

Dun and company, there were only 15 business failures during against 19 in April and 61 in May, 1933, declines of 21 and 75 per cent respectively. Total liabilities of \$142,-000 represented a decline of 40 per cent from April and 72 per cent from May last year, while average liabilities per failure of \$9,467 were down 24 per cent from April and 50 per cent from May a year ago.

Hence, I am looking for a sound means which I can recommend to provide at once security against several of the great disturbing factors of life- especially those which relate

to unemployment and old age. "I believe there should be a maxmuni of cooperation between the state and the federal government. I believe that the funds necessary to provide this insurance raised by contributions rather than

George W. Truett said, "the greed of man, the lack of humanity or the Christian spirit in the hearts and souls of the leaders of Europe, led to an unholy war which almost wrecked civilization." He implored the young men and women of the graduating class and all the people everywhere to battle for a public sentiment not only in this nation but the world over to make war impossible in the future. In other words, he said eloquently and appealingly, "War almost wrecks civilization. Now civilization must] wreck war, or civilization will perish from the face of the

There have been holy wars in the past fought for the freedom of and the rights of men. There have been unholy wars, and the World war was unholy in the sense that it was not a war waged for the uplift of mankind or a war waged "to prevent future wars." The last was the dream of Woodrow Wilson. He lost. He went to his grave broken hearted. His dream did not come true for the reason that the greed of man is ever uppermost and under the surface there has ever been the slogan of the mighty, "the devil take the hindmost." Perhaps the New Deal legislation, speaking of the social order of today the world over, may dislodge Mars from his position and make it possible for civilized man to save the boys and girls of today from the wreckers who are to be found on all continents and in all climes and under all flags ever thinking of the almighty dollar.

MUSSOLINI A BUILDER OF BATTLESHIPS

Mussolini is one of the most remarkable men walking the stage of action. Italy will construct three large battleships with general specifications similar to those of the French battleships, which are said "to lead all the rest." The new vessels ordered by Il Duce will be completed by 1940 and will cost about \$85,000,000. All of which is a reminder that Italy never availed herself of naval tonnage granted her by the Washington treaty. Indeed, Mussolini has concentrated on constructing fast cruisers of from 5000 to 7000 tons. Now in the next six years Italy will strengthen and modernize its air fleet. Expenditures for new dreadnaughts will be distributed among six budgets and the capital expenditure will be in addition to appropriations to modernize old battleships in the coming six years. Moreover, the appropriations for aviation will total a very large sum of money. It is the same old story of all the ages: "Peace is found in the cemetery and nowhere else."


