### Troops Called Out to Curb Longshoremen Strike Violence

#### TWO MEN DEAD RIOTING IN SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—While the military preserved order on San Francisco's waterfront today, embattled strikers reached out of the city stopping trucks on the highway and agitating unrest in the fruit harvest. Violence in Alameda, across San Francisco bay, resulted in the serious wounding of one man.

Violence in the two-months old longshoremen's strike at San Francisco resulted in the death of two men, the wounding of scores, and brought troops to the scene today to curb disorders.

The strike, which had tied up West Coast shipping since May 9, broke into serious rioting when an attempt was made to open the port running the strike picket blockade on the Atlantic coast. Disorders flared at Bridge-town, N. J., where several hundred angry farmers facing the striking employes of the huge Brook farm. Four men were hurt in a clash.

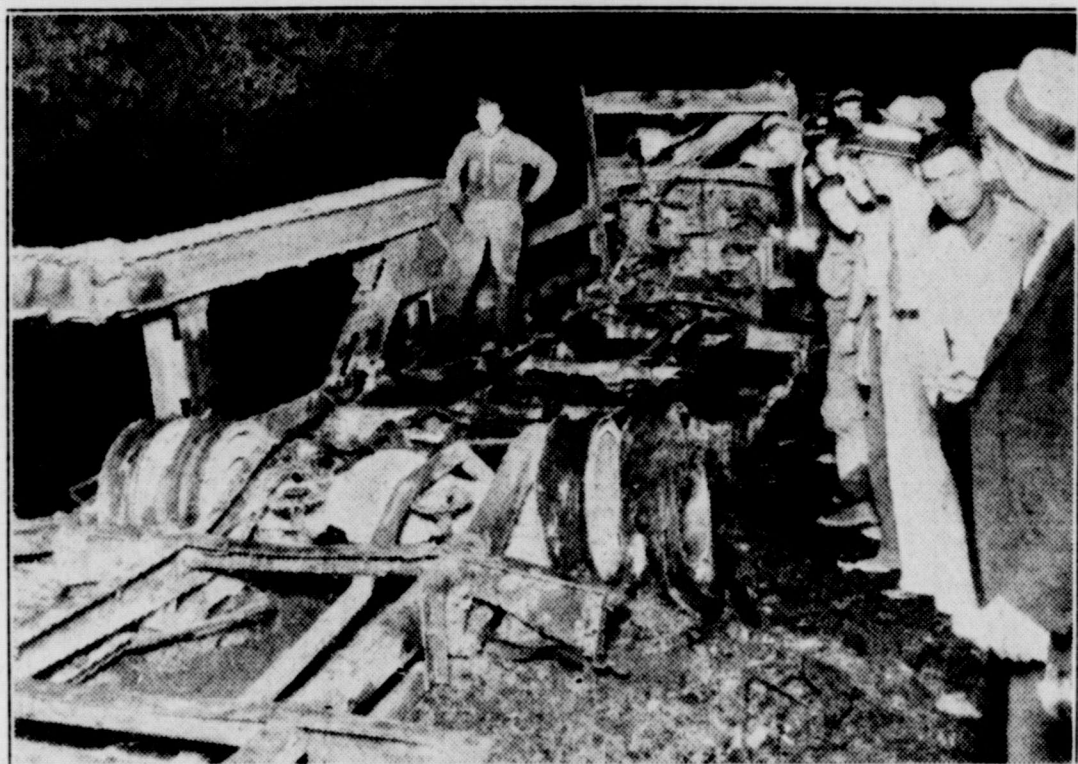
#### G. and Petroleum Will Play Tonight

Where 14 Were Trapped in Burning Bus



Upper photo shows how the metal bridge railing was melted by the intense heat when a Greyhound bus burned near Lancaster, trapping fourteen passengers. The remains of the bodies of the four who perished were found about two feet in front of the left rear wheels. Although the back of his neck was so painfully burned he could hardly rest his head on the pillow, Bob Downs, driver of the bus, rolled over on his back and posed for the lower picture. Downs could have escaped without injury, but he stayed at his post and saved the lives of 10 of his passengers.

#### BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT IN ALL LINES MARKS FIRST HALF OF '34

NEW YORK, July 6.—Business improvement in nearly all lines, higher bond and commodity prices, and lower stock prices, with almost complete lethargy developing in the latter, marked the first half of 1934. While there were still many uncertainties in the world situation, experts believed the gains in business would continue after the usual seasonal recessions due in the third quarter. Wall Street hopes for a rise in stocks, although it is still under the influence of fear over operation of the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, part of which became effective July 1.



#### Britain and U. S. at Naval Talk Impasse

LONDON, Eng., July 6.—Great Britain and the United States in three weeks of naval negotiations, have failed to bridge their difficulties, it was learned authoritatively today.

Indications were that the negotiations might soon be adjourned until August and that thereafter an agreement might be reached to put the future battleship limit at 30,000 tons.
