But this week the United States supreme court decided that it was the rest of the nation which was out of step, and that until the music is changed Texas is in step.

Federal control is definitely "out" unless congress deides to give more power to a federal agency by defining pe-

Many Texans do not want federal control and vell "states rights" at the top of their voices. So far, they have had their way. Owen P. White recently stirred up a hornets' nest with an article in Collier's Weekly in which he condemned Texas methods of production and distribution of "hot oil." For quoting an unnamed operator as saving, "and when I found that I had to do it, I lined up sixteen state senators at five hundred dollars apiece to kill House Bill 99" he drew fire from additional industry tax: or on any Lieutenant Governor Walter Woodull, Railroad Commissioner increase in oil and gas production Ernest O. To many, here and elsewhere, San Antonio appeared to be the logical place for the Centennial, if one were to be held. The old Spanish city is in the heart of the "historic" places of Texas, or at least the places which our Texas history textbooks mentioned. Sentiment would appear to locate the celebration there.

But history has continued to go forward in Texas, It consists of more than some battles with Indians and the war for independence from Mexico. 

#### MINE FLAMES **IMPERIL TOWN** IN OHIO FIELD

NEW STRAITSVILLE, O., Jan. 9. Spreading relentlessly, the famus underground coal fire which as been burning for more than 50 rears in Perry county, is moving in little town.

Several fortunes have been spent n an effort to stem the fire which w covers six square miles in the Hocking Valley's finest coal field. It is estimated that the fire has estroved \$50,000,000 wortth of coal. Operators of mines in the area and citizens in the vicinity have high hopes that the government will make a concentrated effort to box up the fire now that surveyors and the United States Bureau of Mines are checking the fire's extent with a view of determining a feaible plan for stopping the advances into new and valuable coal areas. Although no definite plans have been presented, it is believed the federal inspectors will request funds from the Public Works Administration to be used in battling the in-

The fire was started in 1884 when striking miners poured oil on several loaded mine cars, set them afire, and ran them into the mine. In recent years it has caused the cave-in of 25 homes in this village by burning underground to the foundations. The fire recently ate under the highway between New Straitsville and Shawnee, causing the roadway to sink five feet.

Citizens are now alarmed as the fire is no only 300 feet from a Catholic church. Fear has also been expressed for the safety of the high school building until experienced miners lifted the burning coal stratum from the school's foundation.

Fire gases have damaged forests in the area. Other operating mines have been damaged when the fire suddenly broke through.
