## FERA SCHOOL **PROGRESSING SAYS CLUCK**

FERA adult schools which were started in Cisco last Friday, Supt. R. N. Cluck said this morning. "It a golden opportunity for all adults in Cisco and the surrounding community to enroll in some of these classes and study the subjects

they feel they need most," he said. The high enrollment in these schools last fall and summer is directly responsible for Cisco's having 27 adult teachers now, a greater number than Waco and other similar schools. But if the percentage of attendance of the present enrollment does not remain high or the enrollment increase appreciably within the next few days, the school will lose a number of the teachers because of the demand in other schools throughout the state, Supt Cluck pointed out. This will materially affect the amount of money coming into Cisco weekly for this project, he added

Evening Classes Evening classes are to be offered in the commercial work for those who are now empleyed, so that they may avail themselves of the opportunity to review their commercial work or study new subjects that will prepare them for advancement in their field.

The agreement with the government of Panama is expected to give the company the sole right to cultivate and deelop rubber in that republic. Transportation costs to the United States will be low.

The venture has the full approval of the government, according to company officials. It will not call for an agreement between the governments, but is considered other important link in the bond of common interests.

The only other American-controlled rubber cultivation project of any size is the Firestone plantation in Liberia. Development of this has been marred by trouble with the Liberian government. The United States is dependent upon British, French and Dutch rubber interests for the major part of the 500,000 long tons of rubber consumed annually.

#### America's Gold Production

Gold production in the United States in September totaled 284,000 fine ounces, according to the American bureau of metal statistics. This was the highest output since the bureau began compiling monthly figures in 1932, and represented an increase of 45,000 ounces over August.

For the period from January to September United States output amounted to 2,107,000 fine ounces, compared with 1,759,000 in the like period last year.

World output of gold was estimated by the bureau at 19,617,000 fine ounces in the first nine months, compared with 17.795,000 in the similar period a year ago.

### Valuable Panhandle Alfalfa

Alfalfa, a comparatively neglible crop on the Panhandle south plains, this year has proven itself to be the most valuable crop raised in this great agricultural section.

Drought conditions over most of the country have caused a scarcity of feed, thus creating top prices for alfalfa. At least three-fourths of the crop, if not a larger proportion will

be sold. The average price will be \$17 per ton for that sold.

Irrigated alfalfa has sold as high as \$24 and \$25 a ton, with an average of around \$17. First cutting started at \$10, then jumped to \$12, and has increased since. Most of the sales have been at the field and from the hav baler, eliminating handling charge.


