### Drive Is Started On False Marking

NEW YORK, Nov. 16 — A vigorous campaign is under way to protect mark gold and platinum jewelry.

The familiar stamps, "14 Karat" and "Platinum" are being used on impure metals so that purchasers who accept these quality marks at their face value are tricked into buying inferior substitutes.

Six such cases are being prosecuted here by the District Attorney and the Department of Markets, Weights and Measures, the active cooperation of the Jewelers' Vigilance committee and the Associate Jewelers association.

The public has implicit faith in these time-honored quality marks and accepted them without question. A wedding ring stamped "14 Karat" is bought and cherished as a standard article. When a brass ring with a thin gold wash is stamped "14 Karat" and sold for the price of gold a serious blow is struck at public confidence in the jewelry trade. Both state and federal laws fix a stiff penalty for the crime, including a fine, or imprisonment, or both.

## VACCINATION IS URGED FOR TURKEY FLOCK

LUBBOCK, Nov. 6 — Owners of turkeys flocks should vaccinate their fowls against hemorrhagic septicemia, a form of blood poisoning, advises Dr. F. G. Harbaugh, veterinarian and instructor in the Division of Agriculture at Texas Technological college.

"No cases of this disease have been reported on the South Plains but we had two turkeys brought here from Abilene which were infected. One was killed and the disease diagnosed as hemorrhagic septicemia, a form of fowl cholera, of which there are two classes, chronic and quick. The other turkey was treated by the recommended method of vaccinating and is apparently cured.
