## Eleven-Year-Old Turkey

The Republic of Turkey has been celebrating its eleventh anniversary. To those whose memories of Turkey go back to the time when it was the "sick man of Europe," absolutely ruled by the Sultan Abdul Hamid, the transformations of the eleven years are a miracle.

Before the Balkan Wars Turkey was an Asiatic Empire which spread far into Europe, its blighting hand resting on the once rich land of Macedonia, its precarious rule extending to Albania and Montenegro on the Adriatic; while southward in Asia, Ottoman sovereignty spread over Syria and Palestine, over Mesopotamia and the deserts of Arabia to the Indian Ocean.

Absolute monarch of this Empire and religious head of all the orthodox Muslims of the world, the Sultan shut himself in his palace at Constantinople when his agents and his spies received their orders. The Turkish upper class, from which governors, tax collectors and army officers were drawn, were widely scattered over the numerous provinces, living luxuriously and indolently among subject races.

Trade was conducted chiefly by Greeks, Armenians, Jews and Arabs. Extortionate taxation and bribery, and expenditure on huge armies wasted the resources of the Empire. Nationalist movements were suppressed by periodical massacres. There was major tyranny at the bottom. There was no reward for initiative, no hope for the reformer. Unenlightened despotism on the old-time Asiatic model survived into the twentieth century; and effete traditions of social custom were preserved in the schools, in the family, and in the restricted sphere of social life.

No great country was more utterly removed from the influences of western civilization than was Turkey in the opening years of the present century. And now Turkey not only lets her women vote but elects them to office, as she did in her recent election. Verily, events move swiftly.

## Housewives Should Budget Their Time

Housewives should budget their time as carefully as the household expenses, declared Miss Frances Conkey of the home economics department of the San Jose State College.

Domestic duties should be accomplished with maximum efficiency, thus permitting the housewife to devote an adequate amount of leisure to recreation which will stimulate her interest in household tasks, Miss Conkey says.

There is no comparison between the value of the work of a stenographer and that of a homemaker, declared Miss Conkey. The stenographer is skilled in a relatively few tasks—the homemaker in many, she explained. Consequently, the housewife's time is worth money and it should be scheduled as carefully as her husband's pay check, she said.

The housewife's time is worth at least as much as she would have to pay an outsider to do her work, and it is worth as much as she could be earning if she were employed outside her home, according to Miss Conkey.

Changing social conditions demand that the efficient homemaker have a definite time job, says Miss Conkey, who advises the housewife to dispose of household tasks as soon as possible so she may have more time with the family, more time for outside activities and more leisure time for herself.

Proper planning will result in efficient housework, a happy wife and mother with varied interests, which is an asset to the community, Miss Conkey declared.

## Citizenship More Important Than Ancestry

Whether his ancestors were good citizens and believers in God was declared by President Roosevelt to be of far greater importance than their particular faith.

Taking cognizance of reports that they were of Jewish faith, which have spread widely over the country, largely through the agency of shirted organizations of a Fascist tinge, President Roosevelt expresses complete disinterest.

"All I know about the origin of the Roosevelt family in this country is that all branches bearing the name are apparently descended from Claes Martenssen van Roosevelt, who came from Holland sometime before 1648—even the year is uncertain.

"Where he came from in Holland I do not know, nor do I know who his parents were. There was a family of the same name on one of the Dutch Islands and some of the same name living in Holland as lately as 30 or 40 years ago, but frankly, I have never had either the time or the inclination to try to establish the line on the other side of the ocean before they came over here nearly 300 years ago.

"In the dim distant past they may have been Jews or Catholics or Protestants—what I am more interested in is whether they were good citizens and believers in God—I hope they were both."

## Mary Ellis Has One of Most Versatile Careers In Entire Capital of Flickers

With this resume you can sell him life insurance. A strict adherence to fact, however, reveals that less than one actor or actress in a hundred is truly versatile. Prominently in the lead of any male list would come the name of Charles Laughton and in the feminine division, no name seems more suitable than that of Mary Ellis.

This singing star has had a more varied career than a dozen of her cinema sisters—an all-around ex-

perience a few leading ladies would give their right arms to possess. At the beginning of her professional career, Miss Ellis was singing leading roles at the Metropolitan Opera. And leading roles they were, opposite such musical giants as Caruso and Chaliapin.

And then, just at a time when she had proved to the Metropolitan officials that it was possible for an American girl to sing, she deserted the operatic stage to star in "Rose Marie," then, and still, one of the most successful musical shows ever put on a stage.

At the conclusion of that extravaganza, she played in "The Dyzbuk" on Broadway—a play of intense restraint and drama—not bad for a girl who had started out as a singer and so wasn't supposed to be able to act.

From "The Dyzbuk" she went quickly into Eugene O'Neill's "Strange Interlude," perhaps the most difficult play any actress ever had to learn, and this she took to London, playing it for two solid seasons before critical world audiences. Then, to add to her versatility, she resumed singing to star in "Music in the Air."

Her picture work seems destined to be as varied as her theatrical career. Her first picture, "All the King's Horses," presents her as a singer with little opportunity for dramatic work. Her current vehicle with Tullio Carminati, and directed by Lewis Milestone, is "Paris in Spring," and it stresses both her singing and acting.

## OIL HEADS TO AWAIT ACT TO EXTEND NIRA

WASHINGTON, March 19 — A firm policy of watchful waiting, to see what congress will do about extending the NIRA and whether it will approve permanent oil legislation beyond the Connally law is being followed by the petroleum administration in laying its plans for action after June 16.

Numerous recommendations for revisions of the oil code, along with suggestions that hearings be started in advance of Congressional action on the extension of the Recovery Act have been submitted to the Petroleum Administration. Advocates of these suggestions have been answered by the Administration with the statement that, in the absence of specific action on the Recovery Act extension, no steps would be advisable at this time.

Labor, production and marketing sections of the code are expected to be paid particular attention when the question of revision officially comes up. Members of the planning and coordination committee, and the petroleum administrative board do not anticipate any special changes in the refinery section, although some minor revisions may be made to make more efficient the methods of balancing refinery production with demand requirements.

### Awaits Congress

Wilmer R. Schuh, member of the P. and C. committee and president of the National Petroleum Retailers association, and his association have recommended to the board that hearings be started soon on the question of revising Article V of the Code, the marketing section. The board, industry representatives here were advised, answered

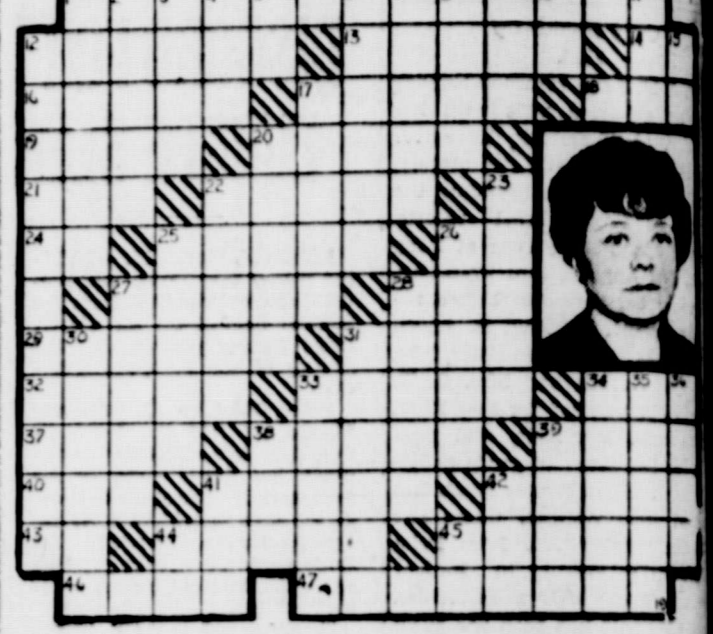

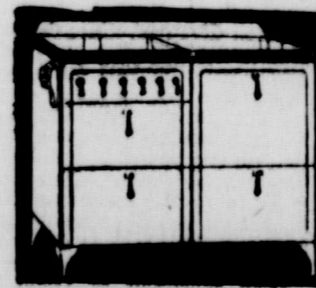

### State Coach Dusted For King's Party

LONDON, March 19 — A state coach, with its gilded, ornate carving thick with dust, has been dragged out for a spring-cleaning.

It is the state coach of the Speaker of the House of Commons. The last occasion it was held was 25 years ago at the coronation of King George.

Now it will be used again during the celebrations of the King's silver jubilee, the 25th anniversary of his accession.

Under its layer of dust and cobwebs, the coach seems to be in good condition, although it may need some new wheels. It weighs 2 3/4 tons, and two stout dray horses are needed to draw it.

Two horses belonging to a brewery drew it in the coronation procession in 1910, and probably will on this occasion.

Viscount Ullswater was the last user of the coach, when he was speaker of the house of Commons in 1919. He thinks that it is probably over two hundred years old.
