Those who are quick to see in the present decline in ac- wart opponents of the czar pro- in an appeal by W. T. Worthen tivity the threatened failure of the recovery program, neglect | _ seasonal facts. What they should appreciate is that such a decline is the best evidence of a return of normalcy. For the economic trend under the influence of the recovery measures is tracing a graph that parallels the usual course of business conditions during years in which no extraordinary measures were taken.

The present recession is in line with the normal decline from the spring peak. As such it should be regarded as encouraging, since it is evidence that the recovery plan to restore the country to normalcy is succeeding. As a matter of fact, conditions at the moment are justifying the predictions of the recovery administration in a remarkable way, Estimates of conditions upon which the NRA was predicated are below the percentages actually established. That fact s the significant consideration, and it ought to encourage a sane optimism. The recovery movement would be both unnatural and indicative of dangerous influences if it should move upward in a steady ascent, contrary to all economic history, which shows that trends proceed or recede in a succession of peaks, like waves. There is a trough between every wave. There is certainly nothing to be alarmed over when the movement at a time such as this is faithful to the record. On the contrary, that is sound reason for argument that the recovery is proceeding according to expectations.

According to Washington advices Texas farmers have received more than \$75,000,000 in farm mortgage loans from the farm credit administration of Houston during the first year of its existence. Moreover, this huge sum loaned by the Houston administration of the F. C. A. from May 27, 1933 to May 27, 1934 is more than 15 times as much as was loaned by the federal land bank of Houston during the entire year of 1932. All of which is a reminder that loans previously made by the land bank and other farm aid organizations in Texas, which was taken over by the F. C. A. when it was established, totaled approximately \$225,000,000, making the aggregate of outstanding farm loans in the Lone Star state more than \$300,000,000. And the figures show that more than 97 per cent of the \$75,000,000 loaned during the last 12 months, has been used by farmers to refinance already existing and pressing debts. Interest payments on the refinanced debts have averaged from 1 to 2 per cent lower since the federal government replaced private interests as creditor.






