SANTA CLAUS ROLE DROPPED FOR SLAYINGS

FERRYSVILLE, Pa., Dec. 24 — Katherine Shock, 38, stepped from the role of Santa Claus today into that of mass killer. She killed her sister, her brother, her brother's four children, and probably fatally wounded his wife. She then turned her gun on herself.

Authorities today ascribed her act to insanity caused by the recent death of her child. She left four vaguely phrased notes. She arrived here loaded with toys to play Santa Claus for the children, but the pistol with which she killed her sister and the poison with which she killed herself were in her baggage.

Twenty-four hours earlier she had killed her sister, Mrs. Ruth Hughes, while Mrs. Hughes slept in their New York apartment. Mrs. Hughes' death was not discovered until last night.

Mrs. Shock's brother, Walter Dempsey, 42 and his children, Robert, 11; Walter, 7; & Thomas, 6; David, 18 months were killed while they slept. Mrs. Shock went from bed to bed in the Dempsey home, loading her revolver, firing, reloading, and firing again. Dempsey's wife, Mrs. Clara Dempsey, 36, was in a Pittsburgh hospital today in a serious condition.

President Extends Christmas Wishes

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24 — President Roosevelt, in greetings to the nation on Christmas Eve, expressed the hope that the spirit of this Christmas be one of "courage and unity."

"It is the way to greater happiness and well being," the president said. "That is, I believe, an important part of what the maker of Christmas would have it mean."

From services at the lighting of the Washington community Christmas tree across Pennsylvania avenue from the White House, Mr. Roosevelt sent his greetings to the nation:

"I wish you one and all, here and everywhere, a very very Merry Christmas."

HOLIDAY TOLL IS HEAVY FOR STATE, NATION

ELKO, Nev., Dec. 24 — Searchers found a plane, missing for almost 24 hours, a mass of wreckage against the side of a deep snow-filled canyon with its pilot and three youthful passengers dead today.

The canyon is located 25 miles north of Mountain City, home of the children.

A resident of the district led searchers in the area early today and came upon the wreckage of the plane which evidently crashed against the wall while traveling at a high rate of speed. The occupants were apparently killed instantly.

No Christmas Snow Says Weather Man

Colder weather is due to return to Texas Tuesday but there is little likelihood of snow for Christmas.

Cloudy and unsettled weather will prevail over almost the entire state during the day. There is a high pressure area directly north of here on the Canadian border, the weather bureau reported and the Texas weather will depend on the direction on which the high pressure area travels.

If it moves south, then colder weather, with perhaps snow in the northern part of the state, is forecast. If it moves east Texas will escape most of the cold wave.

Coldest place in Texas Monday was Amarillo, where a minimum of 22 was reported.

Bones Identified As Road Worker

RISING STAR, Dec. 24.—A skeleton found hanging from a tree near Rising Star Saturday, today was positively identified as that of a highway worker who disappeared 18 months ago.

District Attorney Grady Owen today said that the remains were those of H. L. McBee, who disappeared on the night of May 8, 1933, after a dance he was said to have attended.

The district attorney indicated that the grand jury would investigate the case. Late Saturday Peace Justice W. M. Morrison of Rising Star said he had not rendered a decision on the case and indicated that he might take two or three days to do so. There were several details pertaining to a theory of foul play which it was said he wanted to investigate.

Freeze In Florida Aids Texas Prices

HARLINGEN, Tex., Dec. 24 — Increased prices in Rio Grande vegetables and fruits have resulted from the recent disastrous freeze in Florida.

Immediately after the freeze prices jumped and shipments of fruit and vegetables from the valley increase materially.

Another factor aiding in the price increase is the grapefruit proration order which was recently put into effect. Most of the growers are cooperating with the order, it was said.

HOLDUP GANG BELIEVED LED BY HAMILTON

OKEMAH, Okla., Dec. 24 — Raymond Hamilton was sought today as the leader in Okemah's double bank robbery — an affair which had resulted in death for Ambrose Nix and capture for Arthur Gooch and two other persons.

It appeared likely, meantime, that one of the six persons who took \$11,000 from two national banks here Saturday was a woman in man's clothing.

Nix was shot down and Gooch was captured in a battle with three officers Sunday at the farm of Lee Mulkey, Mulkey and a woman who gave her name as Irene Jones were arrested a few hours later.

Hamilton was suspected because he grew up in the section south of Okemah and is known to have been in this section at intervals since his escape from death row in the Texas penitentiary last summer.

NATION JOINS IN SEARCH OF TOMMY TOUHY

CHICAGO, Dec. 24.—All available men midwestern staff of coastal inspectors, and of Chicago police have been concentrated in an effort to capture "terrible" Tommy Touhy gangster who has made himself a living bomb.

Touhy knows of the order and has threatened to "blow to hell" the first officer who attempts its execution.

Waking and sleeping, the tubercular little gangster keeps at his hand a vial of nitroglycerine powerful enough to wreck a building or kill a dozen men. He planned to die himself, carrying attackers with him rather than be captured.

Postal inspectors admitted today that they know of Touhy's determination and that it is a factor in all their plans to end his 20-year career as safe cracker, auto thief, gambler, magnate and post office robber. They are making every effort to capture Touhy but they do not want to be blown to bits with him.

JURY-TAMPER CHARGE MADE IN LINDY CASE

FLEMINGTON, N. J., Dec. 24 — Safeguards to assure a fair and impartial trial for Bruno Hauptmann were considered today by state officials.

The prosecution charged that "a malicious and deliberate attempt" had been made to tamper with the jury panel.

A booklet mailed to ventremen aroused New Jersey authorities and led to postal inspectors being notified. The literature, mailed from Chicago described a fictitious care which closely paralleled the kidnapping of Charles A. Lindbergh's young son. It set forth that the defendant was acquitted and attempted to prove that the kidnaped infant strayed from home and was not kidnaped.

Anthony Hauke, Jr., Hunterdon county prosecutor said the pamphlet deliberately tried to distort the state case and that it might "land somebody else in a cell along with Hauptmann."

The defense was not suspected.

CISCO BUYING DRIVE REACHES PEAK MONDAY

Cisco shoppers Monday were doing their part to making this the most bountiful Christmas season the nation has seen since the early days of the depression.

Last-minute shoppers were hurriedly buying what was left after the crowds which filled the city on Saturday had finished their buying.

Throughout the day there was the largest crowd in Cisco that had been here for a long time, and stores and sidewalks were jammed with shoppers, anxious to make late purchases.

NATION MOVES TO SHOPPING CENTERS

NEW YORK, Dec. 24 — Throngs moved into the nation's shopping centers Monday in a buying surge which climaxed the most bountiful Christmas since the early days of the depression.

Stores were jammed, mails overtaxed with Christmas packages and messages. Railroads reported a Christmas travel rush equal to that of 1930.

The New York Federal Reserve bank reported trade in the metropolitan district of New York for the first 12 days of the month was 12.7 per cent greater than in 1933. Liquor sales and other merchandise with a widespread in recent months.

Judge Asks Better Laws For Divorce

AKRON, O., Dec. 24 — Greed and selfishness cause most divorces, believes Domestic Relations Judge Oscar A. Hunsticker. "People on the verge of divorce might as well admit they have made a mess of their own lives, and look to the welfare of their children," he said.

"The solution of the divorce evil does not lie in stricter marriage laws but in better divorce laws. Some things should be done to prevent the throwing of children upon society."

Brain Assisted By Ductless Glands

PAINESVILLE, O., Dec. 24 — Adolescent children are products of their ductless glands, without which the brain alone is helpless. Dr. George W. Crite, internationally known Cleveland surgeon, told an audience here.

The brain is the only nerve tissue which can remember; brain cells must have a constant supply of oxygen if anemia is not to exist, Dr. Crite said.

"The brain alone is helpless, unless it is assisted by certain ductless glands, two in particular — the thyroid and adrenal glands," he explained. The thyroid gland secretes thyroxin, which stimulates activity particularly of the brain and causes the hormones to circulate, while the adrenal glands, the "brains of the sympathetic system," control the emotions, he explained.

Chinese Woman To Remain In America

ASHLAND, O., Dec. 24 — Ashland's "international problem" has been solved. Probate Judge B. W. McCray has announced he would appoint two guardians for the children of Mrs. Gin Shlee Quong, widow of Lee Quong, who operated a laundry here for 12 years.

A movement had been started here to deport Mrs. Quong and her family — Tom, 9; Tim, 8; Trule, 3; and Ted, 1. Judge McCray also ruled that Mrs. Quong will be reinstated on the mothers' pension list. Her pension is about \$20 per month.

McKinley Home May Be Razed By FERA

CANTON, O., Dec. 24 — The home of the late President William McKinley may finally be razed as a FERA project.

The local FERA office is preparing the project after receiving the city park commission's sanction for demolishing it. Its rundown condition has long condemned it as a city eyesore. Efforts to interest citizens in a campaign to preserve the home were unfruitful.

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Hauptmann Extradicted by New Jersey Following Arrest by New York Officers

EDITOR'S NOTE: The judicial authorities of New York and New Jersey worked rapidly, after the arrest of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, to bring indictments against him that would, at least, hold him in custody until further investigation of his connection with the ransom money. The following dispatch, seventh in the Sidney B. Whipple series tells the story of the extradition battle preceding Hauptmann's removal to New Jersey.

Krieg lights poured their blinding rays upon the pale face of Bruno

Richard Hauptmann as he was paraded at the police lineup, Assistant Chief Inspector John J. Sullivan, of the New York police department, exhibited the prisoner to an audience of 250 detectives and newspaper reporters and dwelt upon his record in the manner of a lecture on anatomy.

"This prisoner," said Sullivan, "admits having passed several of the Lindbergh ransom bills. Nearly \$15,000 of the money has been found in his garage. We have a clear case of extortion against him, and a more serious charge is being prepared in New Jersey."

Hauptmann Indicted
Two days later, Hauptmann

was indicted by a Bronx County Grand Jury on charges of having extorted \$50,000 from Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, and was held in \$100,000 bail for future hearing.

Mrs. Hauptmann engaged, with her husband's consent, James Mark Fawcett a New York attorney, as chief of the defense forces, and preparations were made to fight the forthcoming extradition demand by the State of New Jersey.

The Hunterdon county grand jury meanwhile, wasted no time in naming Hauptmann, not as the author of the child, but as the actual murderer. Its indictment related that Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., was slain during or as the result of a burglary. Under the law a person causing another's death during the commission of a felony, or as an unforeseen result of the felony, is guilty of first degree murder.

Fought Extradition

Gov. A. Harry Moore of New Jersey made formal demand upon Gov. Herbert Lehman of New York for possession of the prisoner. Lehman signed the warrant at once and in accordance with regular procedure, the extradition case went to the courts, under habeas corpus proceedings brought by Attorney Fawcett.

Extradition proceedings differ from an ordinary trial. The burden of proof in such cases, rests upon the defendant to show that he could not have been in the accusing state at the time of the crime with which he is charged.

Anna Hauptmann testified that "if March 1, 1932, were a Tuesday, then I am certain he called for me at Christianson's bakery that evening. He always called for me on Tuesday evenings." Her statement was borne out in part by Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Christianson, her employers, although neither of those witnesses was willing to say, definitely and positively, that Hauptmann actually did call for his wife on the fateful night.

Handwriting Expert

Perhaps the most important testimony at the extradition hearing was that of Albert S. Osborn, world-famous handwriting expert.

Osborn swore that the ransom notes including the original message left in the crib at Hopewell and the subsequent letters received by Dr. John F. Condon, were all written by the same hand.

The state of New Jersey asked, through Attorney General David T. Wilentz, whether it could not logically be held that the man who wrote the Jafise letters had actually been at the scene of the kidnaping.

"The writer of the second ransom note," Wilentz pointed out, "admitted there in that he had been in Hopewell on that night when he said he left a ransom note in the crib. How could he have known about the first ransom note unless he had participated in the crime?"

Heavy Guard for Transfer

Hauptmann's extradition was ordered and on Oct. 19, he was taken under heavy guard to the model jail behind the century-old courthouse in Flemington, the Hunterdon county seat.

Five days later, the German ex-machine gunner was arraigned formally and pleaded not guilty to the murder indictment. He appeared, at that time, to be a strange combination of stoicism and anarchy. Reports from the office of Sheriff John H. Curtis—whose duties at the end of his name differentiated him from John H. Curtis of Norfolk—were that Hauptmann showed a healthy appetite, a fondness for heavy cigars, and a passion for reading.

Anna Hauptmann and her baby, Marnie, moved to Hopewell and took up a residence in a cottage to be near the man to whom throughout the case, she remained utterly loyal.

Quick Trial Fought

James M. Fawcett fought successfully against the state's proposal to rush Hauptmann to trial. Wilentz had asked for an immediate hearing with the actual trial to begin on Nov. 7. The defense objected that it would have insufficient time to prepare a defense and won a delay until Jan. 2.

Alienists, both for the state and the defense, peered into Hauptmann's eyes, examined his reflexes, threw questions at him, and emerged to be late, in their opinion, that he was sane.

"He is one of the coolest prisoners we ever had here," said the sheriff. "He sleeps well, every night." As he slept, however—and all through his waking hours—Hauptmann was guarded by a small squad of state police. The authorities took no chances with one who had twice escaped from the clutches of the German police.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ligar Milo, raced the stork for 5,000 miles so that the baby might be born on American soil and be an American citizen. They won by a month. The race brought Mr. and Mrs. Milo from Hokitsi, Albania to Akron.

Last November, Milo, brought here 25 years ago by his uncle, went back to visit his former home. While at Hooklight he met a dark-eyed Albanian girl. Last February they were married.

When they learned the stork was on the way, Milo determined the baby should be born in the United States. The couple made a hurried trip through Europe, then boarded a liner, fearful the child might arrive before they reached American soil, but they won.

Nebraska To Make Changes in Taxes

LINCOLN, Neb., Dec. 24—Revision of the tax basis upon which levies are drawn for support of the Nebraska public school system probably will be asked of the state legislature which convenes here New Year's Day.

Leaders of the state's educational system have served notice they plan to led intensive movement to augment school revenues, cut to the bone during lean depression years. Their drive, it was indicated, probably will take the form of revision of the tax basis.

Asserting that 92 per cent of the cost of supporting Nebraska schools falls on the shoulders of property holders, Homer W. Anderson, superintendent of Omaha schools, participated in a recent meeting of the Nebraska State Teachers' association that aims developments may be in store for education in this state.

Anderson declared that the burden on property holders was too great and that the system is threatening collapse of the school financial structure. He advocated revision of the tax basis for augmented school revenues, declared that schools already have "suffered approximately 50 per cent of the tax reduction made in the last two years."

Resolution passed by the teachers, granted that legislators would be asked to revise the tax basis for "removal of existing inequalities."

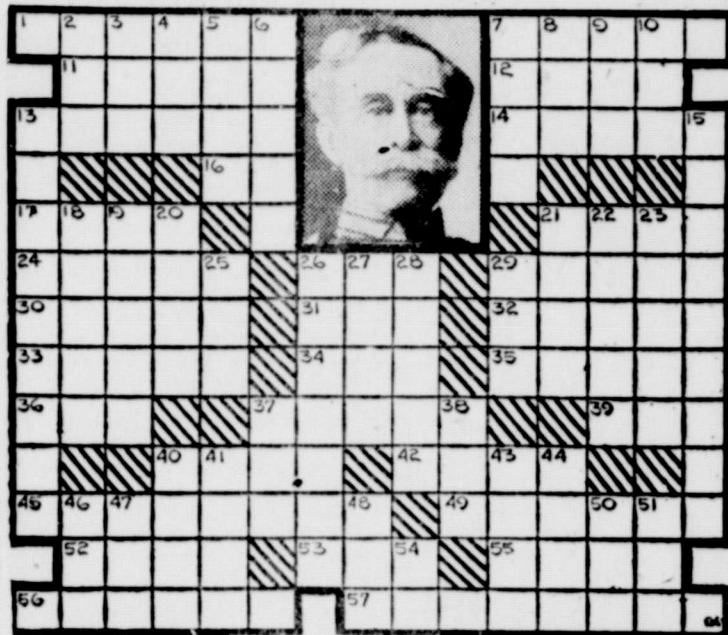

The Spirit of Christmas

Christmas has always been and always will be, with the American people, a time of celebration. Indeed, it is the happiest time of the year, and rightly so.

Often we let the celebration take the place of Christmas itself, it has been charged. We may leave Christ entirely out of Christmas and think of it only as a season of much food, much merrymaking, and the exchange of gifts.

Most of us have something, some image or event, which stands for Christmas. To many a child it is a glittering Christmas tree, a full stocking, or a Santa Claus.

Some have stopped long enough to peer back into the real Christmas meaning and catch the true spirit. To this writer there are three outstanding things which represent the spirit of Christmas.

The song is Franz Gruber's "Silent Night," which each year is sung the world around, and which portrays the peace of the world at the birth of Christ.

In his masterpiece, "A Christmas Carol," Charles Dickens has woven the story of a poor family, a rich man, and a dream, with the result that the rich man finds he can be as happy spending his wealth as the poor clerk and his family who have no wealth to spend.

Our own Texan, O. Henry, has portrayed the unselfish spirit of Christmas giving best in "The Gift of the Magi," in which he explains the custom started by the Wise Men.

Republican Revivalists

It is still a bit too early to estimate how many converts were made by Progressivism's apostles to Wall Street, Senators Borah and Nye. Certainly the missionaries lacked nothing in boldness.

One may surmise that these doctrines have aroused no excessive zeal among eastern Republicans. There is a great deal of agreement with Mr. Borah's declaration that "a conservative party is impossible at this time."

This movement once begun is not easily stopped, and in the last few months there have been many indications that President Roosevelt might prove entirely too conservative for many of the forces he has set in motion.

But even such a split might not solve the Republican problem, unless new issues can be found. Unquestionably the Republican Party will have to show a great deal more interest in the "small man."

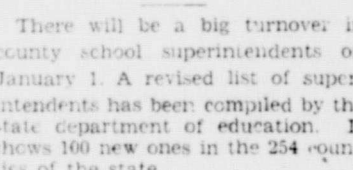

FIRST YULETIDE IN AMERICA NOT ONE OF JOY TO PILGRIM FATHERS

EDITOR'S NOTE—What did the Pilgrims do on their first Christmas at Plymouth? The United Press asked Dean Gleason L. Archer of the Suffolk Law School, Boston, author of "Mayflower Heroes," counsellor-general of the General Society of Mayflower Descendants, and nationally-known authority on the Puritans, and he answers the question in the following article.

NEW YORK, Dec. 24.—There were no Christmas cards at Plymouth in 1621. No stockings were hung, no Christmas trees lighted and no presents exchanged! The day had not then attained its joyous character. It was a day when Masses were sung in Catholic churches.

Delinquencies Are Caused By Slump

DETROIT, Dec. 24.—Increased juvenile delinquency among girls has been one of the outcomes of the depression, in the opinion of Miss Mary C. Hulbert, director of the Girls' Protective League here.

"Broken homes lowered financial conditions and other similar evils have been directly caused by the depression and has increased the burden of our work in the last few years," Miss Hulbert recently declared.

"Much of our work deals with young girls. One day's list of cases presents us with problems of truancy, unhappy homes and dishonesty. All of them are referred to the League by public and private agencies, individuals, employers, and in some cases by the girls themselves.

Among our recent cases was that of a young girl, 17 years old, working in a private home while she went to school. Her work was found unsatisfactory and she disappeared after a quarrel. She was located and referred to us. We will now attempt to get her back into school and at work with a family that will have confidence in her."

More than 500 cases are handled by the League each month, Miss Hulbert said. In September the number of major cases was 453, while incidental service was given to 172 young girls.

He was mending fences on the Storey ranch when a herd of cattle stampeded, tore down the fence and trampled him.

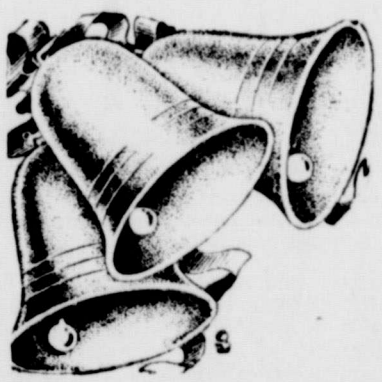

RETAIL STORES SHOW GAIN OF 15.4 PER CENT

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 24—Retail sales in the United States during November maintained a favorable showing in comparison with a year ago which has been the case in previous months, according to the University of Texas bureau of business research. Reports of 92 representatives retail estimates show an average gain of 15.4 per cent over November last year and a decline of only 2.4 per cent from October whereas the average seasonal drop between these months is 7 per cent, the bureau's report said. During the first eleven months of 1934 sales were 21.4 per cent greater than in the corresponding period in 1933.

At the different types of stores, the increase in sales was most marked in the women's specialty shops and the largest gain over November last year with an increase of 27.3 per cent. Men's clothing stores and large department stores showed an increase of 18.5 per cent. Dry goods and apparel stores and small department stores, however, showed a decline in sales from last year of 1.4 per cent and 0.3 per cent respectively.

HOOKS AND SLIDES

NEW YORK — Is American football going back to rugby, the English game from which it originally sprang?
Lou Little, physics professor of Columbia University and member of the advisory board of the rules committee, believes that the real future of the lateral pass lies in its use down field, after the runner has crossed the line of scrimmage, with the secondary defense to be outwitted.

There is no doubt that the newer and wider use of the lateral pass during the season rushing to a close made American football a more interesting game, but Little warns that the proper offensive balance must be maintained.
"The solution regarding the proper use of the lateral pass is careful precaution against permitting it to become too dominant a feature of attack," says Little. "Probably the biggest mistake that can be made in the development of an offense is to let it become top-heavy in any certain phase. An offense which over-emphasizes the forward pass, at the expense of the running game, enables the defense to concentrate against passes."

"Similarly, an attack which emphasizes only the running game allows the defense to concentrate its efforts in one direction."
Attack Must Be Well Balanced
"That will be equally true in the case of the lateral pass. The team which spends too much time in the expansion of a lateral pass attack at the expense of the running game and forward passing weakens itself. The secret of successful offensive football is the building of a well-balanced attack

against which the defense cannot afford to center its efforts in any one direction.
"The intelligent execution of Navy's offense against Columbia provided an illustration. The Mid-dies employed the lateral pass correctly, as a tactical supplement to a sound running and forward passing game."
"Three laterals were included in Bob Zuppke's famous Flying Trapeze which brought the touchdown that led to the lighter Illinois' one-point triumph over mighty Ohio State, another squad that dived its attack well. Col-gate, Alabama, and the majority of the topnotch teams realized that the lateral must not be used too frequently. The element of surprise is the most valuable asset of any maneuver."

The lateral pass is not new. The late Frank Hinkley coached it at Yale before the war. Arnold Horween sponsored it at Harvard between 1926 and 1930.
Zuppke has used the flea flicker for years.

Current Rules Enough To Control Lateral
THESE strategists and others who experimented worked primarily with a lateral as a play behind the line of scrimmage. And on that basis the play did not thrive.
It was not until the new fumble rule, eliminating the danger of long runs for touchdowns, came along that the lateral prospered. But it was not until this season that the lateral was perfected generally, and made so popular.
Little believes that the present rules are sufficient to give spectators a spectacular game in which the lateral pass will take its proper place in the offensive scheme, but with due respect to the fundamentals of our distinctively American college sport

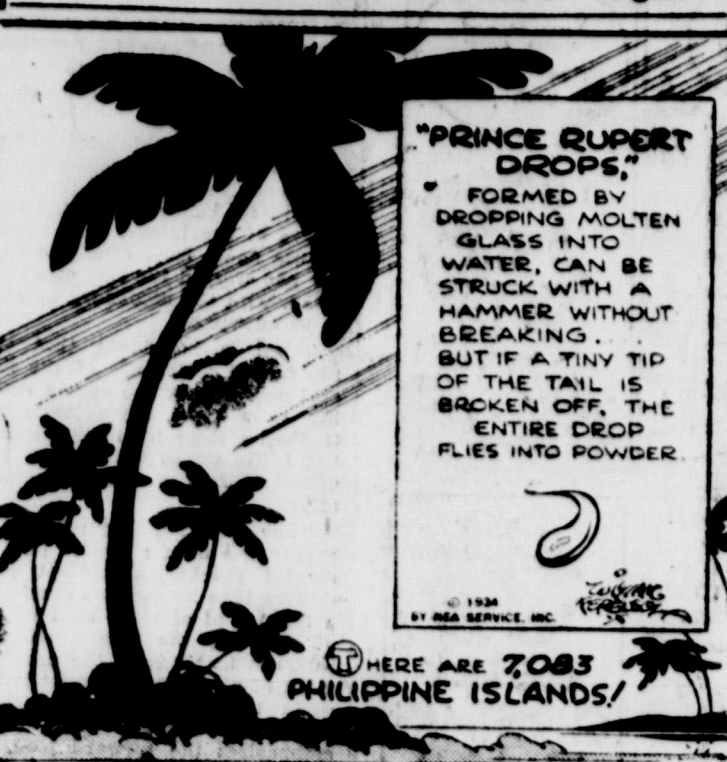
Duck Conditions In Mexico Are Studied

 With L. J. Goldman acquainted
 with Mexican waterfowl conditions,
 the biological survey, says the bu-
 reau, will have in this naturalist an
 authority on waterfowl field con-
 ditions throughout western North
 America.
 The investigation, which is being
 conducted in cooperation with the
 Mexican government, it is expected,
 will yield information that will be
 valued in farming legislation for
 the protection of the waterfowl in
 the United States and in Mexico.

GLOOM QUIT RING DURING 1934; FISTIANA HAS NEW CAMP

By NAT FLEISCHER
Editor of The Ring
New York, Dec. 24—The year saw the passing of Kid Gloom Fistianna. While boxing com-
petitions during the past twelve months was not quite as eventful as had been hoped, the background was better things to come in 1935. The sport was built on the howling success attained by the regime of the state tax board, but it did furnish its share of history.

We have the sensational round victory of Max Baer over Carnera, a contest that will stand in boxing annals as one of the most thrilling of all time, a bout that takes its place side by side with Dempsey-Willard and the Dempsey-Firpo mills.

Two Record Bouts
The year also furnished two record bouts in one of which Max Baer lost his welterweight crown to Barney Ross and in the other the Vancouver Irishman won his title. The victory by Ross enabled the Chicago youth to gain fame as the first modern boxer to be the holder of two world championships, the lightweight and welterweight, at one time.

The year 1934 saw also the crowning of two world champions in Bob Fitzsimmons, who carried off the lightweight crown, and Freddy Miller, who clinched the featherweight and two American champions, Baby Arizmendi, the featherweight, and Teddy Yarosz, the middleweight.

Added to the above was the return of the big gate in boxing and the opening of 75 per cent of the box-crowds that had been closed the previous year. The Baer-Carnera bout of the two Ross-McLarrin contests and receipts amounting to \$900,000, which, considering that an international depression has been with us for three years, speaks volumes of the popularity of boxing.

Finances Better
Although the larger organizations operating the Madison Square Garden, the Chicago Stadium and the Olympia of Detroit failed to effect financially during the indoor seasons, the clubs throughout the country that kept running full blast throughout the year, and that with

but few exceptions, those clubs showed either a small profit or came close to breaking even, is an indication that boxing is on its way to prosperity again.

The past year saw the development of exceptionally fine talent, in fact, better prospects in all divisions than had advanced from the novice stage in several years. That is why 1935 looks so promising.

New Talent
We had no Jack Dempsey, Georges Carpentier, Jack Delaney, Paul Benicovich, Harry Greb, Gene Tunney, Benny Leonard, Tom Gibbons, Johnny Dundee or Charley White to carry the boxing banner on high, but in their place the sport produced a group of youngsters whose sensational work brought back the spectators who had deserted boxing the previous year.

Such talent as Paul Pirrone, Teddy Yarosz, Baby Arizmendi, Charley Masare, Art Lasky, Bobby Pacheco, Eddie Cool, Harry Dublinsky, Kid Asteca, Frankie Klick, Cerecine Garcia, Jack Peterson, Jack McAvoy, Ambrose Palmer, Fred Henneberry, Jack Carroll, Merv Blandon, Maurice Heitzer, Maurice Huguenin, Valentin Anglemann, Louis Salica, Leonard Del Genio, Lew Feldman and Pevey Hayes were among the many new-comers whose efforts were received with fanatism by those who paid the freight.

Most Notable Feats
The most notable feats of the year in boxing were:
1—The knockout of Primo Carnera by Max Baer.
2—The winning of the welterweight crown by Barney Ross who thus became a double champion.
3—McLarrin's defeat of Ross to regain the welterweight crown.
4—Freddy Miller's victory over Neil Tarleton to clinch the world's featherweight title.
5—The victory of Teddy Yarosz over Vince Dundee for the American middleweight crown.
6—Bob Olin's triumph over Maxey Rosebloom which carried with it the world's light-heavyweight diadem.

The newly crowned world champions are Max Baer, Livermore, Cal; Bob Olin, New York, and Freddy Miller, of Cincinnati.

The newly crowned American title holders are Teddy Yarosz, East Liverpool, O., and Baby Arizmendi, Mexico.

The year saw the addition of five states in the field of legalized boxing states.

The year's most promising prospect is Paul Pirrone, whose string

BRITAIN MAY USE AIRSHIPS TO AID POWER

LONDON, Dec. 24—Britain may again begin to build airships to aid her in the battle for world supremacy of the commercial skies.

The London to Melbourne airrace has shown the need for faster, safer and larger machines.

Proponents of renewal of Britain's airship policy point to the success of Germany's Graf Zeppelin on her fortnightly run to South America.

Airship Disaster Blamed
It was the disaster of the R-191 in 1930 that decided Britain to abandon an airship policy. That wreck was the culmination of years of few successes, and many disasters. It

was the only thing needed to make the government wash its hands of airships with a sigh of relief.

As far back as 1902 Britain had an airship policy. Lack of money, however, prevented its development and two great envelopes were the only evidences of it. Britain's first airship was built in 1907, the "Nulli Secundus." She flew from Farnborough to London at 18 miles an hour, and sailed around Buckingham Palace and St. Paul's Cathedral.

First Rigid Airship
By 1910 there was another small ship, the "Beta", but it was not until 1914 that Britain had her Majesty's Airship No. 1. She broke her back and an Admiralty conference in 1912 decided to abandon airship construction. Britain then relied on non-rigid airships bought from other countries, and when the war broke out there were about half a dozen.

Britain had practically no experience of rigid airships during the war, and when the Armistice was signed she owned 103 airships, nearly all non-rigid. They have been scrapped.

Then the series of R-30 airships were started on a program that cost the nation many millions only fin-

ally to be abandoned with the disaster to the R-38. The United States had agreed to buy her. She was wrecked during trials over the Humber river and 44 lives were lost. She used only 70 hours. So R-39 was cancelled.

There are two main objections to building airships for commercial use. They fly too slowly and they cannot stand rough weather. Since 1930 the accumulating safety record of the Graf Zeppelin has slowly proved that safety is a matter of structure. In 1930, however, it took an airship four and one-half days to reach Bombay, eight days to reach Australia. W. A. Scott and Charles Black recently flew to Melbourne in 71 hours.

The airship has the airplane beaten for range. It can carry fuel for 6,000 miles, and it can afford to make detours to avoid bad weather. It can also carry a good payload of 50 passengers, mail and freight, with the passengers living in comfort.

Sick Sailor Saved By Ship Wireless

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24—A dramatic story of how a doctor in New York treated a sick Dutch sailor in mid-Atlantic by radio was recited today in a prosaic report to the U. S. Public Health Service.

It was the monthly report of the medical officer in charge of the U. S. Marine Hospital in New York city. Doctors said it was typical of the radio medical advice which has been a feature of the Public Health Service since 1921.

The first message from the Katenbrecht gave the symptoms of a 17-year-old sailor who had, as it later developed, an attack of typhoid fever. A few minutes after the diagnosis was received at the hospital back cracked across the ether waves directions on what should be done to help the patient and questions amplifying the description of his symptoms.

For five days, messages flashed back and forth between the doctor on land and the captain of the ship with a sick sailor. Gradually the patient passed the crisis of his disease and was landed when the ship touched La Pallice, France.

G. Cyoos, master of the Katenbrecht, sent a letter of thanks to the hospital authorities, a copy of which was enclosed with the report as the final chapter in this medico-radio drama.

BERLIN, Dec. 24—The Christmas season is being celebrated this year with greater pomp throughout Germany than for several years.

Everywhere in all larger towns Christmas fairs will be heralded in by Storm Troop bands, playing Christmas carols. Everywhere on the main squares wood stalls have been erected where all kinds of sweets, gingerbread, chocolate, or nuts can be bought. Uncounted booths offer dolls from Thuringia, many of which are dressed in S. A. uniforms. Wonderfully carved clocks and other things of the woodworker's art from the Black Forest likewise find numerous admirers.

The biggest Christmas fair is here in the well-known Lustgarten. It will be a true public festival. In a corner of the square a fable town has been erected. Lilliputians live there during the time of the fair. The company numbers 24 little gentlemen and 21 tiny ladies. The largest of them is 1.20 meters tall (about 3 feet, 10 inches) and looks like a doll.

In the center of the huge square a big, lighted Christmas tree stands. The Christmas stalls were placed in the Lustgarten for the last time in 1893.

The Hitler organization "Winterhilfe" (Winter aid), has made strong efforts for gathering food-stuffs and warm clothing to present to the poor.

Canadian Farmers Face Better Times

MONTREAL, Dec. 24—The Canadian farmer definitely is headed towards better times.

Such is the message just issued here by the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

Reviewing the farmer's comeback, the bank declares his income has increased, his costs kept down, he is producing less grain and livestock, and more milk and products of diversified farming.

It emphasized that the drive back to prosperity is a slower process than the slump that struck agriculture such a blow in 1928 and that there was no sign of recovery until 1932.

Covering the period from 1926 to the third quarter of this year, the bank shows graphically how Canadian farm income soared from \$410,000,000 in 1926 to about \$480,000,000 in 1927, the peak year, then tumbled year by year until, in 1932, it totalled less than \$150,000,000.

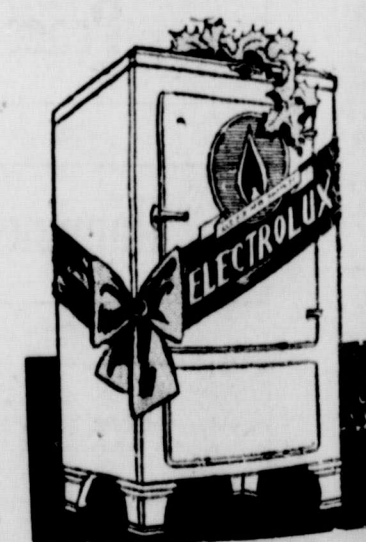

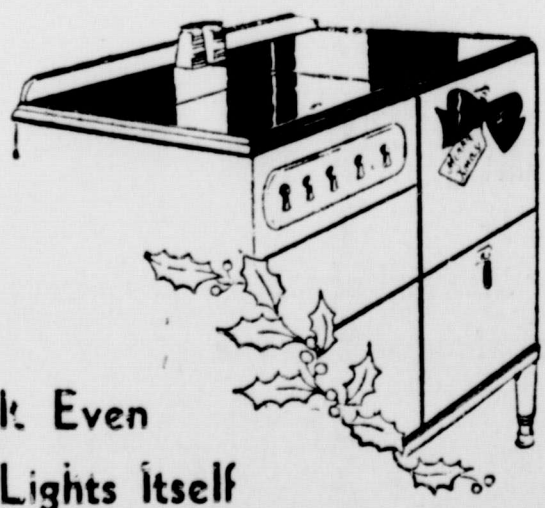
