Century Plant Preparing to Bloom

For the second year in succession Dr. and Mrs. D. Ball will have a blooming century plant when the buds upon a 15-foot stem in their cacti beds at 608 West Seventh open as they are expected to do this week.

The plant is growing among 260 different cacti in attractive natural rock beds upon the

parkway before their home. The stem started up several weeks ago and is now covered with buds which are almost ready to burst open.

After a century plant blooms it dies, said Dr. Ball. He has several more young century plants of differing varieties, but none of them will probably bloom for many years, he said.

LOTTERIES

Millions of dollars annually are being sucked out of the United States each year by national lotteries of France, Ireland and other European countries. A percentage of this comes back to this country in the form of winnings, some of these in large enough single amounts to excite the covetuousness of the average American and to cultivate a fertile field for succeeding lotteries. Based upon the most probable estimates of chance, about five dollars leaves this country for the purchase of tickets in these lotteries for every dollar that comes back.

In some quarters a cry has been raised for abrogation of the present American ban against lotteries on the score that the establishing of such institutions of wholesale gambling will react against the mania that is taking so much good American money out of the country and turning it into foreign treasuries. The demand represents either an immoral opportunism or a gross ignorance of human nature. Texas' experience with race-track gambling since the law permitting pari mutuel betting was enacted a year ago is proof enough of what would happen in the event lotteries were permitted in this country. According to reports from the of fice of the Texas secretary of state charters granted during May totaled 120, a gain of 6.2 per cent over April but a decline of 21 per cent May last year. Capitalization of \$1,-269,020 was 5.4 per cent less than in April and 36 per cent below May a year ago.

Only one group, merchandising, showed an increase over May last year, and that of only 3 per cent. On the other hand, a number of groups showed increases over April of the current year: Manufacturing concerns, 21 chartered, against 10 in ds. treasury notes, bills.












The Commander-in-Chief Off to Review Navy's Might
