Let Leonard B. "Stub" Allison, an assistant coach, stepped into it without a murmur almost before the ink had dried on the resignation of William "Navy Bill" Ingram.

Replaced Price Ingram replaced Price and this season predicted big things for the Golden Bears. When the team failed to deliver rumblings were heard—even early in the season—from the alumni and some students. When California came back and beat U. S. C. and gave Stanford a mighty tussle, the rumblings died down. But Ingram, who had said he would soon enter business, resigned anyway.

Picturesque Career Allison has had a picturesque career. He knows football from the proverbial A to Z, is respected by the players and coaches the game in a manner that shows he enjoys it. When Ingram resigned they did not look far beyond the Berkeley campus for a successor. In fact a precedent for speed was set for a selection of a new coach at such a major university.

All for Allison Students, players and alumni are for Allison to a man. "Stub" learned his football in the middle west. In his wanderings he played under the Notre Dame system, coached the Warner system and worked with teams using the old punt formation. He doesn't believe in any particular style of play. He looks at his material and then selects an attack and defense to suit it.

CCC and a variety of policies which require financing from the treasury. The decision of Mr. Roosevelt and congress on spending, for instance will determine when and how the budget shall be balanced. That decision will inform the administration how much it must continue to borrow to meet its deficit. When the probable volume of new government borrowing is known, the administration will know the extent to which it must obtain control over banks to insure a source of supply for the money it needs to finance emergency expenditures.

Legislation dealing with social-security industry, labor, and finance will consist largely of rules and conditions under which the people shall live and work. Most of the spending involved in these latter policies will be done from private funds.

Norwegian Freight Vessel in Distress

Huge lines, carrying many passengers, paused or turned from the Trans-Atlantic sea lines in answer to the distress call of about 30 men—exhausted, faced with death, but still courageous.
