The Real Liquor Difficulty in Texas

Texas rangers, under stringent instructions from Gov. James V. Allred, are conducting a series of "rapid fire" raids throughout Texas, directed at liquor and gambling. Numerous arrests have been made. Gambling equipment has been demolished where found. Swanky dens have been closed. Unheralded, the rangers have swooped down upon many cities in the state and in a trice performed their errands.

The circumstance emphasizes the two problems that face Texas where liquor is concerned:

1. The failure of the legislature to draft an intelligent and necessary liquor control bill, and

2. The failure of the federal government to live up to its pledge that the rights of dry states would in no wise be abridged or trampled upon by prohibition repeal in other

This failure of the federal government to, abide by a pledge reflected by the many open saloons in operation, indicating a tacit agreement exists that if operators will pay the federal excise tax they will be immune to interference no matter what the state laws may be.

Events apparently confirm this fact. In no instance of which we are aware have agents of the federal government in Texas made arrests of operators of open saloons who had paid excise taxes.

Thus we face the anomaly of a federal prohibition law which defines the rights of dry states and pledges every effort to maintain those rights so long as the states remain blase indifference all but what efdry; and a federal policy which permits of acceptance of ex-cise fees for operation, completely at variance with the govcise fees for operation, completely at variance with the government's pledge of protection.

Actually, a large proportion of the public, probably the majority, realizes the need for and is favorable to some intelligent policy which would permit the state of Texas to control its liquor problem. Few apparently are favorable to the open saloon, which it was promised would never return, but which has returned, providing revenues for the federal gov- by cutting down advertising. ernment but none for the state government. One answer to such a situation would be the state dispensary system, giving the state of Texas practically a monopoly on sales.

Texas' liquor problem has grown increasingly acute. Legislation to meet the situation should have been nearly two years ago. And what of the plight of the United States district attorney? He is prosecutor for the federal government, which has thrown a mantle of protection around those federal excise taxes. From a moral, if not legal angle, wouldn't he bear the responsibility of going into state court and attempting to get the revenue bureau's "client" free?

And can you imagine a stranger, more monstrous commentary on so-called justice than an incident like that would provide

The issue has been pussyfooted by the legislature long enough. Some kind of showdown is imperative. The present situation breeds disrespect for laws in general. Both the federal government and the legislature must share the responsibility for as incongruous a condition affecting law and order as can be found anywhere in this land of the free and home of the brave.

Federal and State Fighting Crime

The U.S. Treasury Department uses 12,000 agents to make a nationwide federal raid on crime and arrests 2,000 men and women offenders. The toll of criminals, gathered in the country's large cities, includes counterfeiters (a large plant being seized close to Sing Sing Prison), narcotic suppliers and peddlers, smugglers, liquor tax evaders and violators of many laws the Treasury must enforce. Drugs, liquor and paraphernalia seized run to huge figures. The country is cheered; criminals get another impressive notice-Organized federal agencies can and will smite planned crime vital blows.

U. S. Fighting For Trade

Cuba accords the United States the status of a privileged nation in sweeping new tariff manipulation decrees. The United States had been virtually crowded out of the Cuban cotton and rayon textile market by Japan; but Havana, having recently renounced its trade treaty with Tokyo, now decrees high tariffs against countries where cheap labor, cheap money or subsidized industry prevail. This may exclude Japan, Russia, Italy, Indo-China, Denmark, Turkey, Norway and others. Cuba is triumphing over its general strike-It seeks also to triumph over the conditions which brought it about.
