INDUSTRIAL RATE NO. 1

For the first fifty thousand cubic feet of gas sold a minimum rate of forty-five cents per thousand cubic feet; for all gas sold over and above fifty thousand cubic feet and up to two hundred thousand cubic feet a minimum rate of twenty-seven cents per thousand cubic feet.

INDUSTRIAL RATE NO. 2

For the first one hundred fifty thousand cubic feet of gas sold a minimum rate of thirty cents per thousand cubic feet; for all gas sold over and above one hundred fifty thousand cubic feet and up to three hundred thousand cubic feet a minimum rate of twenty-two cents per thousand cubic feet.

CISCO DRUBS DUBLIN TWICE HERE SUNDAY

Led by two veteran stars of west Texas amateur baseball, "Satch" Henson and Jack Phippen, Cisco ended the first half of the New Deal league's season with two victories over Dublin here Sunday afternoon, 3-1 and 3-2. These wins placed the locals far ahead of the rest of the teams with the remarkable record of 14 wins and 2 losses.

Henson who is recognized as probably the best performer in West Texas, had everything his own way in the first game. His change of pace clever selection of pitches, and timely hitting iced the game. Toward the end of the game he was hit rather freely but they were never bunched until the final inning. Great fielding by M.-Call, Harris, Phippen and Van Horn saved him in several instances.

In the last of second Henson doubled beautifully down the third base line to score Philpott, and advanced to third on a wild pitch. Smith and Van Horn walked, but Jack Phippen forced Henson at the plate to retire the side without any further damage. In the third Tabor got a good hit through second base and went to second on an error. But the next three men grounded out, struck out, and flew out respectively.

Henson Talks

After McCall had struck out to start the fourth, Henson hit a beautiful triple down third base. Smith struck out, but Van Horn delivered with a hard hit single through the shortstop. Henson talking, Phippen filed out to the short stop.

In the seventh Tabor got a life after McCall made an error of his grounder. Harris bunted him down to second. Then Philpott doubled to left, scoring Tabor. McCall beat out a slow roller and Henson was walked purposely, but Smith and Allen were out on grounders to second.

Curry, right fielder for Dublin, scored in the eighth on a double, sacrifice, and Texas Leaguer. The visitors got only seven hits off Henson, all of them scattered. The locals gathered nine hits off Gee, Dublin ace.

Phippen's Performance

The second game was characterized by the brilliant performance of Phippen, local third baseman. He handled six assists without a error and made three beautiful hits, the first a stinging triple into the foot-ball field, the second a well placed single, and the last a clean hit smash to left field that scored Smith with the winning run in the seventh. After his triple in the third he was scored by Tabor's single. In the sixth the flashy third baseman was again scored after his single when Harris followed with a hard hit triple to right.

UNCLE SAM IS FOUR BILLION IN RED FOR FISCAL YEAR CLOSING

WASHINGTON, June 25.—The United States government this week closes its books on the largest peacetime deficit in history—approximately \$4,000,000,000.

Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau, Jr., drew plans for even heavier spending in the new fiscal year beginning July 1.

The current fiscal year ending June 30 is the fourth successive 12-month period the federal government's expenses have exceeded income and consequently the fourth successive year the government has not balanced its budget.

Four Billion Deficit

In the current fiscal year the government has spent approximately \$7,000,000,000 and received \$3,000,000,000 from taxes, customs and

other sources, leaving a deficit of \$4,000,000,000.

The government will "run in the red" even deeper in the next fiscal year. On the basis of budget estimates, the government next year will spend \$10,500,000,000 and receive in income \$4,250,000,000 leaving a prospective deficit of \$6,250,000,000.

After the next fiscal year, administration officials are hopeful a "balanced budget" will be attained under which the government's income will balance expenditures. Excessive relief needs, however, may even make impossible the attainment of a balanced budget in the 1936 fiscal year which begins July 1, 1935.

Break Peace Time Records

The four successive deficits are the largest of any other peacetime period in history. The government in the 1931 fiscal year which ended June 30, 1931, "ran in the red" \$907,416,845. In the 1932 fiscal year

The deficit rose to \$3,153,097,507 when income of the government fell, in the 1933 fiscal year the deficit fell off slightly to \$3,068,296,874 following heavy governmental economies and increased taxes. For the current fiscal year ending this week the deficit reached approximately \$4,000,000,000. Although this year's deficit brings the accumulated federal deficit for the last four years to approximately \$11,000,000,000, all of which has had to be made up by borrowings, it still is below the \$13,370,637,569 record deficit sustained in the war period in the single 1919 fiscal year.
