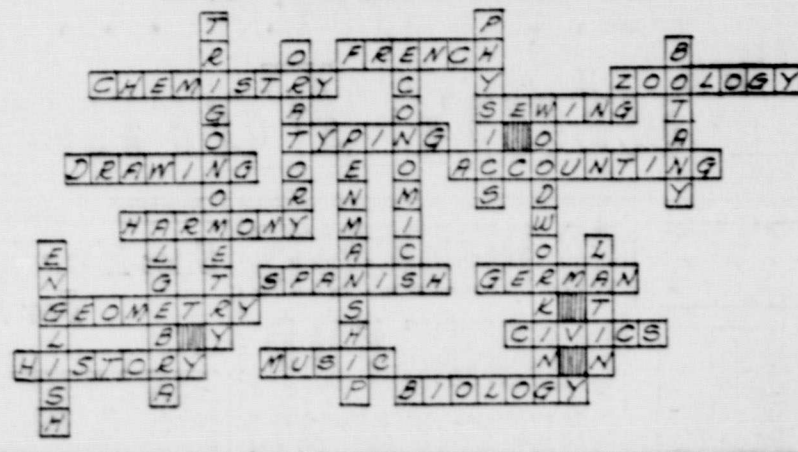
**POLICE GIVEN 4 SKULLS**

### Three Factors Rule Climate on Planets

NEW YORK, Aug. 4—Climate upon a planet, according to Dr. Walter S. Adams, director of the Mt. Wilson Observatory of Carnegie Institution, is dependent upon a trio of inseparable factors.

First of these is distance from the sun. Heat intensity and amount of light received by the planet is determined thereby. Obviously the greater the distance less intense is this heat and the degree of light, and vice versa.

Neptune's Climate  
To illustrate this point let us consider Neptune which is 30 times the distance which our earth is from the sun. Neptune applying the above formula, receives but 1-900 as much light and heat on equal areas of its surface as the earth does.

Number two on Dr. Adams' list is the length of the planet's day. This rotation of the planet on its axis regulates the time during which the sun's rays strike it.

Continuous Day  
Mercury, for example, rotates so slowly that it presents but one of its sides to the sun. From this it follows that the side constantly receiving the sun's rays experiences continuous day, whereas the opposite side always is in darkness. Consequently one side is perpetually torrid while the other is arctic.

Third in this triumvirate of factors governing the climatic conditions on planets, is its power to retain an atmosphere. To do this the planet must have mass. Gases from which these atmospheres are composed are, in turn, made up of billions of small units of matter called molecules. These molecules strike against one another with terrific speed, which is increased as the temperature ascends.

Mounties Study Wild Bird Life of Quebec  
QUEBEC, Aug. 4—Fabled in fiction and fact as friends of the Indian, protectors of frontiersmen and relentless foe of the criminal, Canada's Royal Mounted police again this summer are laying saddle and rifle aside to serve their government as naturalists and scientific explorers.

A detail of the famous scarlet-coated troopers has left Quebec City aboard a steamer carrying officers of the department of the interior on an ocean tour of several months which has for its objective an intensive study of the rare wild bird life on the north shore of the St. Lawrence river and gulf as far as Blanc Sablon where Labrador adjoins Eastern Quebec at the west end of the strait of Belle Isle. Frequent stops are to be made for inland journeys to the haunts of the feathered inhabitants of Quebec's rugged and picturesque coastal areas.

Year-round patrols of the "Moun-

ties" have been established for some time in the Province of Quebec to guard Quebec's many hunting preserves. It is the duty of these patrols to prevent the slaughter of Quebec's bird life which is now achieving international fame, especially in the Gaspé Peninsula where at Perce Rock and Bonaventure Island more than 200,000 rare wild birds, including gannets, murres—relatives of the now extinct flightless great auks—and many others form what is said to be the most densely inhabited bird sanctuaries in the world. The Gaspé bird sanctuaries are this year attracting an unprecedented number of scientists and visitors as a result of opening of the new 553-mile Gaspé Belt Highway, circling the heretofore almost inaccessible peninsula country.

PHOENIX, ARIZ., Aug. 4—A sea going job has just had a new roof placed on his house. He is paying on the installment plan and during the past week the roofing company received the following letter from the sailor.

### Starvation Threatens Thousands of Cattle

BEAUMONT, Aug. 4—Death by gradual starvation to thousands of head of cattle in five counties of southeast Texas unless they are moved shortly was forecast by cattlemen in this vicinity.

Seriousness of the situation was increased when more than 200

square miles of coastal land was covered by salt spray or water during the recent gulf storm.

Grass was almost entirely killed, or made unfit for grazing.

Already the pastures were damaged seriously by drought. Vast areas were burned out.

Flooding the pastures with salt water has only aggravated the situation which was bad to begin with, farmers and cattlemen are now expediting.

Most cattle are under weight and skinny, and probably would not bring enough at present prices for the cattlemen to break even.

At the same time, it was pointed out, to send so many thousands of head of cattle to the packing plants

would only flood what market there was and further reduce the price.

Federal authorities have been asked to include Jefferson, Chambers, Liberty, Horton and Orange counties with those to which aid will be given in connection with the emergency drought relief program.

The storm, which was accompanied by a tidal wave, left thousands of pools as breeding places for mosquitoes, another factor that enters into the situation.

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 4—More licensed automobiles are on Idaho roads this year than during 1933, a report of the state licensing depart-

ment reveals. Current year passenger car registrations are 12,476 above the number last year; there are 3,056 more trucks and 80 more dealers.

# OIL OPERATION CURTAILED BY LACK OF WATER

ALBANY, Aug. 4.—Drilling operations in Shackelford county have been considerably curtailed with the shortage of water supply, but several new tests are going down. A new drilling well two miles east of Albany is Texas Central Oil Co. No. 1. E. E. Grothe at center of south line of west 1-2 of survey No. 6, block 11, T. & P. R. R. Co. lands, now drilling at 480 feet, an offset to the R. S. Bradford farm.

Reliance Oil & Royalty Corp., Skelly Oil Co. No. 15, J. A. Mathews is drilling at 850 feet near center of northwest 1-4 of northeast 1-4 section No. 31, E. T. R. R. Co. lands, on the northeast side of the pool in the section.

Gilman & McMurray et al No. 1, section 192, J. P. Morris in western Shackelford county is drilling near 1500 feet in the northwest corner of section No. 192, E. T. R. R. Co. lands, and will complete this week in the Bluff Creek sand.

One of the most important events for Throckmorton county was a location staked this week by Humble Oil & Refining Co. for a shallow test hole being Humble Oil & Refining Co. No. 1, Jno. T. Davis, located in E. F. Reynolds survey, abstract No. 1465, being 600 feet south of southwest corner of section No. 195, B. B. & C. R. R. Co. lands, which is an exploration test on a 20,000 acre block of land leased by Humble in the vicinity drilling for gas and for structural indications, and with view toward drilling of a deep test in the block that has been quietly leased up for the past year or more. This large block takes in portions of the Jno. T. Davis, Reynolds Cattle company, Sam R. Davis, and Tom Richards ranches, and is about ten miles from the Shackelford-Throckmorton county line and the same distance from the Throckmorton-Haskell county line. It is reported that the deep test on this block will seek the Big Bend series, running a depth of six thousand feet or more, and is the only test ever drilled in the territory to that horizon.

## Cement Lake to Be Stocked With Fish

EL PASO, Aug. 4.—Plans are underway to make Cement Lake near here a fisherman's paradise of Texas.

The plans include fencing of the lake and the hiring of a watchman to keep trespassers off for the next two years. In the meantime the water is to be stocked with numerous species of fish.

precious jewels to don cotton stockings and "store-bought" shoes. In exchange for the silk hose that Mrs. Moyer gave to her, she gave a hand-woven silk sarong and a pair of silver anklets.

At Sandakan, where the Sultan went ashore word was sent to the waiting escort of Sikhs and Malays that the Sultan insisted upon formality that morning, and after a thirty minute delay, he appeared in tails, striped trousers, and a fez. It was told to Mrs. Moyer, that the Sultan's niece had attended the University of Illinois and after several years during which she was prominent in campus activities and the social life of the school, returned to her native land and also to native customs and styles of dress.

Snapshots and pictures, many of which she obtained herself, are particularly interesting; especially those of the natives of different islands which reveal the vast differences in features of tribes that inhabit areas closely situated. Several photographs are of coral, and other marine plants growing on the bottom of the sea, which Mrs. Moyer obtained by placing a camera in a glass-bottomed box.

It was in 1933, while Mrs. Moyer was in Manila, that she entered the bridge Olympics, and as winner of the world championship was presented a beautiful loving cup.

Mrs. Moyer will leave San Francisco October 1 to return to Shanghai. En route she will stop at Honolulu where she plans to meet Miss Agnes Bearman, who is leaving the middle of this month for an extended visit with friends there.

They, naturally, would expect a voice in the decision on political plums that go with the governorship. Mrs. Ferguson, in her term as governor, had the opportunity to name one third of the present membership of state boards and commissions. Could the Ferguson and McDonald supporters dictate the naming of another member they would have two-thirds, or a majority of the membership, patronage is available.

The political future of "Farmer Jim" might be helped. He aspires to be National Democratic Committeeman from Texas, on the selection of the state democratic executive committee at its meeting in Houston last March. A declaration in his favor from the state democratic convention in Galveston next September would help. Failing that, silence of the convention on the matter would be to his advantage. State conventions notably are responsive to the will of the party's nominee for governor.

Looking farther into the future, there is a reason why Ferguson might desire the election of Allred. The senatorial term of Morris Sheppard expires in 1937. He will be re-named or his successor nominated in the Texas democratic primary of 1936. Allred, as governor, might be expected to seek the customary double term, rather than enter the race for senator.

Popular report now is that Rep. Wright Patman, Texarkana, may be a candidate against his fellow townsman, Sheppard. Patman platform is as dry as Sheppard. With Ferguson in the race on a wet platform and them splitting the dry vote, the prospect would not be dark to the former governor to close his tempestuous political career with a crowning victory.

## STATE BOARD SETS TAX RATE AT .77 PER \$100

AUSTIN, Aug. 4.—The state automatic tax board met today and set a tax rate of 77 cents per 100 dollars valuation, the constitutional limit. A rate of 35 cents was applied for the general revenue fund; 35 cents for the available school fund, and 7 cents for the confederate pension funds, totaling 77 cents.

Financial statements presented to the tax board revealed that a rate of 60.1 cents would be required to discharge the deficit in the general revenue fund. The constitution, however, limits the rate to a maximum of 35 cents.

Similarly a rate of 35.5 cents would be required to pay the amount due the available school funds but the board was limited by law again to 35 cents.

Accrued deficit in the general revenue funds as of August 31, 1933, amounted to \$9,377,619.75. Estimates submitted to the board showed the accrued deficit on August 31, this year would be \$7,577,331.52, and on 31, 1935, would be \$6,329,577.19.
