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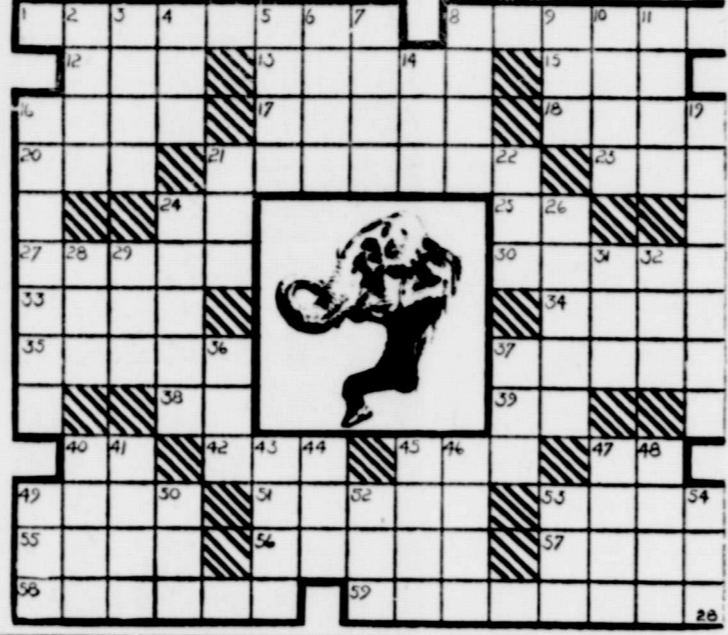

Says Business Gain Due To Farm Prices

HOUSTON, March 28.—Higher prices paid to farmers for their products is responsible for better business among independent growers of the nation, according to J. Frank Grimes, Chicago, president of the Independent Grocers' Alliance of America.

Grimes, on a tour of the country, came to Houston from the West coast.

"I am sure that this increase in the grocery business," he said, "is just one indication of better conditions in all business.

"Keep farm produce prices up for two more years, and we'll never know there was a depression," he said.

Good farms was so convinced that grain prices mean good business generally that he believes the government's most important concern should be to maintain those prices.

"No matter what the government has to do," he said, "farm prices should be kept up."

DEAF SPORTS TO HOLD MEET NEXT AUGUST

LONDON, March 28—Deaf people from all parts of the world will hold an international games rally here Aug. 17 to 24.

There are 17 nations affiliated to the Comité International des Sports Silencieux (International Committee of Silent Sports), and 15 of them are definitely competing.

The track and field events will cover the complete Olympic program with the exception of the marathon, steeplechase, hop-step-jump, cross-country race, death-hammer-throw, and walking.

There also will be swimming—seven events for men, and four for women; diving, cycling, lawn tennis, and association football.

The first international deaf meet was in Paris in 1924, when nine nations participated, and the International Committee was founded.

At Amsterdam in 1928, 19 nations took part; at Nuremberg, in 1931, there were 14.

World Record
The world's records for deaf athletes are not imposing, and it is doubtful whether they can ever be first-class.

Scandinavia was the first to cater for the deaf athlete. It was in Copenhagen in 1906 that a Swedish club met a Danish club in the first athletic match for deaf teams from different countries.

In 1916 Vienna and Budapest began a long series of association football matches, and in 1922 France and Belgium played the first international football match confined to deaf players.

In the first comprehensive international games in 1924, France swept the board, thanks to a vast superiority in athletics and cycling.

At Amsterdam in 1928 Germany, a new competitor, won with 125 1-2 points to France's 105. Both did well in athletics, but Germany's swimmers turned the scales.

At Nuremberg in 1931, a young Danish team set a new standard for deaf runners, but again German swimmers outclassed everybody, and Germany's final score was 296 points to France's 176, and Denmark's 142.

Thermometer Job No Bed Of Roses

WASHINGTON, March 28—Life is no bed of roses for thermometer readers, says Miss Johana Busse, of the Bureau of Standards.

Miss Busse is the only woman head of a bureau section. It is the job of her staff of women to check thermometers for the nation's manufacturers.

The job includes placing thermometers in shaved ice, immersing them in boiling water and oil and in molten tin at temperatures ranging from 40 degrees below zero to 900 degrees above. Cold hands and screeching fingertips are the lot of Miss Busse.

She said thermometers are "tricky" instruments, sometimes only approximately temperatures. That is caused by the bulb, she explained, which not only varies in the same type of instrument, but changes size from time to time due to expansion and contraction.

TEXAS CITRUS SHIPPING TO END APRIL 2

WASHINGTON, March 28 — Shipment of citrus fruit direct from the groves of the Lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas will cease for the season on April 2, 1935, instead of April 15, Lee A. Strong, chief of the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, announced today. After April 2, said Strong, federal permits for the interstate shipment of citrus fruit from the regulated area will be issued only for fruit in approved storage.

date of the shipping season is fixed by the federal and state departments of agriculture after consultation. J. E. McDonald, commissioner of the Texas state department of agriculture, concurs in the present order closing the shipping season on April 2, says Strong. It was originally intended to permit shipments until April 15, as was announced last January. Recently, however, Mexican fruit flies have been found on the Texas side of the border, and the department considers it necessary to institute the host-free period without delay to avoid the danger of additional fruit fly infestations being established in the Texas citrus groves. The purpose of maintaining a period each year during which there are no fruits available in which the fruit flies can breed, and applying sprays toxic to the insect is to prevent the fruit flies from living through until the next crop of citrus fruit ripens in the fall.

College Admits Two Mer After 75 Years

PAINSVILLE, O., March 28 — Sacred to womanhood for 75 years the gates of Lake Erie College have been crashed by two males. The two are M. L. Rutter, of Madison, near here, and Dr. Paul Rutter, a Painesville dentist, his brother. Rutter was graduated from the University of Pittsburgh with high engineering honors and received an offer to teach, providing he studied education. So he entered Lake Erie. Dr. Rutter had entered the college previously to take some chemistry courses. College officials insisted the men's matriculation was not the beginning of co-education here, but merely that exceptions had been made in their cases.

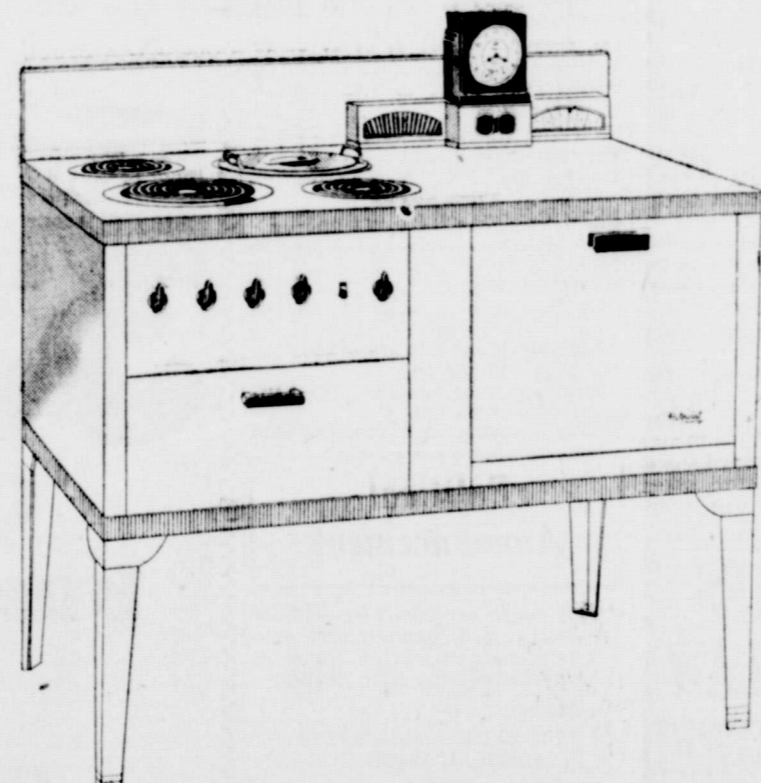

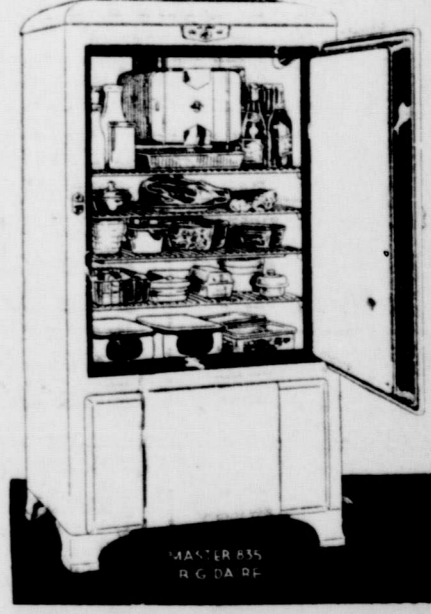

Thermometer Job No Bed Of Roses

WASHINGTON, March 28.—Life is no bed of roses for thermometer readers, says Miss Johanna Buse, of the Bureau of Standards.

Miss Buse is the only woman head of a bureau section. It is the job of her staff of women to check thermometers for the nation's manufacturers.

The job includes placing thermometers in boiling water and oil and in melting tin at temperatures ranging from 40 degrees below zero to 500 degrees above. Cold hands and scratched fingertips are the lot of Miss Buse.

She said thermometers are "tricky" instruments, sometimes only approximately temperatures. That is caused by the bulb, she explained, which not only varies in the same type of instrument, but changes size from time to time due to expansion and contraction.

Thermometer tubes frequently have an uneven bore.



On page 16 of an audit of the accounts of the City of Cisco prepared under the date of October 31, 1929, under the administration of J. M. Williamson, as mayor appears the following:

Refunding bonds, Series 2-1928, under 1-226, maturity, 1944-68, amount \$225,000; sold, \$20,000; unsold, \$205,000; outstanding, \$20,000. Minutes 2-22, November 13, 1928 by Ordinance to refund unsold warrants of 10-22-22, series 2-32."

Below this, in a copy of the audit given to the records at the city hall, over the signature of P. H. Lambert, a member of the firm of Lambert and Nichols, which conducted the audit, is the following:

"According to the records available at the close of this audit there were \$200,000 not issued or standing at October 31, 1929, and therefore, not included in the standing bonded debt."

\$20,000 Shown Sold
In spite of the fact that the audit shows only \$20,000 of the issue sold, \$99,000 of the issue agreed among the bonds upon which suit was filed in federal court at Abilene, in which suit the bondholders committee obtained a judgment against the city. Later more of this issue appeared from other sources until records at the city show that \$154,000 of these were presented for payment of the one per cent agreed upon for terms of the settlement now consummated between the city and the bondholders.

Will Mr. Williamson explain why sale of these bonds was not recorded, and if no sale was made, why they appeared among the bonds sold upon or otherwise outstanding against the city?
E. E. Stubblefield today made the following statement: "I am referred to in the paper and circulars as the one who is the money lender. I plead guilty of letting some of the men here have from 50 cents to \$1 at a time. But I never at any time demanded interest or ever said a thing to Mr. Cate about collecting for me."
"Now, about two years ago Mr. Williamson was in need of money to go to Austin to get a job. I went to his office and let him have money to help pay his expenses down there. He will tell you that I never asked him nor did he give me one penny for the use of the money."

TEXAS CITRUS SHIPPING TO END APRIL 2

WASHINGTON, March 28 — Shipment of citrus fruit direct from the groves of the Lower Rio Grande Valley of Texas will cease for the season on April 2, 1935, instead of April 15, Lee A. Strong, chief of the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, announced today. After April 2, said Strong, federal permits for the interstate shipment of citrus fruit from the regulated area will be issued only for fruit in approved storage.

Under the Mexican fruit worm quarantine regulations, a period of from six to seven months without any fruit on the trees is maintained in Brooks, Cameron, Hidalgo, and Willacy counties, in Texas. This is to prevent the establishment of the Mexican fruit fly, which occurs in Mexico and reaches the Texas citrus orchards from time to time. Each year the state of Texas requires the removal from the trees of all fruits susceptible to attack by the Mexican fruit fly. The closing

date of the shipping season is fixed by the federal and state departments of agriculture after consultation. J. E. McDonald, commissioner of the Texas state department of agriculture, concurs in the present order closing the shipping season on April 2, says Strong.

It was originally intended to permit shipments until April 15, as was announced last January. Recently, however, Mexican fruit flies have been found on the Texas side of the border, and the department considers it necessary to institute the host-free period without delay to avoid the danger of additional fruit fly infestations being established in the Texas citrus groves. 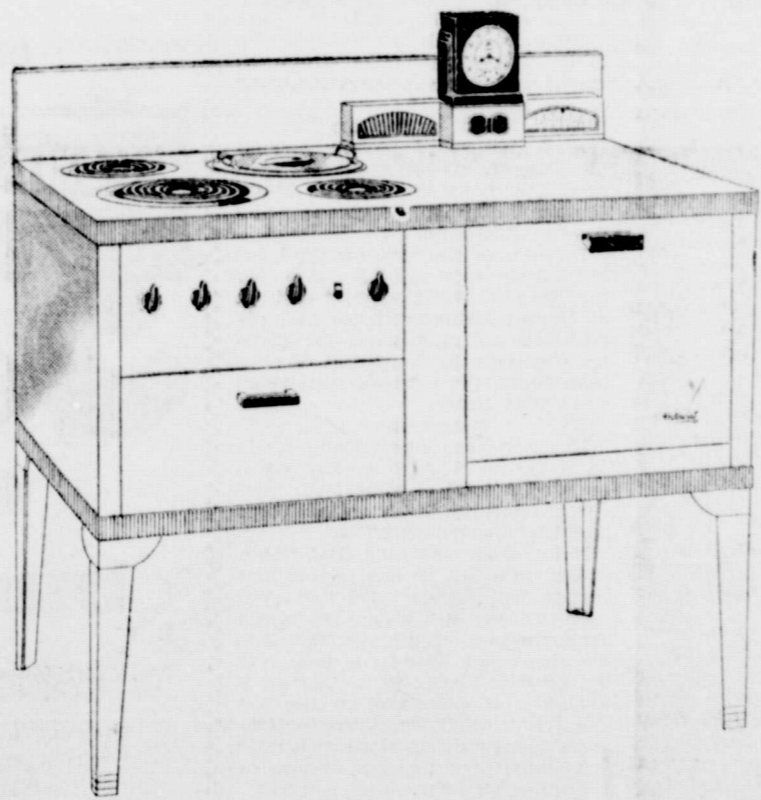

FARMERS MAY USE IMPORTED SUDAN IN U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 28 — Seed and seed leaders are asking the department of agriculture to import Sudan grass seed which is satisfactory for planting as a permanent seedmen answer in Argentina and New Zealand. Grass in these countries very originated from seed grown in United States. Seed from Argentina was tested several years ago in a number of field stations in Kansas and Texas and was found to be nearly equal with that produced by domestic seed in growth habits, and yield and purity. As to seed from other countries, the department has sufficient information to have an opinion.

In the United States was about one-half that usually produced, with virtually no carryover from 1933. To offset this shortage for the 1935 planting, large importations are expected from other countries. Nearly 2,000,000 pounds of seed has been imported since July 1, 1934, and approximately two-thirds of this has come in since Jan. 1. More than one-half of the 2,000,000 pounds has come from Australia, with the remainder divided about equally between Argentina and Hungary. A small quantity came from Morocco. Since the 1935 seed crop in Argentina is now being harvested, it is anticipated that large quantities of this seed will arrive in the United States in time for seeding this spring.

Starving Cattle To Be Given Pastures

DENVER, March 28 — In a desperate effort to save their half-starved, dust-plagued cattle, stockmen of Bent, Prowers, and Baca counties may move 50,000 head into the San Luis valley or South Park Ranges, as well as cultivated seed in the once prosperous cattle district have been smothered under sand and dust. After 12 days of dust storm many cattle, half starved because of lack of feed, and almost dried out because of a scarcity of water. Already had fallen victims to the choking dust.

Winners in voice will receive \$75 and \$45 scholarships and one award of \$50 will be given in the violin contest. Cups will go to first and second place winners in trio for girls' voices and chorus for girls' voices.

Solo contest numbers are: Piano "In the Evening" (Des Abends), by Schumann and "Valse Impromptu in A flat" by Liszt; voice, "Slumber Song" by Gretchaninoff, and the contestant's selection; violin, "The Son of Puzosta" by Keler-Bala and the contestant's selection. The trios, class A division, will sing "Lift Thine Eyes (from Eliph)" by Mendelssohn and "Will o' the Wisp" by Spross. Coastguard Likely To Get 5 Destroyers

PHILADELPHIA, March 28 — Five United States destroyers may be resurrected from the "cemetery" of the Navy Yard here should congress approve a house committee's recommendation for an appropriation of more than \$1,000,000 for repair of vessels and other equipment for the Coast Guard.

During the peak of prohibition the navy had loaned the Coast Guards 26 destroyers in their war against smuggling and for rescue work on the Atlantic All but eight were returned to the navy yard before 1933. A year ago the remaining vessels were sent back. To have been scrapped, five are idle, and only one is in service. It is the Semmes.

HOUSE PASSES EIGHT MONTHS SCHOOL BILL

AUSTIN, March 28 — A \$10,000,000 appropriation to insure an eight-months school term for even the smallest schoolhouse in Texas during the next two years was passed by the house of representatives Tuesday.

It compares with a \$6,000,000 appropriation made by the preceding legislature. Included, however, are items for rehabilitations, home economics, and agriculture course that were omitted from the last appropriation. The bill had only two opposing votes to 125 ayes. The enormous vote of approval was not given until the original bill had been stripped by amendments. These took away much of the power centered in the state department of education in administering the fund.

The final form insures retention of old school teachers with state certificates. The bill, as drawn, would have barred any school from aid if it had any teacher who had not two years of college work. As the house of representatives recessed an automobile drivers license bill was near passage. Various votes on proposed amendments indicated a big majority for the bill. Under it, drivers of 1,250,000 registered vehicles will pay 25 cents annually to provide a fund for enforcing safe driving rules. Estimates on what the fund will receive ranged from \$325,000 to \$1,000,000 a year, depending on how many drivers per car there are. Tests may be required by the highway motor patrol before licenses are issued. No person under 16 may be licensed. Licenses are to be forfeited for major traffic violations. Suspensions are provided for minor violations.

EXPEDITION TO AMAZON READY SAY SPANIARDS

MADRID, March 28 — Preparations for the departure of the Iglesias Expedition to the Amazon are proceeding apace. The vessel which is to convey them to South America has been launched, a portion of the expedition is in New Guinea getting acclimatized to conditions approaching those which it is expected will be met with in the Amazon, and the principal supply bases have been decided upon.

There will be 11 important bases, of which there will be three principal ones. These three bases will be used for the storing of food and fuel supplies and the stationing of small river boats and the two amphibian planes which the expedition will take.

Knock-Down Planes
These planes are of the type which can be dismantled with comparative ease, so that they will occupy the minimum of space.

The expedition expects to be away three years. The minimum of conserves will be carried, members of the expedition depending mainly on the fish and meat which are abundant in the region which it is proposed to explore.

Diet Planned
Doctor Herrera, who is to accompany the expedition, states that the diet will be varied according to the characteristics of the neighborhood through which the expedition may be traveling, but always with attempts to adapt it to Spanish customs.

Villagers own so much in stocks and bonds that the town levies no real estate tax. Income from the intangible tax meets all requirements.

Village officials decided to use their sales tax moneys to improve streets and extend sewers.

THIRD SET OF TEETH
HAMILTON, Ont. — Mrs. Sarah Berry, 75, is displaying eight new teeth which she hopes will soon be joined by a complete set, her third. She already has "grown" two full sets of natural teeth, and expects the third set to break through the gums soon. Five of the new teeth are in the lower jaw and three in the upper.

SUFFER HEADACHES
PHILADELPHIA — Examination of health records of 5,294 teachers in Philadelphia revealed that 25 per cent of them suffer severe and frequent headaches, according to Dr. Rudolph Bloom, of the Philadelphia County Medical Society. Only 10 per cent of the school janitors, however, suffer from headaches, he added.

VALUABLE TESTAMENT
NEWPORT, Ark. — A New Testament printed in 1812, the first Copseston edition, is owned by Marvin Reynolds, Jackson County farmer. The edition compares word for word with the printings of today, readers observed. The only difference is in printing where the old German "s" is used in the 1812 edition.

University Offers Course In Indians

NORMAN, Okla., March 28 — The American Indian, unique in traditions and customs among the races of the world, has been made the subject of a course in the University of Oklahoma.

The course, taught by Dr. E. E. Hale, head of the history department and author of many books, is said to be the only one of its kind for college credit in the world.

Dr. Dale, oldtime cowboy and school teacher, teaches the course almost entirely from material which he himself has gathered.

There is no textbook. Included in the course are such topics as Indian warfare, dress, relations with the U. S. government, customs, and home life. A general survey is made of all Indians in the United States from the time of Columbus down to the present.

Approximately 30 students, most of whom are taking graduate work, are enrolled. Although the new course has been listed in the university catalogue for several years, only in the last three years has the demand for it become so strong that it is taught each semester.

By way of illustrating his lectures, Dale exhibits Indian relics which he has collected during the last 35 years. Included in the group is a copy of the original of Sequoyah's Indian alphabet.

TORONTO, Ont. — Toronto, Montreal, and Ottawa, of Canadian cities adopting daylight saving time, have signified the intention to advance clocks one hour on Sunday, April 28. 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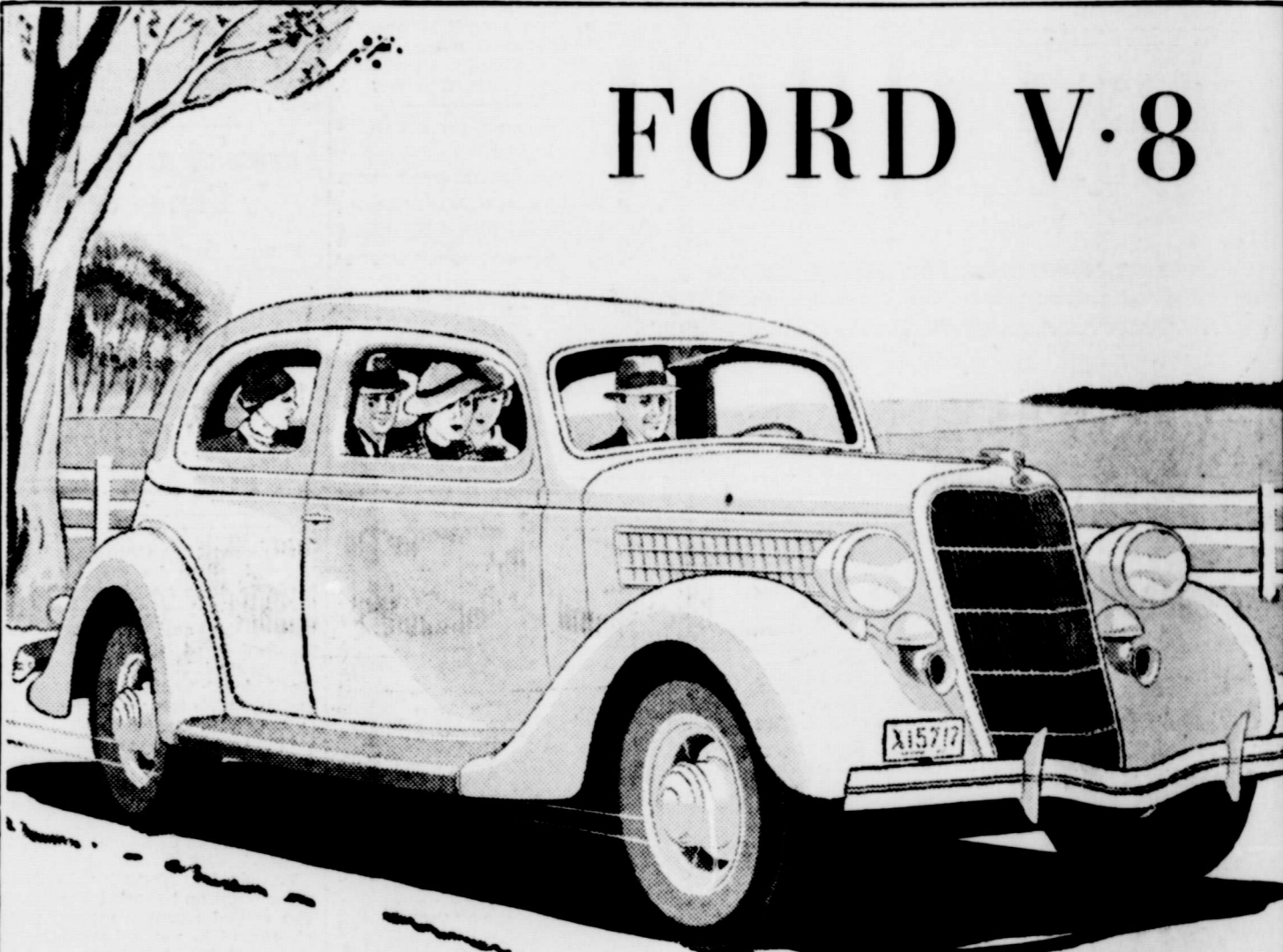

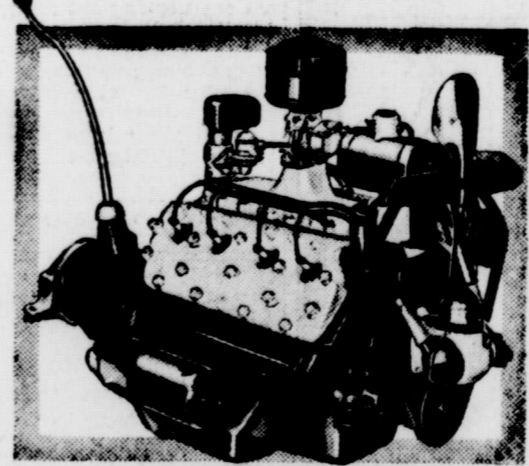
