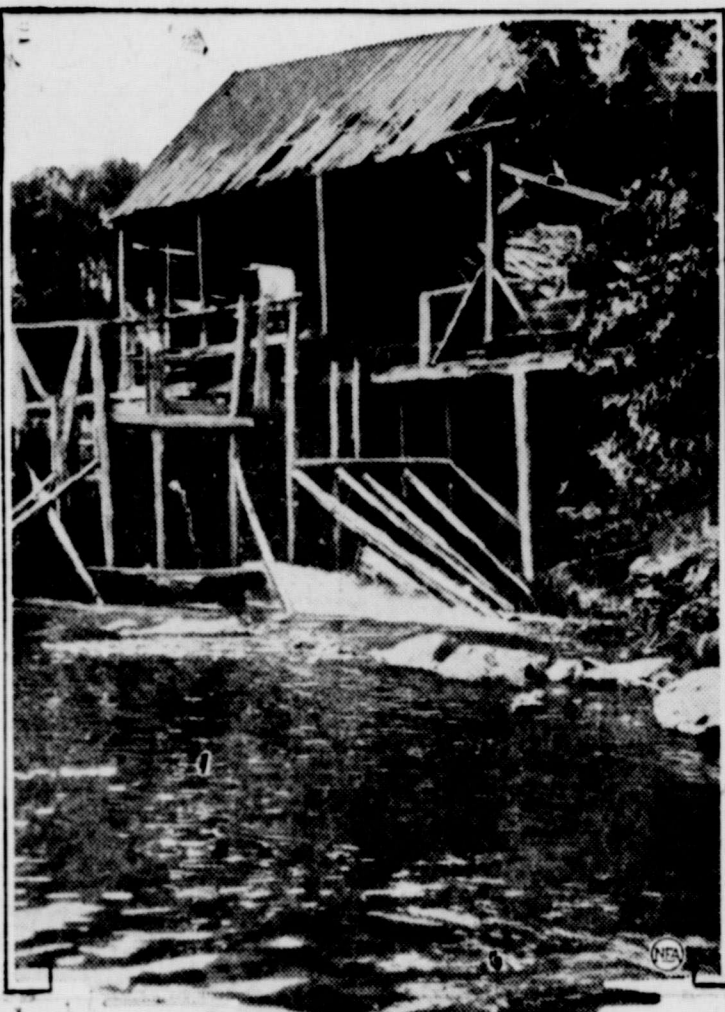

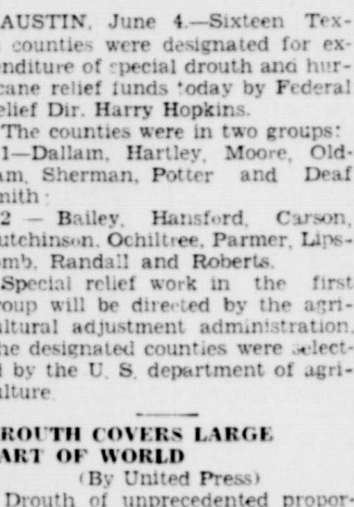
3 Cottonseed Ass'ns Charged by Comm'n

Grover Cleveland is in his grave. Bryan is in his grave. Cleveland to the end resisted the demands of the West and South for the remonetization of silver.

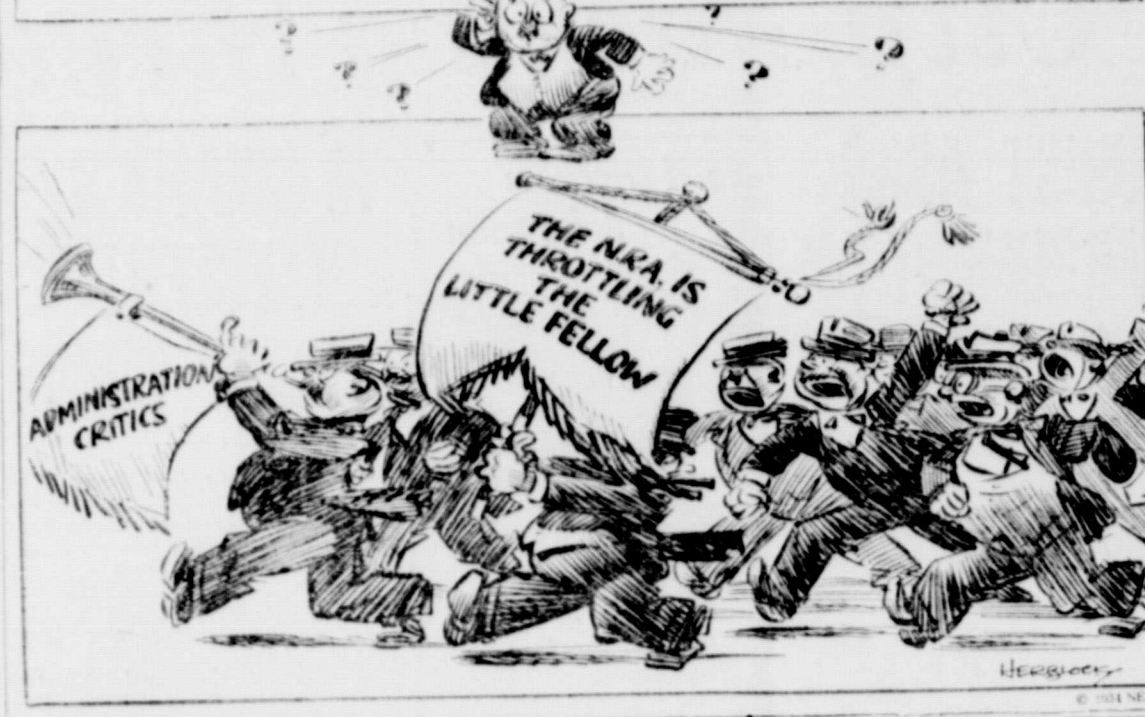
JOHN D. DESERTS EVERGLADES

It was rushed to the senate from the White House with a request for immediate ratification. Sen. Key Pittman of Nevada, a veteran democrat, is the chairman of the foreign relations committee. Sen. Pittman must have been a bit elated and if not elated, perturbed. This is what he said: "The treaty is the greatest pronouncement since the Monroe doctrine. It should end all jealousy and misunderstanding which has existed in Latin-American countries."

The state legislature has taken official action on most of the patriotic and sentimental observances. Exact dimensions of the Texas Lone Star flag are specified by an act of the legislature in 1933. The same act directs that it shall be flown with the white above the red.

The Lone Star became an official Texas symbol in 1839 when it was made the central part of a coat of arms adopted by the Republic of Texas. An oak wreath is used in this coat of arms, but the legislature in 1919 made the pecan the state tree. The bluetongue, or buffalo clover, became the state flower by act in 1901; in 1927 the mockingbird was made the state bird. "Texas Our Texas" was adopted as a state song by the legislature in 1930 and the same year "Friendship" was made the state motto.

Will Tucker, former Longview newspaper publisher, secretary-manager of the Texas game department, is given credit by the federal department of agriculture for originating a migratory bird program now being carried on by the federal department. Sanctuaries for migratory birds are being established in concentration areas and also at places along the usual course of flight. Drainage of submarsh lands has been stopped on realization that the lands fostered more value in game birds than in the crops of great grain produced through swamp reclamation.

Relief service workers will go into classified positions in June under a system worked out to reduce administrative expense of relief. Economies are expected to reach \$275,000 a month or a little more than an average of \$1,000 a county. If expectations are met, the administrative cost will be reduced by about half. Reduction of personnel is estimated to save \$180,000 a month; purchase reforms \$30,000 a month; and classification of work \$65,000. The plan seeks to pay the same salary for the same type of work all over the state.

Dr. Truett Speaker for Texas University Baccalaureate Services Sunday, June 3rd

AUSTIN, June 4 — No more distinguished representative of the Baptist denomination could have been procured to deliver the baccalaureate address at the University of Texas than Dr. George W. Truett, for 37 years pastor of the First Baptist church of Dallas, according to Dr. W. H. McKenzie of the University Baptist church. Dr. Truett spoke to approximately seven hundred candidates for degrees as well as to an audience of many hundred more Sunday evening, June 3.

Dr. Truett has served his denomination in nearly every capacity a minister could serve. Dr. McKenzie pointed out. For many years he has been reckoned as the foremost Baptist preacher in the South and by many is counted the greatest preacher of his denomination in America. He has recently returned from London where he participated in services in the special meetings honoring the memory of Great Britain's most famous Baptist preacher, Charles Haddon Spurgeon. He spoke many times during the twelve days he was in England and Scotland but there were two outstanding addresses of importance: First, the missionary sermon for the Baptist Union of Great Britain and Ireland; the other when he spoke in Royal Albert hall at a great mass meeting honoring the memory of Spurgeon.

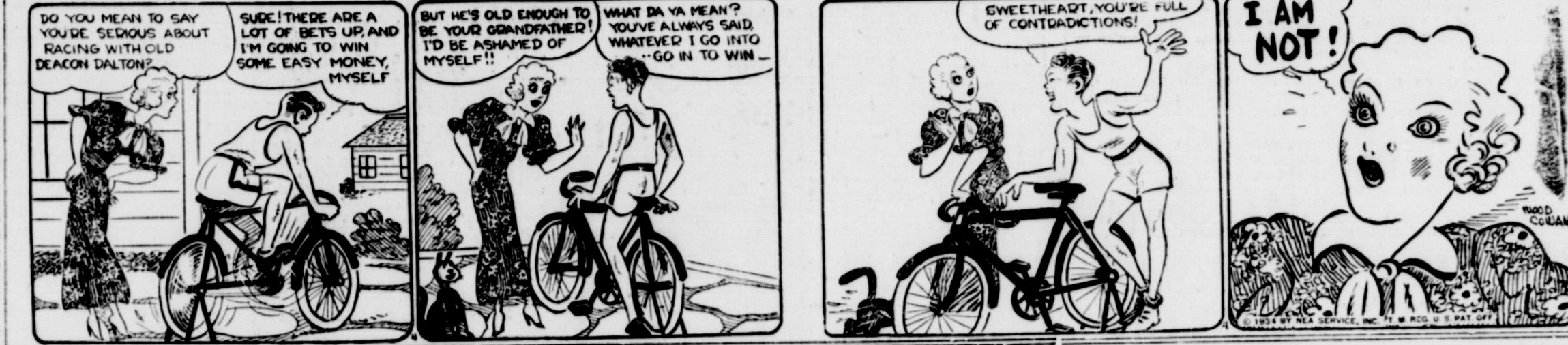
On the latter occasion, he spoke from the same platform and in the same service with the prime minister of Great Britain, Ramsey MacDonald. There were ten thousand paid admissions to this service and the hall was sold out two weeks before the time of the meeting. Twenty thousand more made application for seats. Centennial Address. Dr. Truett has been besieged to deliver his Spurgeon Centennial address in many sections of this country and since his return from Great Britain has delivered it in New York City as the guest of the various evangelical denominations of that city! In Philadelphia before a meeting of the oldest Baptist association in America, and in Fort Worth before the recent session of the Southern Baptist convention Dr. Truett has frequently been heard in Austin.

But has never before preached a commencement sermon for the University of Texas. Dr. Truett is a native of Clay county, North Carolina, but came to Texas with his parents in young manhood. He was graduated from Baylor university in 1897 after he had led the Baptists of this state in a memorable campaign to free the school from debt. He went to Dallas to become pastor of the First Baptist church soon after his graduation, and he has remained there for 7 years, declining many invitations to churches in other sections of the country. He has built up a membership in this church of more than five thousand. In addition to the bachelor of arts degree, he holds honorary degrees of doctor of divinity from Baylor university in Waco, Texas, and from McMaster university of Toronto, Canada. He has received the degree of doctor of laws from his alma mater and several other institutions. From his youth George Truett showed signs of promise as a preacher of unusual power. Dr. McKenzie pointed out. Once the young man went down to Marietta, Ga. where the Georgia Baptist convention was in session. Ferd C. McConnell called him to the platform. The story is told that he swept that group of religious folks off their feet as it had never been done before. A great Atlanta preacher said that he had heard Henry Grady at his best, but that nothing had ever so moved his soul as did the powers of this young man from the backwoods of North Carolina.

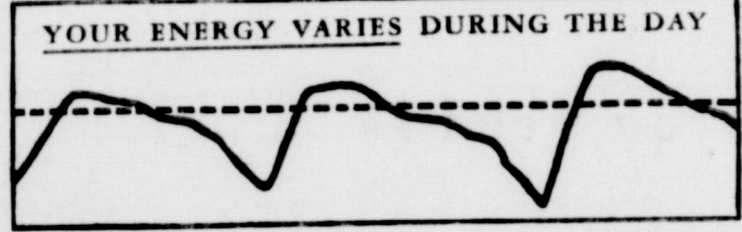

Texas Observatory Disk Is Unbroken

FT. DAVIS, June 4 — Reports that the big mirror glass for the McDonald observatory to be erected near here on Mount Locke had been broken and ruined in the grinding process were incorrect, according to a letter reaching Ft. Davis from Dr. Otto Struve, director of McDonald and Yerkes observatories.

There was some damage, it is understood, around the edges of the 29-inch, two and one-half ton disk. "I inspected the glass disk for the mirror," Dr. Struve said in the letter, "and found that while almost perfect, it would be necessary to reheat it and to anneal it a second time. This will require about four months." The annealing process reduces

brittleness and increases softness. "The disk" the eminent astronomer continued, "could probably be used as it is. We are merely using the maximum degree of caution in order to obtain the best glass disk that has ever been produced."

Dr. Struve added that the steel dome of the observatory has been partly erected at Cleveland, O., by the steel contractors and that construction on the mountain here will be started in June.

It has been the intention of the

contractors to erect the dome on the manufacturing site so as to get its every rivet hole and curve fabricated and fitted accurately before bringing the steel to this remote place where it would be difficult to remedy faults. 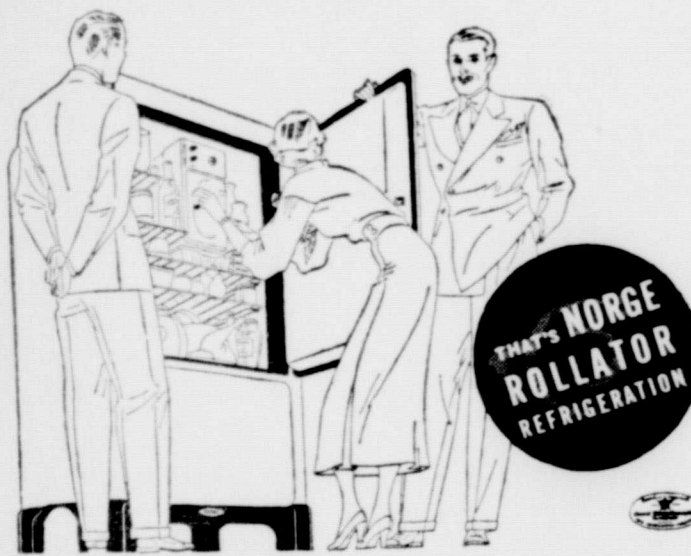
