





TEXAS BANK DEPOSITS GAIN

According to the monthly business review of the federal reserve bank of Dallas deterioration in the condition of principal crops and of livestock and ranges due to the long and widespread drouth was a development of major importance in the 11th federal reserve district during the month of July. Deposits of member banks, later declining seasonally during the preciding three months, turned upward in June. There was a gain of \$130,000,000 in bank deposits. Member banks borrowing at the federal reserve bank continued in small volume and reserve deposits were maintained at a high level.

This plan aims at the gradual transfer of many factory units from congested city areas to semi-rural surroundings. 

The ancient law not to muzzle the ox that is treading out the corn was applied by Paul in a wider sense that entitles the toiler in any field of service to nibble at the advantages of his effort. The society that does not allow every man a bountiful enjoyment of his own labor is out of kelter. When John Ruskin undertook to interest the common man in art he found him so engrossed in making a living that he could not appreciate art.
Then Ruskin turned to trying to interest England in her common man.

circumstances do not drive. circumstances do not drive a man to strenuous toil that blunts the finer faculties his interest in daily


