GENIUS' BRAINS GET INTEREST OF SCIENTISTS

MOSCOW, Oct. 16—The Moscow Institute of the Brain expects through its researches to solve the riddle of why some persons stand out sufficiently from their fellow men so that they are called "geniuses."

The institute has been busy collecting the brains of well-known men and women who have died in recent years for its studies. It happens that most of the brains received have been those of communists, but the institute would have no scruples against examining the brains of bourgeois leaders if it could get them.

Lenin's Brain Prized
The prize of the Institute's collection is the brain of Vladimir Ilyich Lenin whose embalmed body is viewed daily in its huge mausoleum on the Red Square and so much does the institute think of the possibility of recovering the sources of the power that went into the making of the Russian revolution, that it has set aside a whole department where Lenin's brain is minutely studied.

Recently the Institute received the brain of Clara Zetkin, the aged German revolutionist, who once opened the Reichstag with a speech denouncing the Nazis.

Graphs Record Research
The first step in studying a brain, before it is subjected to microscopic examination, is to cut it into nearly 5,000 thin slices of extreme thickness.

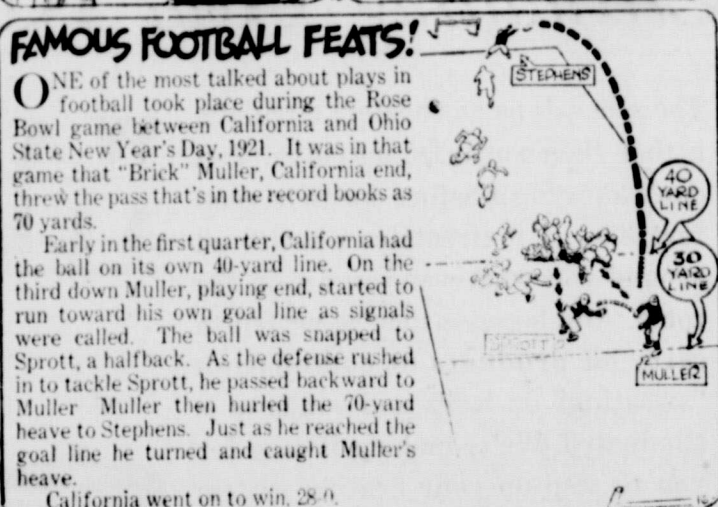
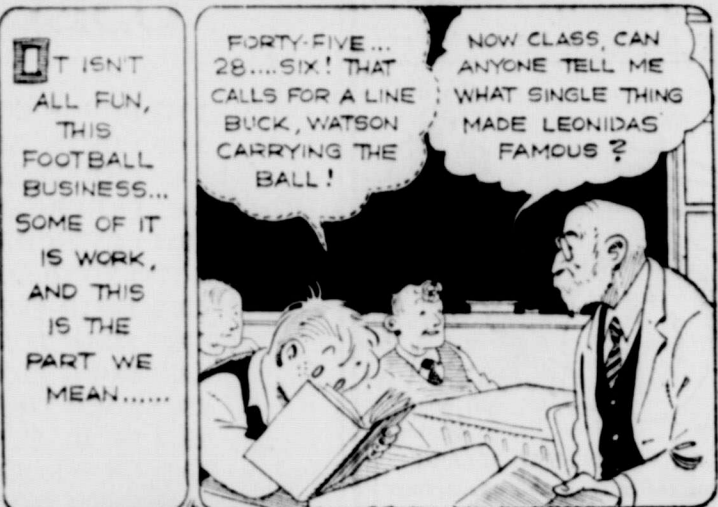
The researchers seem to show that the explanation for high intellectual capacity lies in peculiarities in structural relation of different regions of the cerebral cortex. Newly constructed apparatus has enabled the institute to record on graphs the electric currents set up in the brains of live persons and animals.

HORSE 3 TIMES DOOMED ENTRY FOR HANDICAP

ARLINGTON, Oct. 16—"My Dandy"—three times condemned to die and three times retained in life by proving himself one of the greatest of race horses—has been nominated for the \$10,000 added Waggoner handicap, feature attraction of the Arlington Downs Autumn season, Oct. 25 through Nov. 12.

A son of Port Drapeau-Scepter and Staff, he was bred at the estate of E. I. Clark and sent to the races in 1928 at the age of three. His speed and running feats were so spectacular that he rapidly became the favorite of thousands of turf-fans.

But the story of My Dandy, aside from the times when he was leading the field home to gather in a spacious purse for his owner, W. C. Reinhart, reads like a tale from Horatio Alger. My Dandy has come to his present affluent estate through some of the most wolfish setbacks that ever beset a horse, his proud followers say.

Death Advised
At the age of three he was shipped to New Orleans for the winter racing season. En route he contracted shipping disease, one of the most dreaded of all equine diseases. The track veterinarian advised that he be destroyed.

At Rockingham the chestnut gelding ran five-eighths of a mile in

and returned as a four-year-old to win \$50,000 in purse money, including \$25,000 in the Hawthorne handicap in which he defeated the best racers of the year.

At the age of six the Texas racer went to Miami where, for the first time in his life, he pulled up lame after a race.

"Well," commented the stable solomons judicially, "that's the end of My Dandy."

But He Came Back
So the horse came back to the races to win \$30,000, including the running of the \$10,000 Illinois Owners' Handicap. Just to show his contempt for those of little faith, he stepped the fastest mile and one-sixteenth of the year, clipped off the route in 1:43 3-5.

Then when winter came, along with it came another break-down, more dismal hours and dire predictions. The veterinarian looked him over and said, for the second time, "You'll have to destroy him."

Owner Reinhart then retired the little gelding to his farm near Belleville, Ill., there to munch grass and gambol about the fields at leisure. He had earned a permanent pension, decided Owner Reinhart.

Lost Interest
But when Reinhart returned to the farm again he was amazed at the decline of his racer. Away from the track with its clatter of frantic hooves and rumble of urging throats, "My Dandy" had lost his interest in life and with it most of his health.

So this Spring he returned to practice, regained his speed and recovered from the effects of his lameness.

ANGLERS GET UNDER WATER HUNTING SUIT

PARIS, Oct. 16—Equipment which will enable a person to walk along the bottom of the ocean and shoot fish has been invented by a French scientist.

Working in his laboratory, Colonel Le Prieur has constructed a 12-pound diving apparatus which consists only of a light helmet, with two big goggle eyes, and a cylinder of compressed air. The cylinder is worn around the waist and is connected with the helmet by a rubber tube that fits along the spinal column.

Dry Gunpowder
To eliminate the problem of keeping gunpowder dry, the Colonel has perfected a compressed-air carbine which shoots steel arrows with the rapidity of a small machine gun. They are so thin that they slip through the water like elongated bullets.

It is reported that once a fisherman-hunter gets accustomed to submarine shooting his aim soon becomes as good as on terra firma.

Light Equipment
The lightness of the equipment does not interfere with the movement of the wearer, who can thus quickly bring his carbine into position to take aim at a passing fish. A gauge on the cylinder indicates the amount of air remaining. One

His wife, Anna, a few minutes earlier, had sworn he took her home from the Bronx bakery where she worked on the night of the kidnaping.
