Only the number of grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-greatgrandchildren will be included; and where memorials may be directed. We will run a one column black and white photo at no charge.

Non-basic obituary...

A larger photo, or content that varies from that listed for a basic obituary - such as the names of grandchildren, or additional relatives or relationships will require the obituary to be published at a rate of \$4.50 per column inch.
