

Mars appears to be in the ascendancy not only on the continent of Europe but the wide world over. Hitler is the supreme master of Germany. He is more powerful, in a sense, than any of the Hohnzollerns or Hapsburgs who were dethroned by the Allies in the World war. He is a most amazing individual, this strong man of Germany. He has acrapped the Versailles treaty. He has served warning on all the nations of Europe, including England, that Germany will arm to the utmost and take its place among the powers of the world. He demands equality of armament and has bluntly told all the rulers of continental Europe as well as those who direct the policies of the British empire that the Germany of today demands an equality in the sun with all the warlike and so-called civilized countries on the map of the world. Saar has been returned to Germany.

Now in the coming month of April the Germans, by their ballots at the polls may take over the free city of Danzig. Hitler is as bold as a lion and not caged lion at that. His program calls for the conscription of all Germans able to bear arms for a standing of 500,000 trained warriors in peace time, for the conscription of wealth as well as manpower and perhaps for the building of a navy second to none. As the name of the school suggests, it is so constructed that both rooms have wide-opening glass windows on three sides. And there is a program designed to promote the pupils' physical well-being which includes milk twice a day at recess a hot lunch at noon, so balanced as to meet individual needs and an hour's rest at noon, when, during the cold months only pink noses are visible outside the Eskimo suits as boys and girls relax on their cots which are cached during the rest

Supplementing this physical routine, and outweighing it in importance, is the teaching of how to live. For this important study Mrs. Hettie Lewis, head teacher, requires no textbook. She and her assistant create in the classrooms an atmosphere that is conductive to harmonious living and right thinking. And not only are problems in arithmetic worked out in class, but those other problems which cause heartache to a child are worked out, in private, with teacher.

The children, who come from any of the eight elementary grades, understand when they are transferred from their neighborhood schools to Sunshine School, that it is because, due to undernourishment or other physical handicap, they are unable to keep up with their studies. The school is intended to meet the needs of that group of children between the normal and the crippled who are taken care of elsewhere. They learn here that their disability is due to wrong habits

The success of Sunshine School is attested by the fact that rarely is it necessary for a child to return a second year. But plump and rosy cheeks, important as there are, are not the only requirement for dismissal. Each child must first have learned the essentials of right thinking which mean right living. The effort is so to educate the child that he will have understanding enough and strength enough to direct himself, the formation of his habits to meet his requirements, even if his parents remain untutored. Every effort is made, however, to gain the cooperation of mothers, so that the school training will be supplemented by home care. Contacts are made at parent-teacher meetings and, when advisable, by home calls.

While the children are taking nourishment at noon and at recess, all talk of disabilities is taboo. Students are strongly discouraged from airing family frailities. "We in Sunshine School," Mrs. Lewis tells them, "must live sunshine." And, with the full force of her conviction, she implores parents not to talk of their children's imperfections before them.





Soil And Water Loss

DALLAS, March 20 - A vast plan to control soil and water losses throughout Texas, embracing the expenditure of \$100,000,000 over a period 10 years, was announced by Dr. H. V. Geib, regional director of the federal soil erosion service.

The plan is based upon figures showing that there is a \$30,000,000 loss annually resulting from water loss and soil erosion in Texas. The object of the plan will be to check erosion conserve moisture

and control floods. All sections of the state, including the East Texas hand lands, the redlands, the West Cross Timbers, western ranges, the prairie sections and the blacklands are included in the program.

Immediate work is recommended in the southern division of the south plains, in the ranching country of the northwestern and southwestern division, and in the Rich Grande Plains section
