





SPURRING CONGRESS

Congress enters the "home" stretch of the legislative course with two pressing objectives in mind, i. e., to pass certain measures held important to Mr. Roosevelt's recovery program, and to get out of Washington and out of the national mind as quickly as possible. The administration has succeeded admirably in handling the congress over a long and trying period such as has meant grief untold to previous presidents, and it will succeed, apparently, in keeping the legislators out of mischief and bringing the session to a quick adjournment. In the present success, the president has been aided partly by the dominant democratic majority which took its cue from the evident popularity of the man in the White House, and partly by the president's skill in thinking a few jumps ahead of the legislators and keeping them at work upon programs which even those who witnessed violence to their personal creeds and opinions were unprepared to oppose. The president revealed an adroit way of dangling a new red apple in front of the congressional nose just to hasten it over the final difficulties of a previous request. 


