COTTON GROWERS FACING "THE SHOWDOWN"

Cotton is the second money crop of Texas. Petroleum ranks first. Texas produced 4,220,775 bales of cotton in 1933. The county allotment as provided by the Bankhead act has been announced by the department of agriculture. Texas growers will be permitted to harvest 3,237,530 tax free bales of the yield of 1934. There is a total cut of 982,-000 to be divided among the counties. According to Washington advices only five Texas counties will be allowed to produce over 50,000 bales of tax free cotton this year. In 1933, according to the bureau announcement, 23 Texas counties produced more than 50,000 bales. A reminder that the 10,000,000 bales fixed in the act as the maximum crop which may be marketed without paying the tax of 50 per cent of its market value were distributed among the 19 cotton states and the 1,000 cotton producing counties, according to their average production during the years 1928-1932 inclusive. #### TEXAS PHYSICIANS AS SELLERS OF NARCOTICS

Texas has a state board of medical examiners. These examiners held an important session in the city of Fort Worth. They revoked the licenses of 30 doctors for use of narcotics for themselves and for illegal sale of narcotics. Another 35 were placed on probation. Names of the doctors were not disclosed, but the president of the board of examiners in an interview said to press representatives that most of those whose licenses were revoked were between 60 and 70 years of age, and added that a total of 37 licenses had been revoked since passage of the Texas narcotic law in 1935. "It is a pathetic situation but we cannot have men who are dope addicts handling the sick," he said.

#### HOPKINS PLANNING VAST HOUSING DRIVE

Harry L. Hopkins is said to be slated as head of the federal housing administration. He is functioning as the federal relief boss. The new law authorizes the government "to make good homes cheaper and more numerous." Here are the principal developments expected by the administration program to start within 30 days. This provides that any property owner may borrow up to \$2,000 to recondition his buildings. The money will come from a bank or rather private source, not the government excepting distress cases -but the United States will guarantee 20 per cent of the loan. Second insurance of building and loan shares becomes effective almost immediately. Some day the people may have a paradise here below—as well as an eternal paradise up above or across the invisible river.

#### A HINT TO THE LAWMAKERS OF TEXAS

Texas has been allotted \$12,000,000 for the emergency road building program. A hint to the Texas highway commissioners and another hint to the governor and the lawmakers of Texas: "The new act provides that states which divert gasoline tax revenues for purposes other than for roads may be penalized to the extent of one-third of their apportionment of federal plums from 1936 and 1937 or succeeding years." 



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
