New Republican Commander Officially Opens Campaign

PRESENT NAT'L REGIME CALLED "MEDDLESOME"

Eastland, Mich., July 7 — Henry Fletcher, republican generalissimo, officially opened the party's campaign today, picturing the present administration as a meddling dictatorship put in power by a stampede of congressmen.

Fletcher described the national government as a "vast network and web of bureaucratic agencies," by means of which, he said, the president is administering power and authority comparable only to that of Hitler and Mussolini.

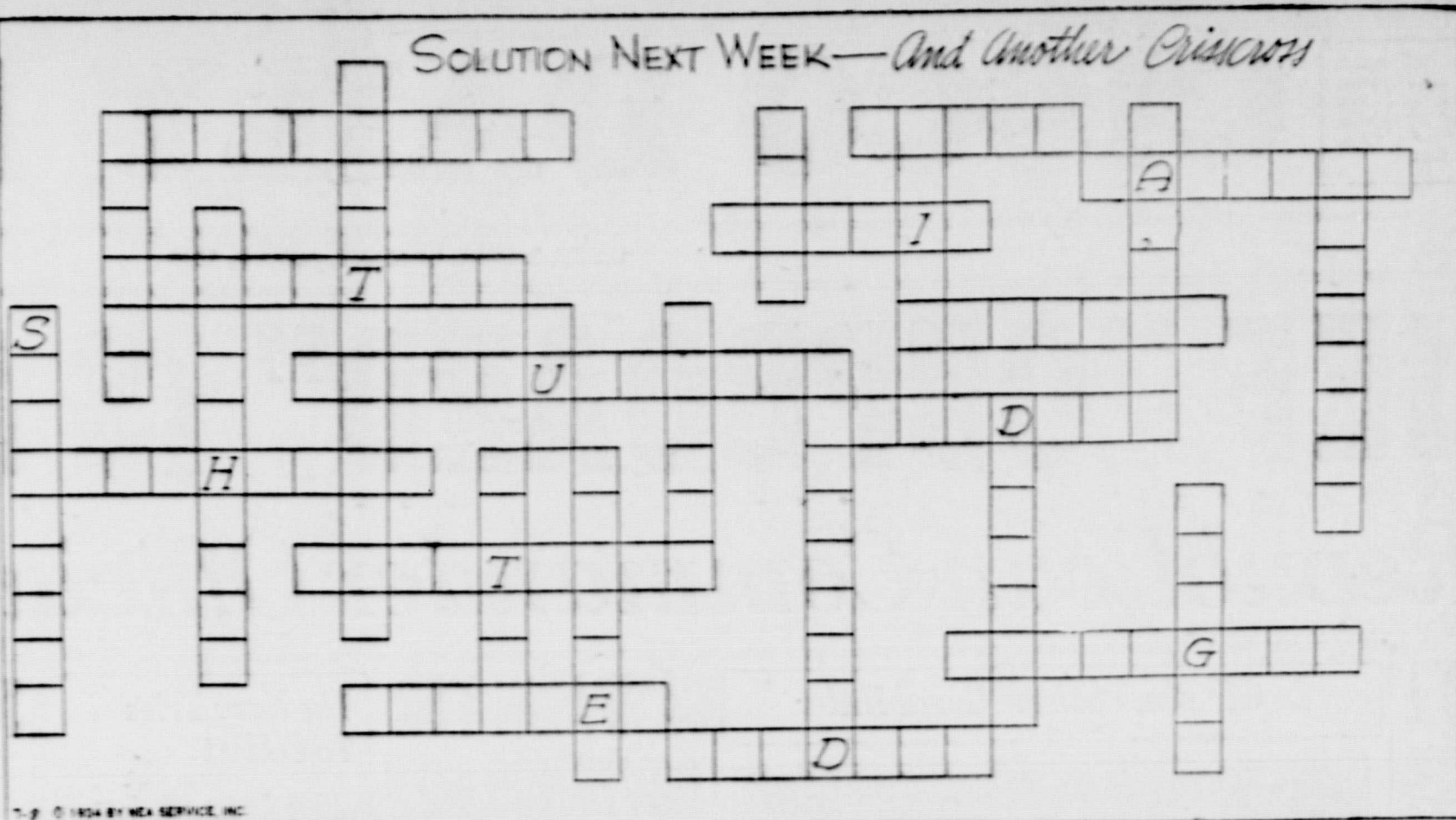
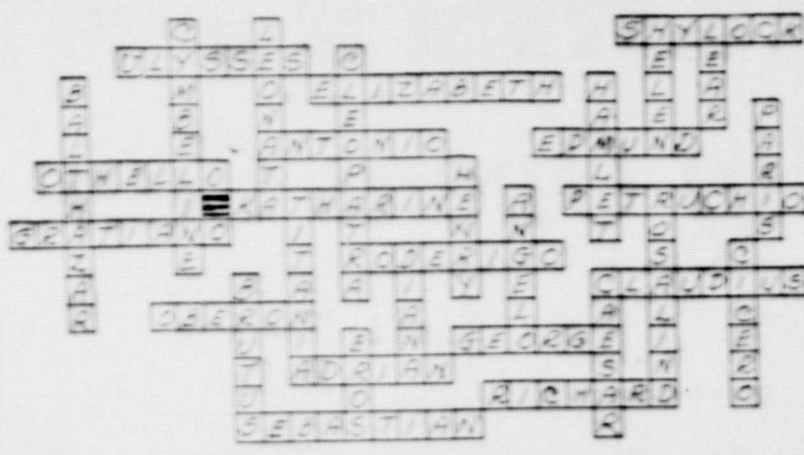

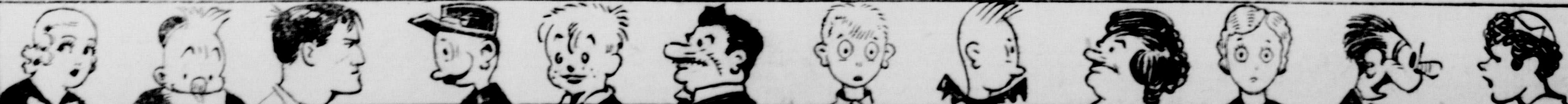

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MOVEMENT FOR CLEAN PICTURES UNDERTAKEN

HOUSTON, July 7 — A movement to get indecent motion pictures in Houston has been started by the Legion of Decency. The legion called for 20,000 House members to assist in the drive against these movies by pledging themselves to attend.

The Legion of Decency was organized locally last week when sentiment throughout the state began to be expressed publicly.

A favorable reaction to the campaign and to the legion, sponsored by Catholic clergy, is growing. Rev. George A. Wilhelm, pastor of the Holy Name Catholic church and leader of the movement for cleaner movies, said he was glad of cooperation from the Minuteman Alliance and the Baptist League at its conference.

Members of the legion are to boycott theaters that insist on billing indecent pictures. They are considered "indecent" until management agrees to "clean up" the picture.

Rev. Mr. Wilhelm said:

"Real Need"

Cleaner movies are a real need. I am sure favorable reaction is forthcoming from the Alliance. Secretary F. C. Fields said he has discussed the matter and that the project has our sympathy. We hope the force of public opinion will aid us to get cleaner pictures and to uphold all morals."

Father Wilhelm said, "The picture getting steadily worse, coming to a climax this past spring with a series of indecent films."

It was only through such a league that the drive against these indecent pictures could be made successful.

In the years we have been urging motion picture industry to cut out the rough stuff," he said. "But they laughed at us. We know that shows draw better crowds of salacious ones, and we will that to the movie people with the Legion of Decency."

Millions of Names

The Legion is getting millions of names from right thinking people over the nation, he said, and pledge cards are being distributed in Houston.

Father Wilhelm said he was certain similar legions would be organized in other Texas cities. He understood were making a clean-up drive.

The movies have a wonderful opportunity for presenting worthwhile shows, but they have been degraded and put in the honky-tonk he asserted.

Something terrible has happened in America since the World war, a sort of moral breakdown. It is time for America to wake up and over the jazz age.

We should end this deluge of rot, movies, indecent dances that have been introduced here from America, and other phases of moral attitudes."

The Legion of Decency leader said that in order to do this there should be an effort made toward a franchise.

It doesn't mean prohibition, because while that is a fine ideal, we think it is not practical."

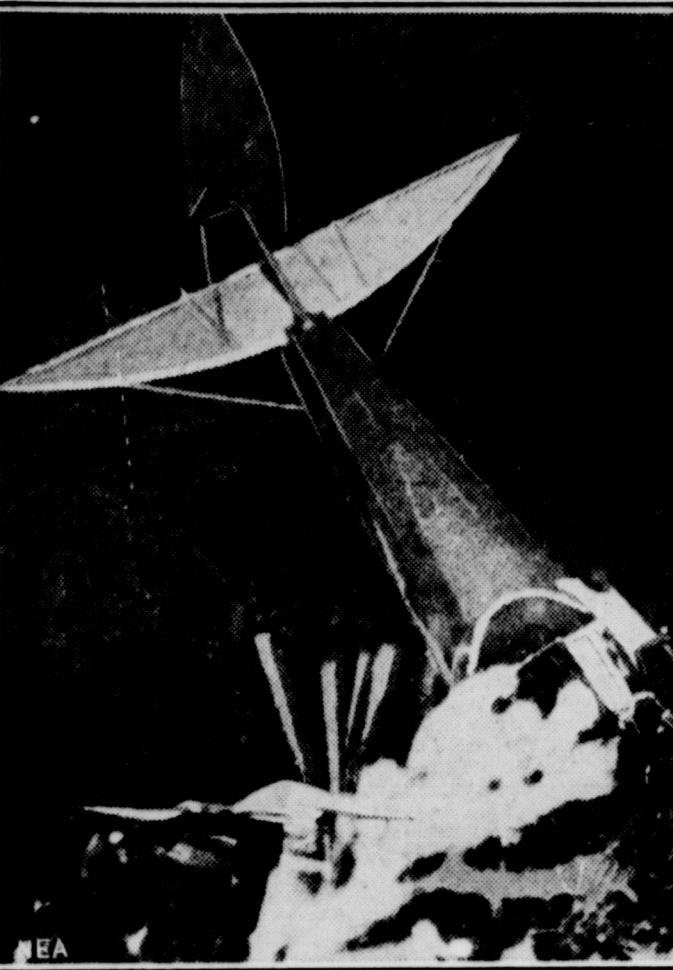
Witt Promises to Stop Oil Running

MINEOLA, July 7 — For an hour this afternoon Edgar Witt broke his campaigning for the governorship just to talk to fifty men encountered at random in the east Texas oil field. On his way home to Waco he spoke here in late afternoon, stressing the importance of the oil industry to Texas, as he has learned it in the extensive dealing in its problems as lieutenant governor, and said there is power of executive in the governor's office to put a stop to this illicit oil running; give me the office and I'll stop it or give the office back to you."

NAT'L MOTHER SCHOOL PLANS CONSOLIDATED

SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 7 — Schooling program designed to teach German mothers how to be "bodily and spiritually capable" has been brought forward by the official Reich Mother Service.

It is an extension of work which had been going on for a long time before under the direction of several organizations and which now will be consolidated under a unified course plan.

The care and rearing of children are not the only categories included. There will be extensive courses in other housekeeping duties, forming a natural corollary of the drive to instruct school girls in all types of housework.

In urban districts authorities will endeavor to establish "mother schools" as speedily as possible. In the country, where this would be obviously impossible, "wander courses" moving from district to district, will be substituted.

Aside from practical, moral and religious qualifications, the teachers must satisfactorily qualify on political grounds. As far as possible, since religious instruction will be an important part of the curriculum, Catholic students will be placed under Catholic teachers, Evangelical under Evangelical, and so on. A special church body will oversee the religious aspects of the program.

Roughly the course will be divided into two headings, namely general and specific schooling.

Special Labor Dep't Is Woodward Promise

JASPER, July 7 — A special department to take care of all labor problems was promised by State Senator Walter Woodward, who asked a large crowd here Saturday afternoon to elect him attorney-general.

"There are now assistants in the attorney-general's office who specialize in banking, schools and other state departments," Senator Woodward said. "I plan to add a new department to take care of all labor problems where it is in the power of the attorney-general to give assistance to labor. It would offer every aid to labor in obtaining its rights under our state laws."

"For instance, this department would assist, in such ways as are proper, workers who have claims before the state compensation board. It will be of particular importance to labor to have special legal aid from the state at this time in the midst of our recovery drive when labor is coming back into its own along new paths through the plans of the National Recovery administration."

Old Age Pensions Stressed by Hughes

BENARNOLD, July 7 — Men and women who give their productive years of labor to society should not be relegated to the poor-house in their old age, former State Democratic Chairman Maury Hughes of Dallas, candidate for governor, declared in an address here Friday night. He spoke earlier in the day in Giddings, Bastrop and Rockdale.

If elected, he will put forth every effort to have Texas do its part in President Roosevelt's program for old age pension allowances by the state governments, Mr. Hughes said.

"It is shameful to think that in this country employers of labor use men and women while they are the most useful, and then discard them," Mr. Hughes said. "Nothing is more tragic than an aged man or woman having to go to the poor-house."

"In this country, most of us have to work for a living. A large per cent reach old age without an estate. Then it is necessary for them to live

on charity, on relatives, or on their children. That means that millions of people inherit poverty. Both they and the aged suffer.

"I favor a pension check of from \$15 to \$30 per month for the aged who have been taken out of productive employment and have no other income."

GOV. MYERS AND FARM DEBT HOLIDAY

Gov. W. L. Myers of the federal farm credit administration is in the picture. He has taken the viewpoint that financing of farm mortgage indebtedness by his organization has done away with any need for wide use of the Frazier-Lemke farm debt moratorium bill approved by President Roosevelt. This measure was signed over the protest of representatives of insurance companies or other large holders of farm mortgage paper.

FEEDING NEEDY IN JULY

Federal Relief Administrator Harry L. Hopkins announced on the last day of June his agency would expand approximately \$70,000,000 to aid needy families in 41 states and three territories during July. Allotment for seven states, including Texas, had not been agreed upon, but is expected to bring the total well over \$100,000,000.

Notwithstanding all this, the Dun and Bradstreet weekly trade review issued on the last day of June editorially said: "While the trade time undoubtedly is ebbing from the standpoint of sales and earnings, a gradual but irregular uptrend is noticeable in practically all major lines."

All the experiments and New Deal recovery and relief acts or experiments are to be given the acid test the coming six months, according to the prophets of the hour and the critics of the administration.

THOMAS CALLS FOR FARM-LABOR PARTY.

Norman Thomas is the chief apostle of right wing socialists in this republic. He has been nominated by the socialists of New York as their candidate for the office of United States senator at the November election. He was a minister of the gospel before he became a socialist.

Speaking through the Today magazine columns, he advises the formation of a national farm-labor party for the campaign of 1936. He would "preserve the rule of democracy but he would destroy capitalism and substitute for the same co-operative commonwealth system with profit eliminated."

RETIREMENT PENSION FOR RAIL WORKERS

President Roosevelt signed the Crosser bill which sets up a retirement pension system for railroad workers. The legislation provided retirement would come to railroad employees at the age of 65. It compels both the workers and their employers to contribute to a retirement fund.

Bond Asked
The statement said that if the applicants for a franchise will evidence their "good faith" by satisfying us that he has a contract and bond which will guarantee to us performance if a franchise be granted, that "we will be glad to consider the matter thoroughly" and act in accord with what are considered the best interests of the community.

The history of independent gas franchises, the statement said, has been that where granted without actual contract and bond, the franchise dies from non-use. COSMIC RAYS STILL MYSTERY TO SCIENTISTS

DELAWARE, O., July 7 — Cosmic rays are distinguished as Number One problem of physicists by two things — ignorance of most of the facts concerning them and the exciting possibilities of their uses when more is known of their make-up.

Science has noted certain effects in delicate instruments which demonstrate presence of these hitherto unknown rays and is seeking the cause of these effects. Laymen, however, with imaginations inflamed by the spectacular researches, are impatient of the laborious scientific method and ask a practical demonstration of existence of the rays and a proof of their value.

Such is the picture of the situation given here by Dr. Arthur H. Compton, Chicago university physicist, who was co-winner of the Nobel Prize in this field in 1927. He is an authority on cosmic rays.

Conjectures
"I believe they consist mostly of protons, which are positively-charged nuclei of atoms," he said, "that is, charged particles, similar to electrons. We believe that they cause electrical disturbances. Some day science may find out what these rays do."

Popular understanding of cosmic rays in the realm of physics may be aided, it was pointed out, by a classification of rays of which more is known, but most of which once were as mysterious as the cosmic ray.

Radium gives off so-called Gamma rays, found to be of value in treatments of certain diseases. Rontgen rays, or X-rays, discovered some years ago, are sufficiently penetrating to be of value in looking within the human body.

Light rays have slightly penetrating power. Cosmic rays, apparently emanating from interstellar spaces or remote bodies, are 1,000 times shorter than X-rays, said Dr. Compton, and far more penetrating.

Allred Urges Convict Rehabilitation Plan

MINERAL WELLS, July 7 — Rehabilitation of Texas convicts was urged by Attorney-general James V. Allred tonight in campaign address here for governor. "Our responsibility does not end when we send a man to the penitentiary," he said. "Today the governments, both state and national, are trying to find jobs for people on the outside through the relief programs, but when a man is released from the penitentiary in Texas, no effort is made to give him employment. The state evinces not the slightest interest in his welfare."

"As a civilized people we have a heavy responsibility to see that he is properly treated and trained to become a better citizen when he is released. It is imperative that we take such a step as this and, it will be possible only after we have made a change in the present pardon system," the attorney-general said. Allred acknowledge the "fine progress" in the direction of criminal rehabilitation which he said has already been made by establishing schools within the prison walls and segregating the convicts. He warned, however, that "we must not be content to let it rest with that."
