sentiment, foreshadowing the verdict of official voting upon every issue on which such a poll was taken. Results have so consistently been justified in official voting that the showings of a Digest poll are accepted as the next thing to such a vote and the results, therefore, a matter of serious concern to those interested. Both democrats and republicans will watch the verdict of this straw vote as a basis for campaign strategy next fall. #### TEXAS LEADS HIGHWAY WORKERS

It is conceded by American bankers and rail kings and industrialists of all types that Texas has been "the great white spot on the map of America during depression years. Now think of this: Texas has more than twice as many men at work on its highways today than any other state in the union according to reports to the federal public works administration. In other words, a total of 20,318 workers are on the highway payroll with Pennsylvania second in the list with 9,924 workers. New York leads all others as to population but not as to highway workers. Pennsylvania ranks second with New York first in wealth and population. Texas for the first time in many many years has been given due recognition by the powers that be under the big dome of the national capitol.

#### PREMIUMS AND FIRE LOSSES IN TEXAS

Fire insurance figures tell a story all their own. Texas insurers against fire losses paid \$21,807,803 in premiums and received back \$16.250,095 in losses in the year covered by the annual report of the Texas board of insurance commissioners ending last August 31. These represented premiums and losses of stocks in mutual fire companies, state, out-ofstate and foreign. Speaking of life insurance, according to the figures of the big and little companies, state and otherwise, there were a greater number of policies written last year than in any year since the depression "turned the American world upside down." Signs of vigorous life? Yes.

#### ANTICIPATE LARGE CROP OF WHEAT.

Texas wheat growers are in high spirits. Condition of the crop on May 1, 1934, was reported at 56 per cent of normal compared with 48 per cent a year ago, and 75 per cent for the 10-year average. Approximately 4,000,000 acres were sown in wheat last fall. Abandonment leaves 2,861,000 for harvest this year. An average yield of nine bushels per acre is indicated by the state bureau of the United States bureau of agriculture, or a total yield this year of 25,749,000 bushels. Prices paid Texas farmers for wheat increased from 42 cents per bushel in 1933 to 66 cents this year, as of March 15; for corn 36 cents to 64 cents; for cats 22 cents to 42.


